Welcome to the March edition of the newsletter.


As promised the Deb Ball is a feature of this month's edition. Congratulations to all involved for putting on a great event in very difficult circumstances.

It's hard to believe we are into March already, and that 2 months have already passed us by. We are very happy to advise that we are finally open again for visitors and researchers. Sunday hours are 11:00am to 3:00pm, other times by appointment. Come and check out your town's history some time; you will be surprised by what is on display.

The museum was very pleased to welcome a team from Australian Museums and Galleries Association in late February who came to assess our museum for accreditation. This is a peer review program that assesses local galleries, historical societies, heritage sites and museums ensuring that best practices in all areas of operations are occurring. The benefits of accreditation are: that bodies awarding grants know that we have achieved a high standard of organisation and expertise, access is available to from governing resources bodies, recognition for achieving a high level of policy and collection development in museum governance and much more. The group was extremely impressed with our museum and the work done since the floods of 2010/11.

Achievements like this don't just happen. They take hundreds and hundreds of volunteer hours to review, catalogue, research, record and store or display historical items. Scanning of documents and photographs, newspaper clippings, funeral booklets and more all take time. This is where we need volunteers. Do you have an interest in history and preserving the Charlton story? Can you spare a few hours a month? Call one of the numbers below for more information. No computer literacy required and all necessary training provided.

BINGO IS BACK! Yes, within COVID-19 restrictions Donald Bingo is on again as a fundraiser for the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. Book your spot now for our first visit on **Thursday March 11**. Our bus leaves Travellers Rest at 6:30pm **sharp**. Masks required on the bus. Cost still just \$5 (plus your bingo cards). Contact Anne or Carolyn on the numbers below to reserve your place. Next trip will be on Thursday April 22.

You have possibly noticed the construction work going on in Armstrong Street. The old Pre-School and Health Centre have gone, and work will commence shortly on a brand new facility for the town's young children. Here at the museum we have many documents, stories and images from the early 1940's relating to that popular site over many years. It was 1944 when the first committee was formed, and 1947 that the first payment of 47 pounds was deposited to form the Building Fund. It then took 15 years to raise the remainder of the funds needed to build and furnish the premises. With the final cost coming in at 13,000 pounds, 6,000 coming from the State Government, the Council loaning 4,500 and the Ladies Committee contributing 2,500 pounds, the building was officially opened in November 1962 by Mr Mack, The Minister of Health. A plaque was unveiled to mark the occasion, the Charlton Brass Band performed and Mr presented was with Mack а commemorative sandwich dish.

In closing, we always welcome any

items of local history for our collection. Maybe you have photos, a written or oral history of a family member or some interesting keepsake. We would love to know about it, even just to scan into our records.

The coronavirus pandemic has hit the population hard. With restrictions on events and functions throughout 2020 and continuing into the new year, wedding planning has become an almost impossible task... Or so you might think.

With a wedding date set for September 2020, Lachlan Holmes-Brown and his fiancée, Talia Gordon, had to reshuffle their plans not just once, but three times before they were finally hitched in a spur-of-themoment snap decision prior to the "Circuit Breaker" lockdown that came into effect at midnight that Friday night. The couple was scheduled to wed at Carlsruhe on Saturday, February 13, before the latest lockdown announcement on Friday once again foiled their plans. The wedding party was already in Bendigo running errands in preparation for the special day, when they received the devastating news. Celebrant Georgie Dixon contacted them only a short time after the announcement was made and offered some alternative options; one of which was, "Let's do it today!" Since they were in Bendigo anyway, they collected the floral arrangements and headed back to Charlton. In the time it took to travel from Bendigo to Charlton, all the wedding plans had been amended, an alternate venue sourced, and the determined couple were all set to be united on Friday evening at the Charlton Rotary Park, followed by a reception at the Vale of Avoca. Community Car Providing Valuable Service to the Charlton Community

The Community Car is now just on two and a half years old having been launched on 13th March 2018. The Committee replaced the original Car on the 25th June 2019 and the new car has now done just over 40.000 km. Since we introduced the Service the two cars have done 266 trips and taken approximately 60 Charlton and District residents to a variety of Medical Appointments. The current Car is averaging 2.4 trips a week. Some weeks we have had to also use one of the Driver Education Cars because of clashes of appointment dates and the time of appointments.

