

Golden Grains Museum News

Hello to everyone from the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. It is hard to believe that half the year has already passed us by. The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is pleased to announce a new service. For just \$10.00 we will scan and securely store an A4 size archival envelope of papers recording your family's story. This could include copies of photographs, family trees, written histories or similar items. These will be recorded on our database and available to view at a later date by researchers of your family or those with an interest in the district. We are fortunate to have a few recorded stories by members of pioneer families telling of the early days of the district and important information on family members' lives. They are a great reference of life back in those times.

As we are still very much focused on our community's safety due to the Corona virus, records held from 100 years ago from the district's Health Inspector to the Commission on Public Health in 1921 give a snapshot of what worried Charlton's 1031 residents. Mr W. Healey, who was also the district's inspector for Roads, Works and Thistle, Dog Registrar, in his report listed the slaughter house 1.5 miles upstream on the Avoca, and no arrangements for the removal of household refuse of concern. More concerning was the discovery of Saltpeter (potassium nitrate) in a sample of sausage tested, which could cause kidney damage, anaemia, headaches and digestive distress. Arrangements were made with Wycheproof Hospital to remove as many as necessary Charlton Hospital to ease the

strain there. Reported were 35 cases of Diphtheria, 27 cases of Scarlet fever, one and Tuberculosis of one Typhoid Fever. 14 notices were issued for unclean yards. Mr Healey did make note of the town's efforts in trying to obtain a clean water supply from Lake Lonsdale (near Stawell), but that had been unsuccessful to date.

In an effort to fight off typhoid in 1923, the use of phenyl had a disastrous effect on the local fish population. (East Charlton Tribune 28/02/1923).

SAVE THE FISH

It is distressing to note the effects of phenyle in the town waters of the Avoca, where fish which the ordinary angler only dreams of (up to three pounds in weight) tiring of life, float sidewise, with a list of 45 degrees, prior to turning on their hack and giving up the ghost. No doubt with the best intentions of keeping typhoid as low down as possible on the scale of local mortality, the Charlton Shire Council has been purging the guiters with disinfectants, which find their way into the river to the bewilderment of the fish. After a short spell of erratic movement and frantic swimming to escape they turn on their sides, and eventually float bottom up in a state of piscatorial coma. This is the province of the Shire Council to bring about as a secondary symptom, showing that the guiters have been cleansed. If the local branch of the Isaac Waltonian Society would go to the trouble of netting the invalids and take them up stream and give them a sporting chance of life, the society mentioned would be worthy of a vote of thanks from a typical public meeting of five, inclusive of the gentleman in the chair.

With the colder evenings our regular Bingo Bus has not been making the trip to Donald. Keep an eye open for details on when the group will be again making the trip across to support our fundraising efforts.

Another way the museum raises much needed funds is through research for

individuals. Many enquiries for family history are received from around Australia, and we are often able to provide images and newspaper clippings for these requests. If you want to find out information about your family or home address contact any of the people listed below.

The museum has been pleased to accept many fine donations recently relating to Charlton, and these are now recorded into our system, catalogued and either put on display or stored for future reference or exhibition by our volunteers. Recently, sisters, Carmel Bartlett, Patricia Arnel, Evelyn Pole and Kathleen Wenn (nee McKenna), donated a gramophone which was used by the McKenna family in the past. This is a fantastic addition to our collection and we appreciate their generosity. Nola Wright also recently donated a treasure trove of items belong to the Wright family and we will feature some of these treasures in the future. Please always consider the historic relevance of items to our town if you are having a clean-up at home. A number of terrific items in our museum have been saved last minute

from landfill by people thinking that old ashtray, calendar or bottle opener from a long gone Charlton business may be of some interest.

The museum is always looking for more new members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact museum; you will be made most welcome. You can also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of historic items.

When the Charlton Club was first constituted in 1900, with Ben Green as the inaugural president, the male only establishment would have been aghast at the thought there would be a female president in its future. For its first 100 years it remained staunchly a male only venue. However, in an effort to boost membership and become more inclusive, the Club's constitution was changed to allow female members.

Following the 2011 flood, the Club struggled for a period and was close to closing down. Fortunately it survived this difficult period. The Charlton Club is now fully run by volunteers and over recent years has had an influx of new members, many of then new to the town. The Club is now much more community minded and encourages locals and visitors to drop in on a Friday night from 5pm. A well stocked bar, snacks, pool, darts, meat raffles, winners draw and great company are all on offer. The newly created outdoor area at the rear of the Club hints at some pleasant evenings to come in the warmer months.

The Club recently celebrated its 121st Birthday on the 21st May. Brian Mulquiny, one of the Club's Life Members, and twice Club President, had the honour of cutting the cake.

Charlton Junior Football

Five Charlton boys represented the NCFL and AFLCV in Mildura on Monday 28th and Tuesday 29th June at the U15 VLine Cup Carnival.

