Dr Kirby White Honoured

In 2002, Kirby White [daughter of Ron and Carol White] completed Year 12 at Charlton College, where she was that year's representative on the Student Leadership Council. Now a Bendigo specialist general practitioner, co-founder of Gowns for Doctors and 2021 Victorian Australian of the Year Local Hero award recipient, Kirby will be immortalised as one of the most iconic toys in the world — Barbie.

Dr White has been recognized by Mattel as one of six female medical practitioners in the world to highlight with a one-of-akind Barbie doll in their likeness to pay tribute to the real-life heroes of the coronavirus pandemic.

Dr White co-founded the Gowns for Doctors initiative which has created more than 7000 re-usable gowns for GP clinics around Australia when personal protective

equipment ran short when the pandemic

Barbie will donate \$5 for each eligible Barbie doctor, nurse and medical doll sold in Australia throughout the campaign period, which ended on August 10, to Gowns for Doctors.

"This donation from Barbie will mean many more doctors across Australia will be able to receive a box of reusable protective gowns and many parents and children will be able to seek care from their doctor," Dr White said.

"Australia is once again facing increasing COVID-19 case numbers and this donation will allow Gowns for Doctors to upscale our support to those clinics in need."

Dr White said she felt honoured to have her very own Barbie doll.

Charlton Golden Grains Museum Gains Accreditation

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum has gained Accreditation by Australian Museums and Galleries Association Victoria. A professional panel of museum experts has made a final assessment and compiled a positive report on the museum's operations. The Museum has worked hard to meet set criteria from the National Standards for Australian Museums and Galleries and joins the 83 Victorian collections Accredited in Victoria.

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum Committee was formed in 1973 and by 1974 the Committee had a permanent display and space for research and meetings in the former Mechanics Institute building (1882). In this time, and largely due to the generosity of the local community, the Museum has developed a collection over 3000 artifacts and photographs focused on the district's First Peoples and Charlton's early pioneers through to today. Local family history research is also available from the museum's extensive collection of resources.

At the time the Museum enrolled in the Museum Accreditation Program (MAP), the Museum had recently completed renovations after a major flood and were still recovering from the natural disaster. The flood had not only devastated the Museum building and collection but also eighty percent of the town. The Accreditation panel acknowledged that the Museum should be proud of the proven resilience of volunteers, the professionalism of their activities, and high volume of achievements.

The panel was impressed with the volunteers' determination to operate a professional organisation and strong focus on continual improvement, commenting that the Museum undertakes an extremely high work-

load for the number of volunteers at the organisation. An already strong and successful Museum, through the ongoing commitment of its dedicated volunteers, the Museum has made impressive improvements to the preservation and interpretation of the collection particularly in the collection storage spaces.

The Victorian-based MAP is now in its 28th year and is run by Australian Museums and Galleries Association Victoria, the professional association for the museum and gallery sector. There are currently 83 Accredited cultural organisations and a further 2 working towards this goal. To become Accredited, museums spend 2-3 years developing procedures and policies, and practice to meet recognised museum standards. Training, advice, and other resources are

made available to assist museums in meeting these standards.

Sherryn Vardy, Co-Manager, Museum Accreditation Program, Australian Museums and Galleries Association Victoria, says, "We are delighted to recognise the hard work and commitment shown by the team at Charlton Golden Grains Museum. Caring for our shared heritage is an important task and by becoming accredited Charlton Golden Grains Museum has proven to be a leading museum in Victoria."

A formal presentation of Charlton Golden Grains Museum's Accreditation certificate will be made at the 2021 Victorian Museum Awards, to be held via an online event on 5 October.


and spinning wheel chook runs, drawing of the raffle and presentation of prizes. A great day for all, golfers and hackers alike. All this for \$50.00 per person.

"Seeing a Barbie in my likeness was a creation I never could have imagined," she said. "For a moment she transformed me back into the clinic. She was me, wearing my gown, doing the job I love. I really look forward to bringing her into my clinic to share with my patients. I'm excited to introduce Barbie to my two-year-old daughter Stella and watch her imagination grow."

