CHARTSEC Lobbying Continues

Ripon MP, Louise Staley has pledged to continue advocacy for the Charlton Traffic Safe-Education Centre's (CHARTSEC) much-needed classroom upgrade following an on-site visit to the complex during July.

Ms. Staley, who previously raised the issue in Parliament earlier this year, met with staff and students, and was briefed on the proposal to replace the ageing infrastructure which is no longer serviceable for the facility's growing needs.

The current instruction room - formerly the old Charlton Police Station - was moved to the complex in 1999. Now more than 60 years old, the building is too small for the increasing number of students attending the facility, lacks adequate amenities and is non-compliant for all-ability access.

CHARTSEC is seeking funding of around \$360,000 to purchase a 5 module building which will provide a modern, compliant and more serviceable structure.

The proposed upgrade would see an 18m x 10m building, purpose fitted to include a large classroom, toilets, staff kitchen/social room, a store room and visiting staff work area. The all-abilities access would be set up to comply with Charlton's flood level guidelines.

"CHARTSEC runs an invaluable local driver education program that has been accessed by students across Victoria for over 30 years", Ms. Staley said. "Driving on country roads can be incredibly dangerous for inexperienced young people, and this program does a wonderful job preparing local kids to drive safely and responsibly."

"It is currently operating out of an unsuitable old building. I have raised this matter in Parliament previously, and will do so again, calling on the Andrews Labor Government to fund this vital program."

Ms. Staley indicated she would be undertaking a social media campaign, along with placing an adjournment (Member's statement) to parliament on the issue, as well as writing to the Treasurer to advance CHARTSEC's needs.

Ms. Staley took time to chat with students during her visit, before taking a drive around the complex. She also discussed plan details with CHARTSEC Manager, John Harley, and Charlton Principal, College Kelvin Baird.

The facility, which is run under the auspices and control of the Charlton College School Council, provides part-time employment for 8-10 people, and brings around 700 students and their teachers into the town each year, creating an economic boost for traders.

Opened in 1988, CHARTSEC's precursor was a Traffic Safety program provided by the North Central TAFE which serviced the needs of the 7 local schools as well as 2-3 additional schools which attended on a block-release basis.

The plan to construct a dedicated facility on school land close to the TAFE evolved in 1987 with the centre's construction and development resulting largely from considerable input of volunteer labor. Over the ensuing years additions have boosted the facility's capabilities, which has an outreach to around 40 schools from Melbourne to Murrayville, and across much of the western half of Victoria.

The centre's application for funding through the Minor Capital Works Fund through the Department of Education, was successful earlier this year.

See you on Sunday August 15 at Charlton Park for a 1.30 pm start, but be early to check in and get a good seat.



Golden Grains Museum News

Hello to everyone from the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. The COVID lockdown had put a temporary halt to our continuing work at the museum and receiving visitors to view our amazing collection, but be assured we are open again now.

As we rely on our own means to raise funds, the Bingo Bus to Donald has previously been of great benefit to the museum. With the colder months and COVID this source has been unable to be obtained. We have introduced a new service however, where for just \$10.00 we will scan and securely store an A4 size archival envelope of papers recording your family's story. This could include copies of family trees, photographs, written histories or similar items. These will recorded on our database and available to view at a later date by researchers of your family or those with an interest in the district. Please note, no originals please; copies only. Also if you would like to find more details out about your Charlton history, for a nominal charge the museum may be able to assist. Enquire by contacting one of the numbers below.

This ties in with this month's feature story. As previously mentioned, the Charlton Golden Grains Museum holds many family records, diaries, stories and images relating to past residents. This month we are looking at a recollection by Charlton pharmacist, Mr Clarke, to his daughter late in his life telling of their time in the town in the early 1930's. By this time he had lost his eye sight and typed his story in braille. He writes his story for a time when his family members may return to Charlton to see where they lived and worked, describing the buildings to notice as they enter the town, the various streets and shops. He has many fond memories of the various shop keepers, and asks in his letter if his best regards can be passed on to those still there, or whose sons and daughters may now have taken over. Mention is made of Noske Bros, Luth's Big Store, East Charlton Hotel, A.N.Z. and C.B.C Banks, Flockhart's Hotel, Dabron's Foundry, Richards' Barber Shop, Doctor Baker and Post Office. He specifically asked if his family could visit the Pharmacy and purchase a 6d packet of Aspros and "tell the chap behind the counter he would

probably have prescription books with your father's writing in them". Also, to enquire if Sister Dew still lived in Charlton and to make themselves known to her.