Hunter Connolly, Harry Conroy, Elliott Fitzpatrick, Nick Thompson and Ned Zagame played two games each day at Quandong Park in Red Cliffs.

Two AFL Central Victoria teams (44 players) were selected from a training session in Inglewood and on their performances at club level. Other regions involved in the carnival with one team each were Central Murray, Sunraysia and

Goulburn Murray. These regions make up the Bendigo Pioneers catchment area.

Following the conclusion of this carnival, a squad of 55-60 players will be selected as the training squad for the Bendigo Pioneers Division 1 and 2 sides, who will play in the U/15 V/Line Cup Carnival in Shepparton on September 20th-23rd. This squad will be made up of players from AFL Central Victoria, AFL Goulburn Murray, AFL Central Vic Navy (Central Murray) and AFL Sunraysia. These are just a few examples of what has been happening behind the scenes, that perhaps many locals and travellers weren't aware of.

The Annual Woosang Cup

Wedderburn has claimed this year's holding of the Woosang Cup, played annually between traditional Calder Highway rivals, Charlton and Wedderburn.

Tom Finlay, of Charlton, was adjudged best on field and awarded the Pappos Medal for his achievement, despite playing in the losing side.

In a game that would greatly aid Charlton's aspiration of securing a final-four berth, the Wedderburn Redbacks had all the answers.

Kicking with the aid of the temperature dropping breeze, the 'Burners were first on the scoreboard and, through cleaner ball use, were able to hurt Charlton on the turnover, and open a handy three-goal break at the end of the first term.

Charlton's Navy Blues had their chances but were regularly picked off across half back. Jordan Hargreaves constantly dropped back behind play in the ruck, aiding his defensive flankers, Jackson Guan and Tim Leahy in stifling Charlton's forward advances and starving Rhys Thompson and Joe McGrath of supply.

At the other end of the ground, Ben DeAraugo proved dangerous all day, utilising his

strengths, and preventing Dean McKay from providing his usual offensive run and distribution from the last line of defence.

Charlton began the second term strongly, looking to use the wind advantage to its fullest. ruck duel proved The intriguing, neither opposition ruckman - Charlton's Angus McKenzie nor Wedderburn's Jordan Hargreaves — able to win clean hit outs. However, Charlton's joint coach, Aaron Walklate, ball magnet Tom Finlay and centreman Ben Walklate began getting on top at the stoppages and driving forward, Anthony Charlton Judd and Joe McGrath finishing off the good work up the ground with goals, to have Charlton in the hunt.

Not to be denied, the Redbacks rallied in front of their home crowd, Jordan Rosengren becoming an important target while resting forward, taking a number of strong marks and, despite kicking into the breeze, Wedderburn had more scoring shots and managed to maintain a 16- point buffer at half-time.

The third term proved to be a scrap. The football was not pretty and at times resembled a rugby scrum, and both sides tried to do whatever they could to keep the ball moving in their direction. It was almost nine minutes into the term before Wedderburn's Tom Campbell registered the first goal of the quarter.

Wedderburn went one rotation and on-baller down during the term, when the impressive Rosengren limped from the field, it seemed to have little impact, though, and in fact released Guan from half back into the midfield, where he influential became very throughout the remainder of the game. The Redbacks extended their lead to a little over four goals after DeAraugo converted to kick the third of his four goals of the day.

Finlay and McKenzie tried hard to lift their Charlton team, finding plenty of the ball and working tirelessly around the ground and. when youngster Charlie Patullo kicked a booming goal into the breeze, it seemed as though the momentum may have been turning, heading into the three-quarter time break.

Charlton continued to hold sway to start the last, buoyed by having the breeze at its back and the majority of possession. The Navies were let down by their biggest enemy of the day – their skills, a number of near misses at goal proving costly. However, when Finlay kicked

truly at the fifteen-minute mark, Charlton looked like it was a chance to run down the Redbacks, bridging the gap to just 14 points. A clanger in the defensive arc put paid to that, leading to a Wedderburn goal and sucking the wind out of the Charlton sails. Corey Lowry and Mitchell McEwen were running themselves into the ground, to ensure Charlton remained at arm's length, DeAraugo kicking his fourth after the final siren to see the Redbacks run out 26-point victors and lift the Woosang Cup.

ear of St Joseph

(December 8, 2020-December 8, 2021)

In this year of St Joseph we include a brief summary of St Joseph's Parish, Charlton and the Parish Priests.

The Parish of Charlton was established in 1885. In those days priests travelled throughout the area on horseback, or by horse and buggy, over unmade roads and winding bush tracks, trusting to the hospitality of the people, the pioneers from whom they were assured a cordial welcome.

St Joseph's first Parish Priest was Fr

Michael Costello, with his brother Fr Pat as assistant priest. Their presbytery was in High St until 1922 when the present one in Learmonth St was opened and blessed.



These pioneer priests travelled to towns such as,

Birchip, Quambatook, Lalbert, Sea Lake and even from Swan Hill to Mildura (by boat on the Murray).