For those who are not aware of the way the Car works, Clients book the car with the Neighbourhood House (5491 2333 or 0473 759 456) during office hours. Their administrator then rings around our 13 voluntary drivers to determine who is available, a driver is allocated and the client informed. We then ask you to pay for the trip. Please note that if no one is available when you ring, leave a message with your contact details and they will get back to you as soon as possible.

So what does it cost? The Car does not have any Government or Council funding for its operation, therefore we have to charge a fee for use to cover both the operational cost and the cost of replacement of the vehicle in due course. At present the car is charged out at a rate of 30 cents per kilometre. If your appointment is 100 or more kilometres from Charlton you can then claim the trip on the Victorian Public Transport Scheme (VPTS). You can obtain a claim form from your GP or we have spare forms in the car, and the VPTS will refund you at the rate of 21 cents per kilometre. If you are a pensioner they will pay the full amount from the first trip. If you are not a pensioner you have to pay the first \$100 in each calendar year before you start getting refunds.

For instance: a trip to Bendigo, 216 kilometres, costs \$64.80. The VTPS will refund you approx \$45.36 so your cost for the trip is \$19.44. A Melbourne trip will cost \$156.60 less the refund of \$109.62 so your cost is \$46.98. If you needed to go to Wycheproof the cost is \$19.20 and St Arnaud is \$27.00. However because the distance is less than 100 kilometres from Charlton, there is no refund from the VPTS.

This is a highly regarded and very valuable service for the Charlton and District community's residents which has been a huge help to many people in the community. If you would like further information or an idea of the cost to another destination not mentioned above please ring the Neighbourhood House during normal working hours, if they are not present or busy when you ring leave a message and they will get back to you as soon as they are available. Charlton needed a little "pick-meup" in 2020.

The rural Victorian town on the banks of the Avoca River – an hour's drive north-west of Bendigo – had, like many of its ilk, been battling through the pandemic's sombre moments.

And then came the spark, statistically at least, from an extremely unlikely source.

Not once, not even twice, but three times, the golfing gods smiled upon the historic Victorian sand scrape course, providing that feel-good moment for all in the Buloke Shire.

It all started without fanfare at a club that hadn't celebrated a hole-inone for more than a decade.

Mallee-based coach Mark Bowd paid a visit for a junior clinic on August 14 when, partly because of Covid-19 restrictions around other sports, a generous turnout took in his tuition.

Among those irregular golfers was then 13-year-old Cooper Boyle, who, eager to put his new knowledge to the test out, wandered out to play a few holes afterwards, accompanied by the club's women's captain and junior coordinator Wendy Laffin, his sister Taylah and good friend Angus.

They'd reached the par-3 14th hole with Cooper having enjoyed various

degrees of success with his new skill set on previous holes.

And while he didn't exactly flush his tee shot, it was always right on line and as it trickled up on to the scrape, Wendy screamed: "Cooper, it's in the hole!"

"It was an amazing little shot and when I yelled out, he just dropped his stick and took off," she said.

Months later, Cooper, now 14, is still dining out on his feat - particularly when it comes to his father, Kirk, a 10 handicapper who hasn't been graced by an ace, despite a family history of "ones". "I was a bit shellshocked when it went in, I'd never been close," Cooper said. "Wendy was screaming. Angus was pretty pumped and a couple of older boys a hole away heard the noise and came over to see what was going on. "It was pretty cool. I'm still pretty happy with myself ... plus I've got one up on Dad now. "The funny thing was, I took a ball off Dad to go and play and when Wendy brought the trophy around (weeks later), it had that ball on it and now he doesn't get to use that ball any more, either," he said with a giggle as he joined his great grandmother Betty Baird and great grandfather Alan Cadzow in having had aces at Charlton.

Wendy's role in this tale didn't end there. Far from it.

Remarkably, just one day later, Laffin – herself an accomplished golfer

playing off 12 – sidled up the seventh tee and drew her 7-iron from 100m off the red tees. "I'd never thought about it. Ever," she said. "I've won a couple of small things here and there, but a holein-one is something you never think you're going to have. "But I was playing in an ambrose, the last in our group to hit and it looked a decent sort of a shot, but I thought it would just bounce through. "But it landed on a little rise, rolled up and in. They (my playing partners) saw it and yelled and I just went a bit cold, really. "I remember thinking, 'Oh you're kidding, but we got up there and there it was in the cup, so we took a photo and I tried to let it sink in. "We had to finish our game, so it gave me a while to think and then we had a little celebration in the clubhouse and I was a little bit late home. "By the time I got home, my husband Bernie said, 'Golf took a long time today'. "So I told him what happened and I don't think he really believed me."