Next, he describes in detail their home in Kaye Street which still exists; the fourth house from High Street on the left side, although the three blocks were unbuilt on. The home was timber with a tile roof, with 3 concrete steps to the front veranda. A wooden picket fence about 3 foot high and a garage out the back of the house and grape vines. Also mentioned is the Avoca River which could either be empty of water or close to flood, and to take care on the unsurfaced roads as the clay soil is very slippery and easy to get bogged in.

In a tender addition, Mr Clarke's wife has hand written at the bottom, "Dad drove me up to the Bush Nursing Hospital at 11am on the 26th April and you were born at 2:30pm. I remember kissing your soft, pink, tiny little face when Sister Dew brought you to me. I thought you looked like a rose, as

your face was pink, so I called you Roselyn."

In closing, the museum is always looking for more new members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection. No experience is necessary and you can give as much or as little time each month as you wish. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. You can also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of historic items.

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'Screen' Funding for the Rex Theatre

Charlton's Rex Theatre is one of five Mallee independent cinemas to receive funding from the Federal Government's Supporting Cinemas' Retention Endurance and Enhancement of Neighbourhood (SCREEN) Fund.

The Rex allocation of \$35,000 offers support to independent cinemas in their recovery from significant declines in revenue due to Covid-19. The Rex was closed from 23 March 2020 until 6 February 2021.

The Minister for Communications, Urban Infrastructure, Cities and the Arts, the Hon Paul Fletcher MP, said more than \$8.7 million had now been allocated for 158 independent cinemas across the country.

"Independent cinemas are so important to the social and cultural health of our communities in Australia, which is why we acted quickly to introduce our \$20 million SCREEN Fund," Minister Fletcher said.

Federal Member for Mallee, Dr Anne Webster said she was pleased to announce the successful Mallee recipients, which also included Showbiz Cinemas Swan Hill, Maryborough Paramount Theatre, The Centre Cinema, Horsham, and the Wallis Deakin Cinema, Mildura. The former each reached received \$35,000 and the latter, \$60,000.

Dr Webster said funds would enable these independent cinemas to keep operating during a period of severe disruption, "which is important to the fabric of our community."

Commenting on the announcement, Chair of the Rex Board, Hayden McKinnon said the funding was a welcome boost following the Covid closure of 2020.

"These funds will be a great help in recovering from last year's lockdown and non operation," Hayden said.

Hayden also acknowledged the support offered by Independent Cinemas Australia for their advocacy on behalf of the independents, saying the organization was instrumental in lobbying for assistance for these outlets across the country. "We are grateful for their continued and ongoing support," he said.

The SCREEN funding will help to keep the projectors rolling as people enjoy a lowcost, Covid-safe means of entertainment within their community.

The event coordinator Garry Larmour said, "with the success of the Static Car display at the 2019 Swap Meet, supported by the many compliments the Club received after the 2019 event, the Club believes the static display had a significant impact on the success of the event".

year's Swap Meet please contact Kevin Willey, Ross Lane or Garry Larmour who will be very happy to make the necessary arrangements for you.

Garry explained, "The Lions Swap Meet suffered severely several years ago from a bad weather experience however the event has been building up over the past couple of years. The committee believe it is fast becoming a social event not to be missed so we recommend that you put the date in your diary".

The 10th of October will be a fun day in Charlton with hopefully the Swap Meet, the Rotary Art Show and the Garden Club's Garden displays all happening again.





Taking place on the morning Covid lockdown Number 5 was announced, the gathering was strongly supported both by attendees and local traders across the town.

With the cancellation of last year's event, Cabbaritta was doubly pleased to have avoided disappointment again this year and to have secured a good fund -raising outcome as well.

Branch President, Sue Dillon -Walsh and Vice-President, Bernice Kenny said they were grateful for the strong support from their members, town traders and the wider community, with many turning up to share a chat over a cuppa and nibbles.

"So many people are touched by cancer - either directly or indirectly," said Bernice, "and this is an excellent way for everyone to show their support."