The GP Clinic founder is one of six women in the world to be recognised by Mattel as part of the company's #ThankYouHeroes signature program.

The other medical practitioners include United States' emergency room nurse Amy O'Sullivan who treated the first COVID-19 patient at the Wyckoff Hospital in Brooklyn, New York and frontline worker Dr Audrey Cruz from Las Vegas, Nevada, who joined forces during the pandemic with other Asian-American physicians to fight racial bias and discrimination.

Canadian psychiatry resident at the University of Toronto, Dr Chika Stacy Oriuwa, advocated against systemic racism in healthcare, which has been further highlighted by the pandemic, Professor of vaccinology Sarah Gilbert led the development of the University of Oxford vaccine in the United Kingdom and biomedical researcher, Dr Jaqueline Goes de Jesus was credited for leading the sequencing of the genome of a COVID-19 variant in Brazil.

"Being honoured among this group of inspirational women makes me incredibly proud," Dr White said. "I am delighted to be able to share my story in the hope that our youngest generation of girls will believe their dreams are a possibility. Women make up less than a quarter of students studying STEM in Australia. Role models in STEM are incredibly important in demonstrating to young girls that any career is possible. Inspiring minds at a young age when kids

have a brilliant imagination will hopefully lead to brilliant careers."

With over 200 careers, Barbie celebrates role models to show girls they can be anything, and senior vice-president and global head of Barbie and Dolls at Mattel Lisa McKnight said it's important for young children to see what can make a difference in the world.

"We know the pandemic has been felt directly by children across the globe," she said. "As the number one doll brand, we take great pride in leveraging Barbie's platform to teach children about role models who are making a positive impact in our world, especially those who rose to the occasion during this challenging time. Our hope is to nurture and ignite the imaginations of children playing out their own storyline as heroes."

Gowns for Doctors has provided more than 5500 reusable gowns during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Dr White said the initial goal was to get 1000 gowns for the Bendigo community, before further calls for support saw the project continue to grow. "Never in my wildest dreams did I think it would be as big as it is," she said.

Dr Kirby White's life after being named one of six true heroes of the coronavirus pandemic as part of Barbie's #ThankYouHeroes program. "Never in my wildest imagination did I think I would be sitting here having a conversation like this," she said. "This has enabled me to reflect on where I have come from; I'm this little girl from Charlton and look what I've achieved in 36 years. I don't think I'll ever have a week like this again."

Dr White was recognized by Mattel for her work in cofounding Gowns for Doctors which has made and distributed thousands of re-usable PPE gowns to medical professionals across Australia as the coronavirus pandemic gripped the nation. For the mother-of-two, the recognition goes far beyond her work, and she hopes young girls will look to her Barbie doll and know that they too can work in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

"I'm really proud to be country girl," she said. "I studied science before I went into medicine and my main reason for retraining was because I wanted to get back to a rural setting. The driving force behind Gowns for Doctors has been the Bendigo community who have supported us to achieve this incredible impact."

Dr White said the process behind transforming her into a Barbie included 10 doll designers in the United States who used photos to create a Doll Design Deck with specific photos highlighting her eyes, hair and even height. Through computer generator modelling, the doll was designed and hand painted to be brought to life.

"They've done an incredible job," Dr White said. "I was surprised when I saw it and I thought 'yep, that's me, that's definitely Dr Kirby'. I think a lot of girls grow up with Barbie, and I definitely did. I didn't have a sister and those imaginary games with Barbie were really important to me. I think this a great opportunity for all girls to see a large company deliver campaigns supporting women, especially when they're in minority fields like STEM. Even when women graduate, there's a very small percentage who go on to continue their career. This is a fabulous platform to inspire girls into those careers."

