Teddywaddy RFG - Service Awards

The presentation of the CFA National Medal was made to longterm Teddywaddy RFB member, John Powell recently for his service to the organisation covering almost 60 years.

The Medal, amongst the CFA's highest accolades, is awarded only when a candidate meets a range of criteria, including diligent long service to the community in hazardous circumstances, including in times of emergency.

John's involvement has shown not only dedication to his own brigade and wider community, but also to supporting others, taking part in numerous Strikes Teams over the years in the wake of extreme fire events.

Joining the CFA in 1961, John held the position of Captain at Teddywaddy for seventeen years (1985-2002) guiding the brigade through peaks and troughs of operation, and providing sound advice as transformations took place.

Additional roles have included Secretary (2002 – 2014), along with VFBV Delegate from 2006 - 2014.

As the 2011 floods unfolded, John was actively engaged in the initial evacuation of Charlton, undertaking rescues as the perilous conditions intensified.

Encouraged to be involved in the fire service from an early age, John's reliable presence has been the mainstay of Teddywaddy over the years, leading to support and encouragement for succeeding leadership teams.

District 18 Commander, Paul Illman, along with current Teddywaddy RFB Captain, Tim Giles, had the pleasure of presenting the Medal at the brigade's AGM and social day held earlier this month.

Emphasizing that long service alone is not the prerequisite for a National Medal, Commander Illman read out the Preamble which accompanies the presentation, along with the details of the award's symbology and the presentation of clasps signifying additional 10 years of service. A candidate must have given at least 15 years of service to be eligible.

In a modest response, John acknowledged his appreciation for the honor as brigade members offered their congratulations.

Other service awards were also presented on the day to attending members including the following:


Members then had the opportunity to socialize over a long lunch and catch up on news from the extended period of lockdown resulting from the pandemic.

Charlton Community Bank - Continuing Community Care

Providing service to small towns is something that Community Banks know all about. After all, their genesis resulted from the desertion of the big banks interests in rural areas. Looking after your own ranks high, and community helping community is the mainstay of country existence.

Like many others, North Central Financial Services (Charlton and District Community Bank) has steadily built its brand locally over the years, bolstering this with additional support channeled out through community grants to assist multiple organizations to grow and prosper.

Recently NCFS has undertaken another step towards community care through the financing and placement of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) at the Charlton Traveller's Rest precinct.

Installed only recently, the new device joins a number of other AED's located around the Charlton township where 24/7 access is the key.

Chairman of the NCFS Board, Mr Jon Whykes, said, "The idea for this project came about through having seen a similar idea in Keith in South Australia. Installing an AED with 24 hour accessibility and in a prominent location was the Board's priority."

In the busy area of the Traveller's Rest, adjacent to the off-street picnic area and on the toilet block wall, the new equipment is in close proximity to the caravan park, main street, Calder Highway and car parking facilities - all within easy reach if an emergency should arise.

Mr Whykes said the Board would be registering the new device with Ambulance Victoria so that when a call was made the public could be directed to the closest piece of equipment.

While the AED comes with an 8 year warranty, NCFS will undertake regular maintenance of the equipment. In the case of use, Ambulance Victoria replaces the defibrillator pads. The signage and installation of the defibrillator was carried out by Charlton business, Signwise Solutions.

WHY WE HONOUR ANZAC

With community observation of ANZAC Day reinstated this year, the residents of Charlton heeded the call and turned out to support the annual recognition of Australia's most sacred day.

A multi-generational crowd covered both sides of High Street near the cenotaph as veterans, RSL members, school representatives and others gathered for the traditional "stand-to" and wreath-laying which proceeds the march to the Shire Hall.

In contrast to the bleak scene of 2020, where only three socially distanced RSL representatives placed wreaths outside the local Club room, this year's gathering of families, young children, visitors and others reflected the community desire to share the occasion which holds such deep meaning.

From the eloquent address delivered by guest speaker, Flight Lieutenant, Warrick Jones, to the contributions from the Charlton/Wycheproof Citizens' Band, the Charlton Choir, attendance by school representatives and civic leaders, the town's commemoration of the 106th anniversary of the Gallipoli landing refocused the message of comradeship which is part of the quintessential message of the ANZAC story.

For some years now Charlton has added the playing of the New Zealand national anthem to the ceremony, and this year's new order of service reproduced the words, providing an opportunity for the crowd to join the choir in its rendition of Kiwi patriotism.

Following Charlton RSL President, Gordon Risk's, warm welcome, Councillor David Pollard offered words of reflection on the significance of ANZAC, recognition of the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) Centenary (1921–2021) and the acknowledgement of local contributions towards military and national service during times of unrest.

As ever, the support provided by the Charlton/Wycheproof Citizen's Band brings an important musical dimension to the day – from creating background music for the march, to supporting the hymns during the service, to this year's enhancement of Me" with "Abide with trumpet accompaniment provided by Joe Pryke. Under Brian Heenan's leadership the local core membership is regularly increased for occasions such as ANZAC Day by participants who travel considerable distances to share their talents.

