Community Benefitting from Grants Program

Two local projects are seeing the benefits of the Community Bank grants program.

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum was successful in its application to the 2020 program and received \$3,500 for new photocopier. Their old а photocopier was 9 years old and repairs and maintenance costs were substantially rising with age. With the grant funds they were able to trade in their photocopier for a new one. Museum Secretary, Carolyn Olive, explained the importance of the copier in their operation, "in addition to general copying and printing, the Museum uses the copier for scanning and archiving. It is an essential tool in preserving our photographs, other paper based items and our catalogue in digital form. The 2011 flood highlighted the extreme importance in digitising our collection."

Many may have noticed the building work taking place opposite the toilet block at the Travellers Rest. The Charlton Forum received \$25,635 in funding for the **Beautify John Curtin**

Drive project in the 2019 grants program. The Forum stated "this project is aimed at making our town more attractive to both the travelling public and local residents alike. It will create a footpath where there is none, define the street boundary with a fence and provide a covered walkway for patrons. It is all about making our town visually attractive, which in turn will encourage people to stop and possibly spend in our town and indeed tell their friends about the wonderful experience they had when they stopped for a toilet break, a bite to eat or an overnight stop in Charlton.





Charlton & District Community Bank considering a further buy-back of shares

Several years ago, the Board of NCFS held a very successful voluntary share buyback program. With a potential buyback limit of 150,000 shares, the company received and accepted offers that resulted in the payment for and subsequent cancellation of over 143,000 shares.

This share buyback program was so successful that subsequently there have been expressions of interest from other shareholders, as to whether the Board would consider another offer. The number of shares identified was relatively small, in the order of 20,000 to 30,000 shares.

Unfortunately, since the successful voluntary program that NCFS ran last time, the rules and preconditions for share buy-backs have changed and small share buy-backs are much more expensive to the point where they are now not economical.

Accordingly, if NCFS is to offer any future share buyback program, the Board of NCFS would need to be confident that potentially in excess of 100,000 shares would be available to any voluntary share buyback program that we were considering. So the Board has decided to write to its shareholders to see if there is a desire for a greater program to take place, which would be more economical.

Shares still available in Community Bank

In further news North Central Financial Services Ltd company secretary, John Harley, has announced that there are still some shares available in the Community Bank. Many of these parcels are from deceased estates. Over recent years the bank has declared dividends of 7c per share, 5c per share and recently 3c per share all of which were fully franked. When franking is factored in, this is a return of more than the actual amount of the dividend.

Golden Grains Museum News

Like you, we at the museum have been watching the easing of some restrictions, and share the concerns of our community still affected by COVID-19 restrictions. Here at the museum we still are not open to the general public but are hoping, that according to the current road map, we may be open in late November. We are continuing to work within guidelines behind the scenes on all the routines that need to be done from cataloguing our collection, receiving donated goods and maintaining the records; a work that never ceases.

We've been fortunate to have Maxine Bartlett uploading some of our photos and their details onto the Vic Collections online database thanks to her employer's offer of a week's paid volunteer leave. If anyone else is interested in doing this important work for us from home on a volunteer basis, let us know. You'll need a computer/laptop and internet connection.

Thank you to everyone who took part in our Lotto fundraiser. A few lucky ducks had more than one win. We may run another later in the year, we'll keep you posted.

The Buloke Shire painters have been busy giving the museum a much needed facelift. It was last painted in 2006 by Greg Guy just in time for the Commonwealth Games baton's journey through Charlton. Much research went into choosing the colours and we think it's looking a treat.

Sadly this year the decision was made not to hold the Charlton Show due to the restrictions in place. As disappointed as we all are, the Golden Grains Museum is lucky enough to have many records of the show back to its commencement in 1881. What an annual highlight for the town and district it has been over these years. This is the first time the show hasn't been held since it began—it continued through both world wars. Next year would have been the 140th show—a huge milestone. This month we thought we would look at the centenary show held on October 17, 1981.

The Charlton A & P Society were determined to make this an event to remember and pulled out all the stops in booking some top rate attractions. President Lloyd Paterson, Secretary Joy Rowling and the committee were able to present one of the top performers on the circuit at the time; Jade Hurley. This followed on from previous years with Slim Dusty and The Hawking Brothers. To commemorate the event, a permanent stage was built on the lawn opposite the TAB building, and this was used until the most recent renovations.

Other highlight acts were the M.G. Car Club display, the Victorian Mounted Police giving a display of tent pegging, hot air balloon rides and a period fashion parade. This included 60 outfits which the models kept on and mingled with the crowd. To coincide with this, seamstress Betty Watkins, (a successful Royal Melbourne Show exhibitor), had a display of dolls in Norm Strong's Goodfellows Grocery Store. All the shops in High Street remained open late on the Friday night for the large number of visitors in town for the weekend. A raffle of \$20 worth of goods and a child's bike were well supported. With music performed by John Martin's Music Men, and the ladies from Amity assisting in a Rubic Cube competition, the night was judged a huge success.

A popular event at the show was the Young Farmers sheaf toss, with Keith Jones of Wychitella tossing the bag 28ft into the air. Daryl Gifford of St Arnaud was second with Bill Baird of Charlton third. Kathryn Anderson won Miss Showgirl, while Tanya Walsh was Junior Showgirl. Miss Tiny Tot was Joanne McGurk and Mr Tiny Tot Christopher Downes. Over 4000 people attended the show on the Saturday in total.

The fun didn't end there. On the Sunday the Charlton Citizens Band performed on the showground's lawns in a special celebration of their 100 years. A large number of former band members were in attendance and a fantastic time was had by all.

The museum always welcomes any items of local history for our collection. Maybe you have photos, a written or oral history of a family member or some interesting keepsake. We would love to know about it.

We hope to reopen our doors very soon, but in the meantime please call one of the numbers below for any enquiries you may have.

Angus enlisted in the Australian Army on 05 November 1941, he served with distinction in 8th Brigade OVP, he came through the ordeal of war and was discharged on 04 April 1946. How well he served his fellow man on his return is known to his family, comrades and friends, who mourn his passing.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old; age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn; at the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we will remember them.

Find your local flood guide – and prepare this spring

With above-average rainfall and possible flash flooding in the north west this Spring, residents are encouraged to plan ahead using VICSES' latest, local resources.

It follows the recent Climate Outlook from the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM), indicating a heightened risk of a wet weather La Niña system across Victoria, and much of the country.

VICSES' Northwest Community Resilience Coordinator, Gavin Quinn, and Local Controller, Cameron Arnel, are encouraging locals to learn the basics when it comes to flooding preparedness, and staying safe during extreme weather events.

The following is recommended for residents in Victoria's north west.

1. Understand the local flood history in your suburb or township. Access these resources by following this link: <u>ses.vic.gov.au/get-ready/your-local-flood-information</u>

2. Take note to never drive on flooded roads. It can take just 15 cm of water to float a small car. That's the height of an average pen. Stay safe by never entering floodwater, it can be fatal.

3. Know what to do if your home is being threatened by major flooding and what we mean by **'Bag It, Block It, Lift It and Leave'**. Bag it - by laying sandbags where water may get into your home. Block it - by covering your toilet and drains to prevent back-flow and then 'Lift-it and Leave' by shifting valuables onto tables and benchtops and leaving early to a family or friend's house on higher ground (which is still ok to do in-line with COVID-19 restrictions).

Call 132 500 if you require assistance from VICSES during storms and floods, and always call Triple Zero (000) in a life-threatening emergency.