Dr White said she hasn't had the opportunity to reflect on the enormity of being named as the inspiration for an iconic Barbie, but she hoped the doll would continue to inspire young girls to imagine that they can grow up to be anything. "I have two kids, Flynn who's seven and Stella who's two," she said. "I think it is the beginning of a very fun 10 years to come with Barbie and Stella."

Jan Remembers Charlton

Former Charlton resident Jan Dale (nee Hull), picked up a Charlton newsletter recently and sent this in as she thought it may be of interest to our readers.

I have a special affinity with Charlton as some of my most impressionable early years were spent there. My father, Rev. J.E. Hull, was Methodist Minister in the mid to late 1940s and I started school there. My teacher was Miss Ruby. To take a short cut to school my older brothers and I crossed the river on the railway bridge. We used to listen carefully for any humming in the tracks which would alert us to an oncoming train! I saw my first film, Bambi, at The Rex Theatre. What a revelation - full colour animation. Every year the circus used to come to town and my brothers rushed down to help erect the huge tent. The circus parade was wonderful. I don't think we could afford to go to a performance and I have vague recollections of sneaking in under the seats at the back!

Our house, the old Methodist parsonage, seemed enormous to me. There was a big verandah, a cellar with outside access and a well with one of those brick domed tops which we used to play on. We also had a tree house (I was banned from there!) and a cow called Daisy which used to graze on the common every day. As I was by far the youngest of my family, I spent a lot of time playing alone, even lighting little fires to cook for my dolls - not anything we would do these days.

After we left Charlton we moved to Eaglehawk. I loved exploring the gold

diggings there but missed the river and even the dreadful excitement of those awful dust storms we had in Charlton when it turned blacker than night. Mum used to frantically try to block up around the windows and doors to stop the dust coming in but it never seemed to help much.

I think that those early years of country life and the freedom that it brings for children led to a lot of other adventures for me. In the 1990s I decided to drive myself around America alone. I rented out my house, flew to San Francisco and bought a little campervan intending to spend twelve

months there. My special interest is music and I found lots of that. I also loved the national parks and just being on the road, never knowing what I might find next. In the end this journey extended to nearly six years with trips home in between to build up the coffers. I've now published a book called 'Chasing Music; My Crazy Campervan Adventures in America.'

Snap Send Solve is a free app that simplifies the reporting of community issues across Australia and New Zealand.

The app developers have made reporting quick and easy which means when you see an issue while you're out, you can let the responsible authority, in our case the Buloke Shire, know with only a few taps.

Snap Send Solve enables users to report an array of incidents including, but not limited to:

- Abandoned cars or vehicles
- Animal related issues
- Communication equipment pits and lids
- Dumped rubbish and litter
- Graffiti
- Noise
- Parking

- Pavements and roads
- Playground equipment
- Street lights
- Street cleaning
- Trees
- Water and sewer issues

If you need to report a different issue either submit it under the General Request incident type

Snap Send Solve works on both iOS and Android devices and is available to download for free on both the App Store and Google Play.

Note that some older versions of iOS and Android are not supported.



CHARLTON COMMUNITY PROJECTS

It has been 12 months since we last updated the community on the many projects being undertaken in the Charlton community. Below is a small summary of the projects and the group responsible. These will be discussed at future Charlton Forum meetings. Charlton Forum are the custodians of the Charlton 2030 Plan, that is the consulted document by Government for funding decisions.

1) River Walk Solar	Seven additional lights have been installed along the River Walk, completing the lighting section of the
Lighting	River Walk between Travellers Rest & Lundy Street.

2) John Curtin Drive	The installation of fencing and shade shelter on the east side of the John Curtin Drive has been completed
Travellers Rest C'ttee	and there is a proposal for a further artistic stage noted below.
3) Buloke Shire Tourism	The Tourism brochures have been printed and distributed throughout Victoria. There has been a budget
Brochures	allocation ready for a reprint when allocation is exhausted, and updates will be included where required

4) Gordon Park	Retiling the ladies and men's showers has been completed.

