

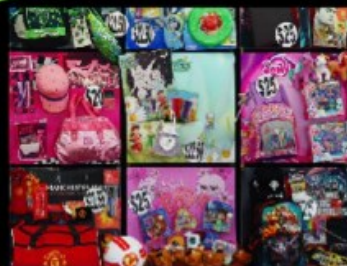

- A. *This competition is judged at local show level and winners are eligible to enter the same exhibit in the NDASA Regional (Group) Finals held at the conclusion of that current show season.*
- B. *An exhibitor may only represent a designated section at any one show within this group each year. (A person will not be*

permitted to win and represent more than one Show within the State in any one Show year).

- C. *An exhibitor having won at Regional level is eligible to compete again in the competition in the following year.*

General regulations for VAS Ltd State

State Final Prizes: 1st Prize \$300 Spotlight Voucher plus V.A.S. Ltd Plaque, 2nd \$150 Spotlight Voucher, 3rd \$50 Spotlight Voucher.

- 47. **VAS Ltd Crochet Competition.**
Crocheted article made from pure wool or wool blend, any ply.
- 48. **VAS Ltd Hand Embroidery Competition.**
An article of hand embroidery, any type, excluding cross stitch.
- 49. **VAS Ltd Spotlight Knitting Competition.**
Hand knitted jumper or cardigan. Each article must be made from pure wool/wool blend of any ply and must have attached label from wool used or label or receipt from Woollen Mill.
- 50. **VAS Ltd Spotlight Sewing Competition.**
Garment/outfit of wearing apparel (maximum of 3 pieces). Sewn by Machine. May be hand finished. Accessories such as scarves, stoles, shawls, gloves etc are not acceptable. Knitted/crocheted items not acceptable. Garment to be constructed in fabric, using natural fibre or fibre blend. The garment must be made by the exhibitor.
- 51. **VAS Ltd Spotlight Sewing Competition.**
Tote/Carry bag, no larger than 50cm on either side. Fabric handle/s. Minimum embellishments allowed. Must be lined.
- 52. **VAS Ltd Patchwork Competition.**
A piece of patchwork, no more than 1 metre on any side, machine pieced and machine quilted, only finished articles will be accepted. Minimal embellishment allowed.

VAS LTD GENERAL REGULATIONS

- A. *An exhibitor may represent only one Society at Group level and one Group at State level.*
- B. *An exhibit may only win one Group Final in a show season. Should the same article be entered again and found to already to have won a Group Final in the same show season, the exhibitor must return the prize money and will be disqualified from exhibiting for 12 months.*
- C. *The Melbourne Group 14 winner of the current Show will compete as a finalist in the following State Final at the next Royal Melbourne Show.*

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- D. An item having won at the State Final, is no longer eligible to compete in the competition.
- E. Each item entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor
- F. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group of State Final level, then the second placegetter is eligible to compete.
- G. A person will not be permitted to win at more than one Show within the State in any one Show year. Persons not adhering to this rule will be required to forfeit/refund prize money.
- H. All work to have been completed within last twelve months.

- 1 x 375g pkt mixed fruit (uncut).

Method

Melt butter, mix all together then place in a greased cake tin for one hour on 150°C then ½ hour at 180°C.

38. VAS Ltd Rich Fruit Cake Competition

The following recipe is compulsory for all entrants:

Ingredients

- 250g sultanas
- 250g chopped raisins
- 250g currants
- 125g chopped mixed peel
- 90g chopped red glace cherries
- 90g chopped blanched almonds
- 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
- 250g plain flour
- 60g self raising flour
- ¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon ground ginger
- ½ teaspoon ground cloves
- 250g butter
- 250g soft brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
- ½ teaspoon almond essence
- ½ teaspoon vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs

Method

1. Mix together all the fruits and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy.
2. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.
3. Sift together the flour and spices.
4. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essence.
5. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures.
6. Place the mixture into a prepared **square 20cm tin**, and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Hot tip: To ensure uniformity it's suggested you snip fruit into small pieces.

1. Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil.
2. Simmer gently for 3 minutes then remove from stove, add bicarbonate soda and allow to cool.
3. Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well.
4. Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined 20cm round cake tin.
5. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours or until cooked when tested.

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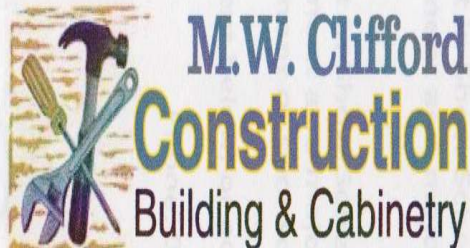