Having fundraised for this cause for many years, the industrious CWA ladies baked, served, compiled and distributed orders to ensure this year's success.

As a gesture of true community spirit, former local traders - Bruce Gardner and Annette Sherriff from "Timeless Treasures and Tea Rooms" – donated scones towards the morning tea.

Having run the event themselves when in business, over recent years the pair have worked with CWA, providing a staple which was highly prized in their own outlet.

Bruce's award winning scones gained recognition with a number of first prizes at various shows, so their contribution was warmly welcomed when the two parties merged to run a single town event.

"We had a lot of positive feedback from customers about our scones" said Bruce, "so we saw this contribution as another way of becoming more involved in the town."

While attendees at the event were not short of food choices to supplement their cups of tea or coffee, restraint was probably more of an issue. CWA members had also made a big effort with the donation of numerous attractively presented items for a raffle.

Visitors to the town, Judi and

Grant Beard were in town catching up with relatives and dropped in to support the cause. Judi, as a breast cancer survivor, was keen to share her story as she approaches her 5 year cancer-free milestone.

Having undergone a double mastectomy in 2016, Judi was articulate and passionate about her journey, emphasizing the importance of breast checks and mammograms for the early detection of the disease.

"Women over 50 **NEED** to have their mammograms," she said. "I was just 53 and had two lumps detected. Neither of the lumps could be felt. This was caught early before the cancer had moved into the lymph nodes."

Doing her own research armed her with choices which she was able to discuss with doctors and which aided with the outcome of her treatment and recovery.

Support from partners and family was also of "massive importance" she said, along with a sense of humor – a case made obvious by her T-shirt emblazoned with - "Yes, these are FAKE! My real ones tried to kill me!"

Charlton RSL Mural Story Revealed

The eye-catching mural on the Charlton RSL Sub Branch club rooms is an attraction for locals and visitors alike, but until recently its background and history was not available to the casual traveller.

The striking monotone work painted by St. Arnaud artist, Kyle Torney was completed in 2020 to be part of the commemorations of the 75th Anniversary of the end of WW II in the Pacific. As we all know, the impact of Covid (in Victoria particularly), meant the commemorations as planned could not take place. Nevertheless, the addition of another mural to Charlton's growing street Artscape has greatly enhanced the building, as well as revealing a significant story about the local women's contributions to the home-front during the Second World War.

The work, which features a young woman holding a pair of binoculars, references the Volunteer Air Observers Corps who kept a look-out for enemy planes. Operating from a small, camouflaged building (which is now the camp kitchen at the Gordon Park caravan precinct), the Charlton volunteers were rostered on to record the presence of any approaching aircraft.

The mural also contains a visual tribute to the "girls" of the Australian Women's Land Army (AWLA) who served in rural Australia during the Second World War. Additional figures show women engaged in agricultural work within the flat Wimmera / Mallee landscape.

Charlton RSL affiliate member and Sub-Branch archivist, Markus Phillips said the information panel relating this story had been a part of the original grant application for the execution of the mural. However, due to a shortfall in funding the last piece of the project had had to be put on hold. Charlton Forum then came to the rescue with a contribution, only to be followed shortly

afterwards with the Victorian Government's Department of Veterans Affairs supplying the final tranche of grant funds.

"It is important that this information panel be available for visitors and anyone coming to view the mural," said Markus. "It explains the references within the work, along with profiling the artist and the processes involved in its creation. We are also pleased that recognition for what was a little known story about women's input into the local effort during the Second World War has gained prominence."

The information panel was designed by Reece Hendy (Creative lead at Nacho Station, Bendigo and liaison for both this project and the earlier "Three Walls" mural project in Charlton), while it was printed by local Charlton company "Signwise Solutions". Installed by Charlton local, Clinton Olive, the completed project is a clear representation of community pride in the town's history and support for its local institutions.

"The Charlton RSL Sub-Branch acknowledges the support of the Victorian Government, through the Department of Veterans Affairs, for helping to bring this project to fruition," said Markus. "We also acknowledge the community input to bring this to completion."

The RSL has also carried out refurbishment on the 25 pounder field gun in front of the club room with a repaint in authentic Defence Force colour (the paint was donated by Thales of Bendigo) and the addition of tyres from the Charlton Tyre and Battery Service.