5) Early Years Centre	The Charlton Early Years Centre welcomed pre- school students for the first day at the new building on
Buloke Shire Council	August 15. An official opening will take place after lockdown.
6) Charlton Weir	The weir boards have been replaced allowing for an increased enjoyment of the river.

7) Streetscapes Buloke Shire Council	This project is closed to community consultation and the Charlton Forum and Chamber of Commerce are working with Buloke Shire Council consults on this design and implementation. The project will incorporate improved access, installation of new seating, bins and bike racks and redesigned garden beds.
8) River Project Buloke Shire Council	Road works along Davies St (the back lane) are in the process of being completed this week with works on the new viewing deck set to be finished and open to the public by the end of September. Remaining elements of this project will be delivered in conjunction with the streetscape and art trail projects.
9) Town Entrances Beautify Charlton	High St trees has been handed over to the Shire to do watering from now on. There are still some incorrect varieties to be replaced which are the Shire's responsibility. Mildura Way there is still significant planting to be done. The trees to be watered for the 2021/22 summer and then total responsibility reverts to the Shire. Town Signage – it is to be hoped the Shire properly engages with the community on the signage proposed. Initial indications were that is what would happen. What is proposed is very good, but we have requested that the community have a chance to view and comment. This project is anticipated to be completed by June 2022.
10) Charlton Early Years	Whilst the fantastic pre-school and maternal and child health facility is operational, the provision of child-care and playgroup facilities are yet to be established. These are being investigated by Buloke Shire Council.

11) Rex Extension Rex Theatre C'ttee	\$800k has been secured for the Rex extension. The submitted plans include a performer change area that could double as a meeting/training room, new toilets and baby change area with all access facilities.
12) Charlton Park Lights Buloke Shire Council	Designs are finalised for 4 new light poles at the football oval and 5 for the hockey field. Works will go out to tender to award a contractor before the end of the year. The tennis club lights have been installed.
13) Charlton Park Charlton Park 2020	The Better Regions Funding grant for \$325,000 is progressing slowly due to many reasons including the delays in achieving planning permits, Covid 19 and the shortage of building materials. The large shed over at the Harness Training Facility has been completed and construction of the VET shed is about to commence. The fence near the Netball courts has been completed and playground equipment has been ordered. New viewing stands have arrived, and the remaining 3 projects are 2 stalls/sheds and the completion of the carpark. An application for further funding of \$120K has been successful for the wool display-stall covered area and this will commence construction once permits have been issued.
14) Wooroonook Lakes Buloke Shire Council	Works on the accessibility improvements for the pontoon are continuing and procurement is underway for the power & water upgrades for campers.
15) Park Play-Gordon Park Buloke Shire Council	Funding has been secured and community consultation has closed, designs will be finalised and approved by a project committee prior to tendering the works with a goal to begin construction in the new year.
16) Harness Racing Training Complex Charlton Harness Racing Club	The training complex currently has three horse trainers and six stable staff on site with 55 horses in work, with two of the trainers having relocated here in the last 12 months. With the increasing number of horses at the ever-expanding complex, 33 new day yards, 25 shade shelters and 400 trees have been established so far, with another 30 shade shelters to be installed and 200 trees to be established. Another larger stable shed will also be added by the end of 2021. All this initiative is funded jointly by State Government, Harness Racing Victoria, and Charlton Harness Racing Club.
17) John Monash Water Tower (Lions Park) Neighborhood House plus partners	This project has been delayed due to the safety issues of the tower. There is a partnership between numerous community organisations that will see further development of an art piece and native garden for this lovely venue. This project is planned for completion by January 2022.
18) POP Marketing Neighborhood House plus partners	Funded by the Bendigo Bank grants program, this project is to relocate the existing sign on Marlo Court to another Melbourne facing vantage point and incorporate a retro style advertisement to encourage travellers to stop and visit Charlton.
19) Yeungroon History	The Yeungroon community have received funding to erect a cenotaph to honour those who have served in the Wars and several interpretive panels depicting the community's history.

