Forging Partnerships Through Traditions

In a week which began with World Baking Day, it was appropriate that the presentation of books devoted to cookery and home hints took place at the Buloke Shire

Two things which Covid lockdowns reignited was a revival in home cooking and an urge to spring clean the home, so the addition of "how-to-guides" - especially from the Country Women's Association of Victoria Inc. (CWA) – is a welcome contribution towards building the Library's resources.

A discussion between CWA East Wimmera Group President, Cheryl Kemp, (who is also a member of the Library review committee) and Buloke Shire Manager of Community Services, Mark Remnant, resulted in the Shire purchasing four books recently published by the CWA of Victoria.

In partnership with the local Charlton

CWA Branch, Cabbaritta, the transaction has forged a partnership between the various entities which has the potential to offer

growth and support into the future.

Presenting two copies of "From Our Kitchen to Yours -185 Favorite Recipes from CWA Victoria", plus two copies of "Thrifty Household – Hints and Tips" (by Noela MacLeod AO) Buloke Mayor, Daryl Warren, said it was the traditions of good cookery encompassed by the CWA which were highlighted.

A mean cook himself, whose name regularly appears amongst the prizewinners at the Donald Show, Cr. Warren said the CWA traditions show the serious attitude which country people take about doing things well.

The ability to bake sponges, fruitcakes, ginger fluffs and scones - all trademark staples of CWA - were the skills which earmark a good cook, Cr. Warren said.

Mark Remnant said the addition of these books was greatly appreciated by the library, and also emphasized the benefits of strengthening partnerships between the Shire service organisations. connections and opening pathways is important, especially for offering support during times of need".

CWA East Wimmera Group President, Cheryl Kemp, thanked Cabbaritta for their involvement in the purchase, saying the work of CWA addresses many needs for people across an array of issues.

"CWA has a strong focus in small communities, and we value the strengthening of networks to ensure this continues and grows," she said.

Royalties from the sale of every book contribute to the ongoing work undertaken by CWA Victoria.

Our feature story this month is a poem that tells of an incident that occurred in Wychitella back in the days of 6 o'clock closing of licensed premises, which was vigorously enforced by the local constabulary.

Wychitella Pub Raid

Have you heard of any trouble, That has been brewing about, You have heard about the Police raid, In the local pub no doubt. Now I will tell you what has happened, Though the news is far from new, It will give you some idea,

Our local man was Hurley, John, And Lawrence by the way, And Eddie Keith, he was there, And Frank McKin-e-lay And from Charlton East there came, A man called Mr Day, Who gave us full instructions, The wherefore and the way. Long 'ere we met, the night was cold, And after closing hours, If my memory serves me right, We'd had some bitter showers, We felt the cold, our hair was thin, And with chins so clearly shaved, The landlord came and asked us in, I think our lives he saved. So if a traveller you should be, Or wander from your home, You'll find for hospitality, John Foley stands alone. He led us to a big fine room, And we felt quite at home, With Edward Grose placed in the chair, We all got on the phone. We spoke of poles, of wire, of gauge, And listened to instructions sage, Mac spoke so kind of Miss McFarlane, I think she must be someone's darling. Our room, but soon, its door was opened, We heard a voice we thought was joking, Saying the Police are here, don't cause alarm,

'Calder Convoy' Conquers Charlton

A veritable truck "city" sprang up at Charlton Park on 15/16 May as a cavalcade of transports rolled into town for the second "Calder Convoy".

In what was a big weekend for Charlton, the convoy, along with the second "Ok Motels" (Contemporary Arts + Music in Small Towns) event created a real "buzz" with an influx of visitors boosting the local population.

The debut "Calder Convoy" in 2018 generated such success that a repeat was ear -marked for 2020, however the advent of Covid meant an enforced cancellation until such time as the trip could safely be reinstated.

Coinciding with National Motoring Heritage Day on Sunday (16 May), the convoy is organized by the Tractor Restoration & Appreciation Club of Sunraysia, (TRACS) with enthusiasts travelling the Old Calder, starting from Calder Park North-bound and passing through the small townships which are now by-passed by the new highway. The event concludes in Red Cliffs.

An occasion to celebrate the significance of the transport route between Mildura and Melbourne, the road trip offers participants a chance to reminisce and recount stories of trucking days on this vital commercial link.

Growing from around 40 trucks in 2018, this year's event saw a massive increase to 80 plus vehicles, all of which have to be 25 years or older. For the real antiques, a leisurely ride on a flat-top or trailer means they can still be part of the action, as well as showcase the past and provide a talking point for restoration enthusiasts.

TRACS committee member, Robert Mansel, put this year's increased attendance down to the Covid lockdowns, saying that people were tired of having been cooped up and just wanted to get out again.

"We offer a pretty laid-back and casual weekend," Robert said. "People can make their own pace, as long they get to Charlton by 3pm, and the event isn't too structured or over-organised. We get a lot of positive comments from participants about that".

Despite a short lead-in time for the 2021 event, Robert praised the trucking clubs for their support through advertising the weekend on their social media outlets or websites.

Charlton is seen as the geographic base for the overnight stop for the journey, offering multiple opportunities for travellers to do either part of the route, the whole trip (Melbourne to Red Cliffs), or just joining in at Charlton or on the next stage of the journey.