Marathon Miles for Mental Health

A recent visitor to Charlton was Warren Wright - a man on a mission to focus the spotlight on mental health and raise money for Beyond Blue.

In order to achieve that goal, Warren (or "Wazza" as he likes to be called), has set himself the task of walking around Australia to carry this message to the people.

That's a walk of around 40,000 kilometres – and - he's doing it solo, with no escort support, but with a whole lot of passion for encouraging people to stop and share some caring

Backed by Beyond Blue Warren has a dedicated Face-book page chronicling his journey, with around 3,000 followers kept up to date on all stages of his progress. A direct link to the donation page is accessed from there.

Warren arrived in Charlton in early July after trekking up the Calder Highway from Bendigo, through Bridgewater to Wedderburn and then enjoying a "rest day" in Charlton, where he had a well-earned break at the East Charlton Hotel.

Savoring the chance to rest by the East's welcoming fireplace, Warren had met up with a dedicated supporter, Marni Champion from Bendigo, and the pair were doing a catch-up on how Wazza was travelling.

This marathon adventure - which is expected to take him about 3 years to complete - evolved from Warren's own battle with mental health issues and support he received from Beyond Blue. When the chips were down, a call to Beyond Blue made all the difference, where as he says "somebody showed they cared."

With a background in sporting activity, and finding that exercise made him feel better ("it helps clear the mind"), Warren set himself this challenge to help gain more exposure for mental health awareness.

For "company" on this journey, Warren has his "mate" – "Bluey"- his trusty buggy in which all his supplies, including clothes, tent, sleeping bag, first aid kit, repair needs, etc. are packed. While he sometimes has overnight accommodation, but just as often he doesn't, so a

camp off road is what beckons at the end of a long day of walking. And a day's walk can be anything from 20-40 kilometres, depending on the conditions and the terrain.

"Bluey" - (so named because of its blue cover and association with the Beyond Blue organisation) can hold a maximum manageable weight of 45 kilograms. The frame was donated by the Thule company – a manufacturer of pram buggies, roof racks, bike racks - and is just one of the companies which have put their hand up to help make this challenge a success (others can be found on the Facebook page). Warren expects that his current cargo will undergo modification when he prepares for the Nullabor crossing so he can accommodate between 16-20 litres of water to help him through.

Leaving his hometown of Tamworth on 21 September 2020, Warren wended his way south, down through Tasmania, then back through Victoria via Colac (where he was locked down for a while due to Covid restrictions). Now he's heading up the Calder to Mildura, before trekking to Adelaide and then across the Nullabor during the cooler months.

As of early July he had clocked up more than 5,000 kilometres, gone through 7 pairs of shoes and raised more than \$9,200 of his goal of \$50,000 for Beyond Blue. While most people would expect him to have problems with blisters and sore feet, it's actually been chaffing between the legs which has created more of an issue.

While he is hard to miss with his blue hair and blue buggy, Warren relishes the support he receives along the way in this huge quest, from the people stopping and chatting on the roadside, to those offering him a bed for the night, to businesses donating their services for some of his needs, or others contributing to his welfare in the course of the journey. When asked what has been the highlight of the trip so far, his response was an unhesitating, 'The generosity of people."

He also feels it's about letting people know they are not alone -"that people feel that others care," Warren said. "It's about people helping each other out, saying "hello".

With the Charlton Lions Changeover dinner being hosted at the East the same night as Warren's sojourn, an opportunity for him to address the gathering offered a genuine insight into his motivation for the cause, and the quest he has undertaken. A resulting whiparound brought in a \$235 donation for Beyond Blue.

Keeping a daily diary and using Facebook as an outreach has meant the journey is being well recorded. Ultimately a book of this adventure of a lifetime would be a great finale said Warren ("with all the proceeds going to Beyond Blue").

While the intrepid traveller is now moving north through Buloke, it might be timely to remember the support our region has had over the years through the adversities of droughts and floods, and consider the services which have helped us to pull through, or regroup to pick up our lives again.

"Wazza" is shining a spotlight on a significant issue which affects more people than we realise. So perhaps we could reflect on some of our own gratitude for services rendered, and help a man with a heart as big as Phar Lap's on his mission.