After 15 years enduring the overpowering heat of summer and the penetrating winter winds, Fr Michael was physically unable to continue with the work in such a large parish and was transferred to Colac. Three years later he returned to his beloved County Kerry and died there in 1916.

Costello



was replaced by a comparatively young but vigorous priest, the Rev. Edward O'Sullivan Goidanich. Fr Goidanich worked zealously and successfully and had the satisfaction of seeing a new brick church built in 1907, replacing the 32 year old wooden building which was moved about

40 yards. Fr Goidanich took a keen interest in all sport but especially golf. He was instrumental in building the footbridge across the Avoca River which was known as Fr Guy's bridge.

Fr Guy volunteered for service in 1915 and served as a chaplain. He was with the troops at Gallipoli where he was wounded and awarded the Military Cross. After being Parish Priest at St Joseph's for about 12 years, shortly after his return from military service, he was

transferred to Port Fairy.

The third Parish Priest at St Joseph's was Fr Cornelius Kelly. Fr Kelly was concerned children's the about spiritual welfare and their role in the future of the parish. A Catholic school had been in



existence for years, with about 60 pupils under the supervision of lay teachers. A new brick school hall was completed in 1922, at the same time the new presbytery was built. In 1924 the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions arrived to take over the care of the school. Α new convent accommodate the Sisters and female boarders was completed in 1930. Dean Kelly's health failed in 1949 and he died on the 48th anniversary of his ordination. He is buried in the Charlton Cemetery. He spent 31 years in the Charlton Parish.

In 1950 Fr Charles Mulcahy arrived to

take over as Parish Priest. He had been assistant to Dean Kelly back in 1913 for 4 years. In 1959 a new four roomed school building was erected and later a further two rooms were added. Fr Mulcahy died in 1968



and was remembered as "a humble and lovable man, a capable administrator and organiser .. who knew all his parishioners."

Fr Bill Melican had been assistant priest



from 1965 and was appointed administrator after Fr Mulcahy's death. He had the difficult task

of implementing a Parish Planned Giving Program but, with the whole hearted support of the parishioners, he

left shortly after knowing he had admirably fulfilled this task.

1968 In Cornelius Healy was appointed Parish Priest. This was a time of change to the Liturgy. In 1968 he over saw the farewell to the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions, who departed after Charlton of devoted



service. He also organised the special celebration of Sr Margaret Spain's Final Profession. This was the first time in the parish history for such an event. He was responsible for the building of the Science Laboratory which was opened in 1969. He was transferred to Donald in 1973 and in 1980 retired to Ballarat where he died in 1981.

Fr Michael Kehoe arrived in 1973. The two Home Economic classrooms were built during his time in Charlton. He played an excellent game of golf and before long The Priest's Golf Day became a popular annual

event in Charlton. In 1978 he moved to Camperdown but ill health compelled him to resign. He died in 1980.

Our next Parish Priest was Fr John Martin - our first "bikie" priest. He nicknamed "The Fonz" by the school children. Fr Martin was only here a short time



and transferred to Colac.



Fr Coffey arrived in and replaced by Fr Paul Mercovich in 1984. Fr Mercovich had an association active with schools education. He was an early member of the Diocesan Board and a

member of the Country Education Program. He was transferred in 1987 but later returned to the area as Parish Priest of St Arnaud. After his departure Frs Dennehy, Peck, Welsh & Claridge filled the position. In 2000 Fr Mercovich also became Parish Priest of St Joseph's and was Parish Priest at the time of his death in 2017.

Since 2018 and the amalgamation with the East Wimmera Parish, St Joseph's has been serviced by Fr Eugene McKinnon and Fr Jerry Prunty. By Anne Kenny



Keep our line truly plumb?

I remember seeing one of these in my grandfather's toolbox and not knowing what it was? A plumb line, but also known as a 'plumb -bob'.

At first I thought that it was a weight out of a pendulum clock but was advised by those older and wiser than me, that it was used to measure walls and buildings to ensure that they were vertical. It is pretty simple, but this makes it even more remarkable. By attaching a heavy weight to the end of a cord and attaching the other end at an appropriate height, due to the force of gravity, this line will be pulled tight, establishing a vertical or plumb line, a point of reference for construction.

In the scripture readings below, the prophets remind us that the plumb line can be used to measure other things, like justice and righteousness.

And the LORD said to me, "Amos, what do you see?" And I [Amos] said, "A plumb line." Amos 7:7

So maybe this antique measure still has a purpose today?

"I will make justice the measuring line and righteousness

the plumb line" Isaiah 28:17
Justice and righteousness, as a line, provide a tool for the building up of communities, to measure where they stand tall and upright and uplift those within and without, with compassion and respect. Justice and righteousness is a commitment to the common good, behold, the Lord doing the right thing, not just for ourselves, but for everyone. If we are true to the measure, they should wall built with a plumb be embedded into a community. Ine. with a plumb line And the result??...

And may "justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" Amos 5:24