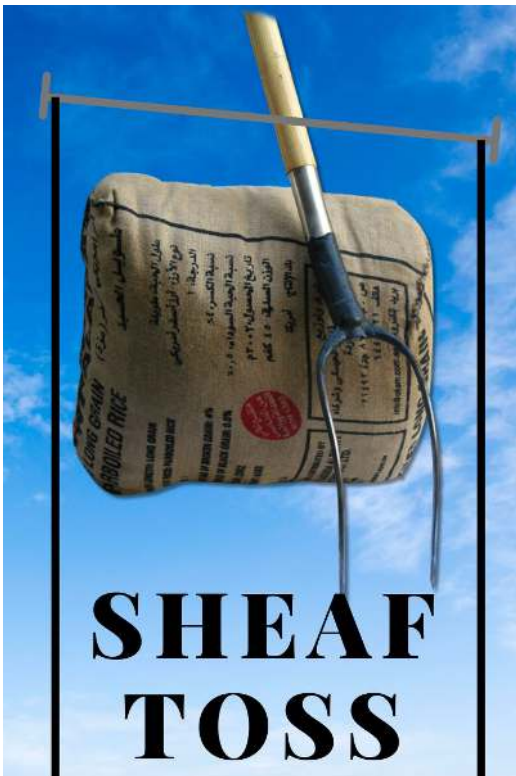

This Society is affiliated with the Northern District's Agricultural Societies' Association of Victoria, whose rules will be adhered to.

JUDGING TO START PUNCTUALLY AT TIME ALLOCATED

1. No exhibitor will be allowed in that section of the yard in which his/her exhibit is placed during the adjudication, except where absolutely necessary, and it shall be the duty of the Stewards to prevent any person interfering with the Judges and if necessary, order removal of offender from the yard. No person previously disqualified shall be allowed to exhibit or have charge of any exhibit at the Show.
2. General entries in writing must be lodged with the Secretary at P.O. Box 126, Charlton, the show office or at the Charlton Newsagency.
3. The owner or exhibitor of any exhibit disapproved of as an exhibit by the Committee of the Society, must immediately, upon notice to that effect, remove such an exhibit from the Society's ground.
4. Persons in charge of exhibits must not address the Judges unless authorised by the Stewards of the exhibition.
5. The Judge may award a second or third prize, instead of a first, or may withhold a prize altogether when there is no competition. or where the exhibits are not of sufficient merit.
6. No prizes can be awarded by the Judges for extra exhibits if the prize list contains a class or section in which the same can compete. The committee may cancel any prize in the schedule prior to the day of the Show.
7. The Committee may withhold any prize when misstatements have

erroneously or fraudulently been made regarding any exhibit.

8. Should any exhibit having gained a prize be disqualified, the next on the list does not necessarily obtain the prize. The Committee with or without advice of the Judges, to decide the question.
9. All persons exhibiting shall accept the decision of the Judges appointed by the Society and in the case of written protest the decision of the committee shall be accepted as final without recourse.
10. When a prize has been awarded for any exhibit, a steward will attach a prize card to such exhibit, which must remain attached during the Show. Any exhibitor refusing to allow such a card to remain on the exhibit will be liable to disqualification, to forfeit the prize awarded.
11. No exhibit can be removed from the Exhibition until **6.00 p.m.** on the day of the Show, except Horses and pets, which may be removed.
12. Protests (if any) against the awards in all the classes must be lodged to the Secretary, in writing before 3.00 p.m. on the day of the Show.
13. The privilege of distributing trade lists, advertisements and documents is restricted exclusively to exhibitors at their respective stands. Any infringement of this regulation will incur expulsion from the yards.
14. Every possible care will be taken of exhibits, but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society.
15. The breeding year dates from April 1 for sheep. All exhibits must be in their places in the yards before 10.30 a.m. on the day of the Show, with the exception of Class EA Fleeces, which must be in their place at the Pavilion at the Showground by 10.00a.m. Friday for judging.
16. Intending competitors are particularly requested to observe the date fixed for the reception of entries at the office, as a rule will be strictly enforced and also that the "Entry Ticket" must be produced attached to each lot at the Gates of the Show Yard and not removed until authorised by the Secretary.
17. Schedules of prizes and all information can be obtained on

application to the Secretary

18. Should any doubt arise as to any exhibit not having been entered in accordance with the regulations, the person making the entry shall if requested by the Secretary to do so, make a statutory declaration that such exhibit was entered in accordance with the regulations of the Society. In default of making such a declaration the prize, if any, having been awarded will be withheld from such an exhibit and be dealt with as the Committee may determine. Disqualification for breaches of the regulations of any of the District Societies and of which due notice has been given will be endorsed by the Society.
19. The Committee reserves the right of refusing, cancelling or rejecting any entry without reason for doing so.
20. Prizes not claimed before November 1. revert to the Society. All complaints to the Secretary. All prizes will be paid at the Secretary's office on show day. The Society accepts no liability for injury to honorary judges in discharging of their duties at the Show, or in travelling to and from the Show.
21. All competitors enter at their own risk. First aid is available on request. Ambulance to be called only by competitor or first aid attendant or Doctor at competitor's own expense. The Society will accept no liability.
22. Where amplifiers are used in sideshows, they must meet with the approval of the Committee or be discontinued.
23. No entry to be judged unless the entry ticket is securely fastened to exhibitor's article.
24. In the event of a tie for a trophy which has to be won more than once, each exhibitor shall be allowed half a win but should there be a tie on trophies to be won only once, the exhibitor with the most first prizes shall be declared the winner.
25. Aggregate scores will be assessed on the basis of two points for a first prize, and one for a second.