Linking the service segments together, Padre, the Reverend Judi Bird, lead the Lord's Prayer following the reading of the 23rd Psalm by Charlton College School Captains, Zara Jenkyn and Angus Jablonka. The ceremony concluded with the singing of the National Anthems of both Australia and New Zealand, before Reverend Bird said the parting Grace.

Flight Lieutenant Jones joined the RAAF in 2008, and on completion of a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering at the Australian Defence Force Academy, he was posted to professional RAAF Richmond for development and training within the Air Mobility Group. Further postings included project design engineer, Spartan avionics performance manager and as Officer-in-Charge of 37 Squadron workshops. In October 2016 he was posted to Marietta, Georgia (USA) for 3 years as technical liaison officer inside Lockheed Martin providing software and project support for an international major upgrade program. He is now with the Defence Aviation Safety Authority in Melbourne as Officer in Charge of International Engagement.

wercome to this month's news from your local museum. It has been another busy month of working behind the scenes and welcoming visitors back to view our amazing collection. Looking forward this year, we hope to again start receiving group bookings for tours, and hosting events for locals to attend and explore the town and district's history.

Recently several members travelled to Stawell for the Western Victorian Association of Historical Societies AGM. We are a member of the Midlands Zone and our Secretary, Carolyn, is on the executive. The highlight of the day was a tour of the former Pleasant Creek Hospital built in 1861.

Have you considered recording your family's history down on paper for future researchers or family members? The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is pleased to announce a new service for those who may be interested. For just \$10.00 we will scan and securely store an A4 size archival envelope of items recording your families story. This could include copies of family trees, photographs, written histories or similar items. These will be added to our database and available to view at a later date by researchers. We are fortunate to have a few recorded stories by members of pioneer families telling of the early days of the district and important information on family members' lives.

Thanks again go to all those who support the museum with our regular trips to Donald for Bingo. Apart from being a lot of fun, it is a great night of friendship and a way of raising much needed funds. There is no planned trip in June due to the cold evenings, but keep an ear open, if there is enough interest we may arrange a couple of car loads.

The museum recently received a valuable donation from the Baker family of a cedar colonial desk formerly used at the Charlton Railway Station and later used by Roy Baker in his Sunshine Harvester Agency in High Street. We are very thankful to the Bakers for their gift and it now takes pride of place in our reading room. Our feature



story this month relates to a town memorial that most people would have driven walked or past at some stage, and paid much

possibly not attention to. The gates to Charlton Park facing the Calder Highway pay tribute to the life of Sir Albert Dunstan; one of the longest serving Premiers of Victoria. Dunstan was born on 26 July 1882 at Donald, the son of a Cornish gold rush immigrant. After moving to Queensland to work on the family farm, Albert returned to Victoria and became a wheat and sheep farmer, as well as Member of the Legislative Assembly after winning a seat in the 1920 elections. He remained a member of the Victorian Farmers Union which later became the Victorian Country Party, taking a leading during the turbulent role political era of the 1930s and 40s.

With the support of the Labour party, Arthur Dunstan's was VCP sworn into Government on April 1935, with him remaining as Premier 1945. until Two maior achievements were the removal of the Royal Melbourne Hospital to a large new site in Parkville and the sale of Crown Land at Fishermen's Bend to General Motors-Holden Ltd. With his eye always on rural areas, he provided for a continuance direct of concessions to primary producers in respect of payments for losses on soldier and closer settlement, reduction of railway freight charges on certain primary products and alleviation of costs and expenses connected with the destruction of vermin and noxious weeds.

In 1947 Dunstan entered a Liberal Country Party composite ministry as Minister



of Health but spent the last two years of his life as a private member. He had just returned from a three-day tour of his electorate when he collapsed and died of coronary vascular disease at his Camberwell home on 14 April 1950. He was survived by his wife and children and was cremated after a state funeral.

Queen's Prize to Alister Larmour

Birchip Rifle Club member Alister Larmour, of Charlton, has won the prestigious Victorian Queen's Prize in F open class on the Wellsford Rifle Range in Bendigo.

The Queen's Prize was held over three days and eight stages on April 16, 17 and 18. The two days before the Queen's Prize are set aside for "The Syme", often referred to as the warm up for the Queen's. Alister finished in fourth place in "The Syme" in a field of Australia's top F open class shooters. Day one of the Queen's series consists of 2 shoots at 500 yards and one at 600 yards. At the end of day one Alister was in 12th place. Day two of the competition is shot over 700, 800 and 900 yards. Alister finished first at 700, second at 800 and fourth at 900, to take out the Day two aggregate. Day three was shot over 900 and 1000 yards, with Alister finishing sixth in the day three aggregate. Alister's consistency over the three days saw him finish in first place and take out the Queen's Prize in F open class, with a score of 474.44, from Albert van Wyk of Rosedale with 474.39, and in third place, Frog Lowe of Goondiwindi with 474.37. It is believed to be the first time that a Queen's Prize has been taken out by a rifle shooter from this area since the late G. W. Letts won the Victorian King's Prize at Williamstown in 1949. Alister also placed third in the "Perce Pavey", which is the aggregate over the full 5 days of the competition. Birchip club members were following Alister's progress throughout the 5 days, and the text line was very busy. All were proud of his achievements, as they all know how hard he has worked and how dedicated Alister is to his shooting. To win a Queen's Prize is an outstanding achievement, and there could not be a more deserving winner. Well done, Alister.