With the convoy heading north following

breakfast on Sunday, a lunch break at the lake at Ouyen provided an opportunity for participants to be joined by members of the Mildura Car Club. From there the travellers could make their way home, or continue on to Red Cliffs, where an appreciation day involving a number of activities was to be held on Monday.

The committee tasked with bringing the "Convoy" to fruition includes TRACS members, Robert Mansel, John Porker, Jack Droffelaar, "Moose" Johnston and Frank Wallace. Working in consultation with Charlton contacts, the Saturday stopover was filled with camaraderie as the travelers set up camps and locals dropped by to take





St Joseph's Community - The Aussie Camino

A month ago Anne Kenny and I set off to walk the Aussie Camino. How did this come about? Pope Francis declared this year the year of Saint Joseph and called on people all around the world to honour Saint Joseph. He himself has a great devotion to the saint and describes him as 'the man who goes unnoticed'. He believes Joseph saw the tender love of God, accepting the way things are and allowing miracles to happen.

The Aussie Camino is dedicated to Australia's first saint Mary MacKillop. Her influence was particularly strong in south eastern Australia as it was here that she discovered her love of teaching and was drawn to found the order of Josephites. So, as we walked the Camino we would honour both these saints.

Many people would know about the Spanish Camino or the Way of Saint James but maybe not as many would know about the Aussie Camino. It was started by Luke Mills, a Melbourne teacher who was inspired by the film 'The Way'. Luke, with friends designed an Aussie 'Way' following Mary MacKillop's work in Portland and her journey to Penola where she set up her first school for needy children in a stable.

Luke led several Caminos establishing and refining the route, writing the handbook and the passport and his wonderful groundwork has made it easier for others to follow. He believes the Camino transformed his life and helped him keep going after the death of his wife. He hopes many people will be challenged to follow in his footsteps.

So Anne and I booked our places in the Pilgrimage and began two months of training! A week before we left for Portland we went to Melbourne to the Mary MacKillop Centre to receive our passports, our shells, which would be clipped to our backpacks, and meet the other pilgrims. We also learnt much about Mary MacKillop and left inspired, and keen to live up to the challenge Luke had set.

We were a group of sixteen, including our spiritual guide Fr Justin Driscoll, Nick our professional guide, Roger our driver, and eleven other

pilgrims from Ballarat and district. It was a great group of people with diverse backgrounds and interests and over the ten days of our walk we would get to know each other quite well.

The scenery was magnificent with cliff-top walking and beach walking, with beautiful seascapes and landscapes. It was great to be out in nature for six to eight hours every day. Some of the walking was tough, soft sand, many steps, dunes to climb, but it was balanced by easy walking on hard sand and wading with our boots around

our necks. Then along country roads in awe of the beautiful red gums and park-like paddocks.

The accommodation varied and it was like a blast from the past when three of us shared a room – lots of talk and lots of fun. But the stories and experiences will need time to resonate and bring out. For now it's enough to say it was something I'll remember always and I feel very privileged to have had the opportunity to walk the Aussie Camino. I must say Anne and I are pretty proud of ourselves for walking the whole 200 kilometres!

Service Award For Janet

Volunteer involvement with Red Cross for ten years and deployment across multiple emergency situations saw Charlton resident, Janet Stafford receive a Red Cross Service Award at Government House, Melbourne during May.

The hand-over of the small badge encapsulated Janet's farreaching involvement across numerous traumatic and emergency incidents, where a steady hand and empathetic responses were required.

Officiating at the Government House ceremony was the Patron of Red Cross, Anthony Howard (AM QC) - husband of the current, Governor of Victoria, the Hon. Linda Dessau (AC).

Outlining Janet's strong community commitment, her citation emphasized hard work, organizational skills and ability to empower team members to use initiative and encourage decision-making when needed. Leadership, strong values and a care for the volunteers with whom she works were additional qualities praised within the commendation.

Janet joined the Red Cross as an Emergency Services volunteer following the 2011 floods which devasted Charlton, contributing her skills as a volunteer in the local community Relief Centre.

In 2017 she helped provide Psychological First Aid (PFA) to victims of the Bourke Street Mall attack, and offered similar support to victims of the Townsville floods in 2019.

In late 2019 / early 2020 Janet took part in three deployments to the bushfire-ravaged east of Victoria, working as a Team Leader at Bairnsdale, dealing with evacuees from across the fire damaged areas.

Living on the family's cabin cruiser based at Paynesville,

Janet commuted to Bairnsdale for her four day deployments which were interspersed by three day breaks.

"We were taking care of huge volumes of very traumatized people," Janet said, "all of whom needed care at the same time. I had never experienced anything like it, and coupled with that, the smoke was horrendous."

Being mindful of the overwhelming impact on the helpers, Janet explained that Red Cross do a "brilliant job" of ensuring that their volunteers are looked after and are okay. "As a Team Leader, I also needed to ensure that my team were coping and dealing with things at all times."

Janet assumed a leadership role when the Charlton Branch transitioned to Friends of Red Cross, and is a key driver of the Trauma Teddy program as a coordinator in the local region. She was accompanied to the award ceremony by her husband, Philip, and the couple later shared a celebratory lunch with family.