Wendy said the double was a mystery to many in the clubhouse. "We hadn't had one for so long and Cooper's caused quite a stir, so I think that people thought (mine) just couldn't be true, too," she joked.

But it wasn't long until a third ace was added to cap the unprecedented 2020 winter.

The quietly spoken Chris Mathews, from 113m, dropped in his own 7-iron on the same hole less than four weeks later.

"I spoke to Chris and he was as laidback as ever. He sort of agreed it was incredible, but he doesn't get too over the top about anything," Wendy said with a giggle.

Wendy said the trifecta had become a great and positive talking point around town at a time when it was most needed.

She said the club, which has its main season from April to September, had welcomed many new players during Covid times, with people of all ages looking for activity and respite.

"You'd never say it was a good thing for anyone, but there's certainly a lot more interest around the place now, which is great to have some new faces." The Charlton Community Newsletter

Recognition of thirty-nine years of service to Ambulance Victoria was recently accorded to Charlton-based paramedic, Harry Brindley.

A familiar face to many across this region, especially in their hour of need, Harry's dedication was acknowledged by Ambulance Victoria staff, Amelia Kohn (Loddon Mallee Area Manager 2) and Tim Hobbs (Buloke / Gannawarra Senior Team Manager).

The duration of Harry's service - in particular his three decades of placement in Charlton - is not the norm in the Ambulance service, where migration and transfers often mean relatively short tenures.

Receiving two additional decade clasps for his Long Service Medal, Harry was also presented with a plaque recording his thirtynine years contribution, along with a Life Membership for the Ambulance Subscription Scheme.

Commenting on his service, Amelia Kohn praised Harry's dedication to the role of paramedic, emphasizing his deep desire to help people. "Harry would work 24 hours a day if he could," she said.

While a significant period of Harry's ambulance career has been based in Charlton, his collective involvement goes back more than 50 years to when he started as a volunteer in the St. John's Ambulance Brigade in Western Australia in the late 1960s.

Employment with the St. John's Ambulance Association then followed in 1971, with Harry's first placement at Port Headland Sub-Branch (Ambulance Station).

Following a fifteen-month tenure, a desire to pursue more intensive training saw Harry head to Perth, however a change of circumstances saw him quit Australia and move to England.

Two years with the London Ambulance Service followed, then employment with a private ambulance company based in the London suburb of Ealing Common saw him committed for another seven years.

Specializing with foreign nationals, who were not entitled to national health care, Harry recounted that the longest trip he ever undertook was a repatriation from London to Thessalonica in Northern Greece - the equivalent of travelling from Melbourne to Perth!

On returning to Australia during the 1980's Harry held positions at Shepparton, Melton and Kerang before settling in Charlton in 1991.

Reflecting on the longevity of his time in Charlton, Harry said, "When I arrived the whole town embraced me and my children, Mary and Ernie, as one of their own."

"As a single parent, and with my ambulance job commitments, it was that ongoing supportive attitude of the whole community that kept me here."

In 2017 Harry was awarded the national Ambulance Service Medal for distinguished service by a member of an Australian ambulance service.

As well as recognizing his commitment as a frontline paramedic and team manager, his citation also recognized his several establishment of volunteer Community Emergency Response Team groups for Ambulance Victoria, his dedicated time and efforts assisting and supporting the local ambulance auxiliary, along with his care for the wider community, most notably demonstrated by his efforts during the Charlton floods in January 2011 where he spent countless hours working to assist the community

during the disaster, despite his own property being ruined by flood waters.

There is no doubting the affection for Harry within the local community. Prior to last week's presentation there was a steady stream of people greeting him in the street, asking how he was going - just wanting to stop and have a chat.

His enrichment of the community has extended beyond his paramedic role, with as much dedication focused on community service through Lions at both Club and District level.

Currently District Governor-Elect for 201 V1-4, Harry is passionately researching opportunities for Clubs to consider when expanding their work with community enhancement.

Harry's Ambulance Victoria recognition is a timely acknowledgement for his selfless and dedicated outreach which has extended beyond the call of duty.

North Central Garden Club


Garden Club members met on Tuesday for the first meeting for 2021. The last time members were able to meet was March 2020.