Donation of Sporting Trophy to Geelong Heritage Centre

Last year, when COVID rendered sport all but extinct, I wrote an article on a cricketing trophy which had been in my family ever since I could remember. The silver embellished emu-egg, which had spent most of its life in a cupboard, had no apparent connection to my family (none of whom had played cricket) and was something of a curiosity. Reluctant to see it continue to languish unappreciated (except for its decorative appeal), I contacted the Geelong Heritage Centre as a starting point to see if it could be returned, at least to the region from whence it came.

The Heritage Centre expressed considerable interest in the item and plans were put in place to donate it to their collection. However, as COVID lockdowns came into force and restrictions were amplified, what should have been a simple transfer suddenly became complicated as businesses were reduced to skeleton operations or were closed indefinitely. Each time a window of opportunity appeared for the hand-over to take place, other obstacles brought further delays, until it looked as if the trophy was destined to remain with me forever!

Finally, two days before Easter this year, I had the pleasure of meeting with the Manager of the Geelong Heritage Centre, Mr Mark Beasley, and officially delivered the trophy to its new home. (Mark is the brother of Birchip's Brendan Beasley).

The article which follows (reproduced with permission from the Geelong Heritage Centre) explains the processes employed to research the background of the trophy and how it most likely came into my family's possession.

(And, in an interesting aside – the hotel at which the trophy presentation took place in 1887 still exists and continues to operate its trade today. In 2012 Darryn Lyons, the flamboyant celebratory photographer and former Geelong Mayor, became its licensee).

The Geelong Heritage Centre has welcomed the donation of a rare and quirky piece of local cricketing history, in the form of a silver emu egg trophy awarded to the Caption of the South Geelong Cricket Club in 1886.

Cr Ron Nelson, Chair of the Geelong Regional Library Corporation, said the Geelong Heritage Centre is always grateful for donations of this kind.

"This trophy is believed to be one of the earliest known Geelong cricket trophies presented to the champion team of the season. We're proud to be able to include this piece of local cricketing history as part of our extensive heritage collections," Cr Nelson said.

Engraving on the trophy shows that it was presented to South Geelong Cricket Club Captain, Mr. T Bullen, upon winning the 1886-1887 season of the Junior Cricket Clubs of Geelong and District. Research shows the trophy was presented by Duckworth and Fox of Moorabool Street, which at the time was operating as a men's barber establishment and would in time branch into selling sporting goods and also offered a place for local sporting clubs to hold meetings.

A *Geelong Advertiser* article from 2 September 1887 reports on the awarding of the trophy:

The fourth annual meeting of the South Geelong Cricket Club was held last evening at the Elephant & Castle Hotel...The club had succeeded in 9 out of 13 games played, one of the remaining four having been drawn and three lost. The cup presented for the competition by Messrs Duckworth and Fox had been secured with seven points out of a possible eight, and it had been decided to present it and also an oil painting donated by Mr T. Impey to Mr T. Bullen, captain of the team.

Geelong Heritage Centre Manager Mark Beasley, delved into the Heritage Centre's archives to find out more about the background story of the trophy.

He said, "Researching the story behind

historical items is like a treasure hunt; it requires patience, curiosity and occasionally thinking a bit outside the square. The team and I accessed the many resources available in the Heritage Centre including the Geelong rates records indexes, the *Geelong Advertiser* index, the 1890/91 Geelong & District Directory, Ancestry and more."

"The story behind this beautiful trophy has many layers, some that remain a mystery. For example, which Geelong jeweler created this trophy for a reported price of five pounds? It could well be famous footballer and watchmaker Charles Brownlow, who was creating pieces like this trophy at the time," Mr Beasley said.

The GRLC is grateful to Ms Jenny Pollard of Teddywaddy in North Western Victoria, who contacted the Heritage Centre to offer the donation of the trophy. Ms Pollard recalls the trophy from her grandparents' house, which was on Bellarine Street in South Geelong. In discussing the trophy's origins with Mr Beasley, Ms Pollard remembered her grandparents referring to a neighbour as 'Old Tom'. Extensive record searches revealed that South Geelong Cricket Club Captain, Mr T Bullen, was in fact their neighbour and suggests this is how the trophy ended up with Ms Pollard's grandparents.

The emu egg trophy can be viewed at the Geelong Heritage Centre, Victoria's largest regional archive and resource centre.