	The old Police Station is no longer suitable for size and toilets are external. The existing building will be turned into a lunchroom for visiting students and a working staff office for visiting staff, who currently have no place to operate from and is a deterrent to some schools. The building applied for will be a Mod 5- 2 classrooms, kitchenette, toilets and has a quoted installation cost of \$300-400k including surveying, build and fit out costs.
22) First People's Art Trail	This art project will be focused around the Avoca River and will incorporate both physical
Neighbourhood House & multi partners	artworks and audio indigenous stories. There are currently 2 funding applications submitted for this project, and a third will be submitted in October if required. Part funding has been received from the Bendigo Bank Community Grants and the River Project.
23) River Walk Extension	The Forum is seeking funding from State Government Trails for this. After discussion it was
Charlton Forum	proposed to extend the walking track from Lundy Street around Charlton Park to the east to the Weir where a track had been mowed years before.
24) Community Forest Charlton Forum	The Forum see this as a natural extension of the river walk to the Donald Road Community Forest. Funding will be applied for when an opportunity arises.
25) Bird Hides Charlton Landcare	The newly reactivated Landcare group has applied for funding to erect bird hides along the Avoca River, Community Forest and Wooroonook Lakes.
26) Community/Civic Hub	Council is exploring funding options of developing a sustainably designed building in Elliott
Buloke Shire Council	Gardens that would act as a community hub with the possibility of including facilities like Shire Community Development Directorate Offices, Library, Senior Citizens, Neighbourhood House, Tourism Centre, Art Gallery, small business hub to name a few.
27) Access Movement Strategy	Working with Buloke Shire, funding is being sought to create an access and movement strategy for the Charlton township. This will investigate the prohibitors with the community for all access facilities and services.
	Projects being developed.
28) Charlton Notables Beautify Charlton	The idea is enhancing community pride and visual appeal to be admired and respected. This concept has changed and currently is looking at rocks with plaques between the weir and the low water bridge. Due to Covid restrictions the group still have not had the chance to have any real progress beyond the concept stage. Once they have much greater freedom of movement a working group is ready to start the process.
Part 2 Forum/CNH	Following on from the development of the Charlton Arts and Culture Strategy that was compiled with community consultation in 2019, the second part will be undertaken within the next 6 months. Stage 2 is consideration of all arts and cultural events and activities and working with the organisations that deliver them to establish if there are any areas of support (physical or financial) required to ensure that event tourism continues for the Charlton community.
30) Night time Art activation CNH	Exploring avenues of using lights (think White Night) to highlight architecture and nature and incorporate with live music to create event tourism.
31) John Curtin Fence Travellers Rest C'tee	A proposal to install panels between the fence line and roofline with artworks of trains of different eras of rail in Charlton.
32) River/CBD link Forum/CNH	Along with local service organisations, consider the option of connecting the newly developed river precinct to the CBD via the Globe Flats laneway.
33) Railway Platform Forum	Work with V/Line to repair the existing platform and install a required fence that incorporates information panels of the Charlton Station and rail throughout the years in Charlton. This platform is being used by tourist trains enroute north.
34) Station Dam Forum	Working with service organisations and groups it is proposed to explore the options available to create an eco- tourism reserve at the reserve.
35) Weed Management Charlton Landcare	Advocate for control of weeds on council, crown and private land. Encouraging local residents to use the app Snap, Send, Solve to assist with reporting weeds to Buloke Shire Council.
36) Cemetery Cemetery Trust	Replace existing toilet, including landscaping the area around the toilet
37) Community Development Forum/Chamber of Commerce	Working with Council to investigate aged care, housing stock and industry development.
38) Tourism Trails Buloke Tourism Board	Working with the communities of the Buloke Shire Council area to develop tourism trails for the purpose of increasing domestic tourism during covid.




Off the court this season the club was

Scholarship Helps Apryl Soar

SCHOLARSHIP HELPS APRYL SOAR

Charlton resident, Apryl Start has recently received a boost to her paramedic training with a Royal Flying Doctor Service "Give Them Their Wings" scholarship.

The prestigious award assists first year students from rural and regional areas who are studying nursing or allied health, and is valued at \$4,000. While aiding students with their university expenses, it also offers an opportunity to experience a day in the life of a Flying Doctor — either on the road or in the air.

As one of 2021's six recipients, Apryl is undertaking a four-year Bachelor of Paramedic Practice course at La Trobe University, Bendigo. Other successful applicants are also from Bendigo, along with three from Mildura.

The former Charlton College student said she was honored to be a recipient of the scholarship, and was excited about the prospects on offer.

"I am really looking forward to working with the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS) as I continue my pathway in paramedics," Apryl said.

"The scholarship allows you the opportunity to share with others your passion for studying and supporting rural communities through delivering essential health care services."

While Covid has so far denied Apryl the chance of face -to-face tutorials, online contact with her peers has helped to build relationships, which has been aided by the small class size.

"There are only forty students in the group, so it makes it easier to get to know people," Apryl said.

A strong interest in health and a leaning towards rural emergency response and lifesaving were factors driving Apryl's career choice.

After completing Year 12 in 2017, she spent the summer season carrying out life-guarding duties and teaching swimming, then made a further commitment to supporting both again over the following two years.

"Then, at the start of 2020 I was asked by our local relieving Paramedic if I was interested in becoming an Ambulance Community Officer (ACO)," Apryl said. "Six months later I completed my initial training and started going out on the road with the paramedics and responding to emergencies."

The involvement in these community roles enabled her to learn valuable first aid skills, which in turn helped her to teach others about their importance and the response to time-critical situations.

After being in the ACO role for six months, Apryl decided to study further to become a paramedic.

"I have been so lucky to have the ACO experience with the Charlton and District Ambulance with actual handson work," said Apryl. "Not everyone has this opportunity. It has been the best thing."

While an actual station placement is not on the cards for first year students, Apryl said there will be other opportunities, and on completion of the course, participants spend a year working out of a metropolitan station where the case loads are more varied.

For now, though, she is

eagerly anticipating the RFDS experience, while ultimately aiming to work in a rural area.

"One of my biggest motivations is the delivery of emergency care to rural and remote areas and helping to reduce the health gap between the metropolitan / remote divide."

An ideal to be commended as a new career takes flight!

St Joseph's Charlton (East Wimmera Parish)

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the declaration of Saint Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church, Pope Francis proclaimed a 'Year of St Joseph from December 8 2020 – December 8, 2021. Below is a summary of St Joseph's Tennis Club's history.

When St Joseph's Tennis Club was formed is unknown.

"A match was played between St Joseph's Tennis Club and the Charlton Tennis Club on Monday afternoon, on the courts of St Joseph's Church. The game was considerably marred by the wind, which was driving big clouds of dust across the courts all the afternoon.... Messrs O'Connor, Ruse, Spain, Rumble, Woodhouse, Wall and Heenan were defending St Joseph's laurels...

St Joseph's team also journeyed out to Wooroonook, and had a splendid afternoon's tennis alongside the lake, and again were victorious..." (CT 31.01.1920)

"Catholic Tennis Social - The Men Entertain

On Monday night last St Joseph's schoolroom presented a gay and pleasing spectacle, the occasion being a social given by the Catholic gentlemen to the ladies of the congregation as a termination to a most successful tennis season...

Mr Tom Murphy stated it was only right that the men should return the compliment to the ladies for the many cream puffs and other delicacies they had so often partaken of..." (CT 22.05.1920)

"The AGM of the Catholic Tennis Club, convened for the purpose of the election of officers for the coming season was held in the School Supper Room during the weekend. The balance sheet for last season was read by the Secretary ex officio, Mr W. Killeen. This balance was entirely satisfactory, showing a credit of £7/11/3... The membership fees are to be the same as last year, ie gents 7/6, ladies 3/6..." (CT 14.10.1925)

"Social in St Joseph's Hall – Presentation of Tennis Cup

At a social held in St Joseph's Hall on Tuesday evening, the cup won by St Joseph's Tennis Club in the Wychitella and District Tennis Association was presented to the winners...

Rev. Father Kelly presented each member of the team a photograph of the players who won the cup.

Dancing, community singing and musical items contributed largely to the success of a most enjoyable evening, and the time passed most pleasantly for all present..." (CT 18.05.1929)

"Church Tennis Association – St Joseph's Win 'B' Grade Grand Final

At St Joseph's courts on Wednesday afternoon the grand final of the 'B' Grade resulted in a decisive win for St Joseph's, against the Methodist players. Although the scores were much in favor of St Joseph's, there were patches of bright tennis. The ladies' games were evenly contested..." (CT 05.03.1932)

A new 4 roomed school building was

built in 1959 on the area on which the tennis courts were situated. Efforts were made to continue the Club on grass courts over by Kaye St but the work entailed was just too much to handle so St Joseph's members joined the Charlton Tennis Club.

Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome to the September news from an again closed Charlton Golden Grains Museum. While lockdowns and restrictions make the task of cataloguing items difficult, and we are unable to welcome visitors, we are thinking of those businesses and individuals around us who have suffered so much over the past 18 months. One thing that shines through from so many examples at our museum is that Charlton folk are very resilient against all types of hardships, and when we get on top of this virus, our town will bounce back better than ever.

Elsewhere in the newsletter you will see an article on our museum receiving accreditation with the Australian Museum and Galleries Association. This was a huge undertaking for the museum. We were approached to take part in the program due to the excellent standard of our displays. We had to submit policies and procedures for every aspect of our operation and governance. Our cataloguing, preservation, storage and displays were all assessed in great detail. The panel were in awe of the progress we had made since beginning the program. When they first visited we still had a building full of flood damaged items and were really still in state of recovery. It was only after many thousands of hours by our committed volunteers that we were able to present the panel with our much improved museum. Those outside the museum sector may be unaware of the very high standard required to become accredited and what a feather in the cap of a small community museum it is. We are very proud of our achievement and hope the wider community is too.

This month we take a look at a vital service that we all take for granted, but is a part of every small town to major city, and that is sewage disposal. The convenience of 'spending a penny' and pushing a button has changed from when this writer was a boy in suburban Melbourne, and we had an outside toilet visited by the 'Pan Man'.

The museum holds many Shire records relating to this service including Tenders, Contracts and the Charlton Sewerage Authority. In 1903 the Shire called for tenders for the 'removal and disposal of night soil under the double pan system from the townships of East and West Charlton'. On the 1st September 1903, W. Burton and Sons were awarded the contract for the amount of 2 Pound 15 Shillings per week, 143 Pounds per year. This was a once a week collection service between the hours of 10:00pm and 8:00am. The 'soil' was to be conveyed to a nominated council site and deposited into uniform trenches, covered with dry earth and burnt lime. Prior to moving, pans had to be fitted with a secure lid and replaced with a clean and deodorised pan in the correct position under the seat. The contractor was obliged to notify the Inspector of Nuisances if the disinfectant

was being removed or the pans were being emptied by residents and the soil deposited in another place.

In other news, remember our archive service on offer. For just \$10.00 we will scan and securely store an A4 size archival envelope of papers recording your family's story. This could include copies of family trees, photographs, written histories or similar items. These will be recorded on our database and available to view at a later date by researchers of your family or those with an interest in the district.

With the colder evenings and COVID restrictions our regular Bingo Bus has not been making the trip to Donald. Keep an eye open for details on when the group will be again on the road to support our fundraising efforts.

Another way the museum raises much needed funds is through research for individuals. Many enquiries for family history are received from around Australia, and we are often able to provide images and newspaper clippings for these requests. If you want to find out information about your family or house's history contact any of the people listed below.

The museum is always looking for more new members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. You can also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection or historic items.




