# Charlton College Farewells Kelvin

The final day in office for Charlton College principal, Kelvin Baird, took place on Friday 17 September as the much loved and respected educator commenced retirement.

In a subdued celebrations (due to the Covid restrictions) staff paid tribute to Kelvin's considerable contributions, not just as the College principal over the past ten years, but also as a former teacher at the school.

It was a case of the "local boy" coming full circle - from a student, to teacher, then leader in a career spanning more than 40 years.

Commencing as College principal in August of 2011, Kelvin's tenure opened as Charlton was still in the recovery phase from the devastating floods of earlier that year. While much progress had been made things were still a "work in progress" with additional needs to focus

Having completed his own education (Years 11 and 12) at what was then Charlton High, Kelvin's career began following a four year teacher training course at Latrobe University, Bundoora. His first placement, at Upfield High School, began in 1977 where he remained for four years. A move to Ardeer High School followed (1981 -83) before he returned to home territory in Charlton in 1984. A 17 year stay came to an end in 2001 when Kelvin took on the role of Assistant Principal at near-by Wedderburn College, before becoming Principal of the facility from 2002 to mid 2011. Leadership at Charlton has now completed his career.

Reflecting on his decade at Charlton, Kelvin emphasized that a principal is only as good as the team which surrounds them, saying "I have been lucky enough to work with a passionate and dedicated team and I would like to acknowledge the great support I have received from parents, students and staff".

Always prioritizing the best outcomes for students, Kelvin listed a number of milestones which have brought increased benefits to both the local children and which have resulted from transformative methods of teaching over the past ten years.

Top of the highlights was the establishment of the North Central Trade Training Centre (NCTTC).

Through the North Central Cluster of Principals, in partnership with the North Central Local Learning and Employment Network (NCLLEN), and with regional support, the vocational centre "has guaranteed our rural students access to high quality, hands-on training in various fields of endeavour," Kelvin said. Opened in 2014, the facility is a showpiece for technology education, and evidence of the outcomes resulting from a collaborative effort with a common purpose.

Other valued initiatives showcasing the diversity of the College include driver education through CHARTSEC, the TAC L2P Learner Driver Mentor program, along with the FLO

(Flexible Learning Options) program which supports vulnerable students to re-engage with education and schooling. "The North Central Network FLO program has become an integral part of the school's operations", Kelvin said, "and is only made possible through our partnership with the NCLLEN and the dedication, energy and enthusiasm of the operation's team".

"Significant changes in teaching practice and learning over the past ten years have also enabled many new opportunities for engaging students," Kelvin said. The introduction of the One-to-One Laptop Program where every student and teacher has access to his or her own laptop/device in a wireless envi-

ronment allowing students to learn at their own pace and ability levels— has now enabled students to access a broader range of resources through connections beyond the school, as well as changing how staff can support and interact with students.

A background in IT while a teacher at Charlton College saw Kelvin involved in the early days of video conferencing. These endeavours received an international award in 1998 at the Learning Technologies Annual Conference in Anaheim, USA. Gaining third-place in the Best Overall Global Distance Education Network, the award acknowledged the development and introduction of a teaching process using video conferencing throughout 48 schools which enabled students to receive tuition in subjects they would not normally be able to study.

Kelvin's professional dedication was also acknowledged in 1999 with a National Award for Excellence in Teaching for his contributions towards establishing an internet hub at the Charlton College for both the school and community use.

Kelvin also served on the Board of the NCLLEN for almost 20 years, and held the

position of Treasurer during that time.

Civic involvement has also been a high priority, and Kelvin is renowned for his association with local sport. As a competitor, administrator and guiding force, he has brought immeasurable benefits to the Charlton Football and Cricket Clubs, with these being recognized with a Life Membership (Football) and an award in his name for Cricket's "Best in Finals". Showing that his contributions extended well beyond the class-room Kelvin was also named Charlton Citizen of the Year in 2000 – reflecting a passion for creating opportunities for his community.

While now looking forward to a wellearned break, Kelvin said he aims to spend more time with family and his grandchildren, and then travel, when circumstances permit.

"I'm going to miss the interaction with the students," he said, but emphasized that he would still be visible and involved with the Charlton community.

"I leave this position knowing that I have given my best shot and I have no regrets," he said.

Mr Jamie Daff takes on the role of principal in Term 4 with the position being readvertised for take-up in 2022.

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# Riverfront Project Complete The Riverfront Project is now complete and the fences have

finally come down. The project involved an upgrade to the Charlton Weir; the sealing of the back lane which also involved the installation of guttering and drainage; the riverbank was cleared of peppercorns and other nuisance trees; and the installation of a timber viewing platform, new turf, seating and lighting. The area still needs some finishing touches to the gazebo and further landscaping works and artworks are in the pipeline.

Charlton Forum members formed part of the Project Control Group with Buloke Shire Council and are very pleased with the outcome. The project was designed to enhance the Avoca River Precinct, making it more aesthetically pleasing and user friendly. The installation of lighting to showcase the trees at night means that the precinct is worth a visit day or night.

The project will tie in with other works scheduled to take place in the Travellers Rest undercover area and the main street. Forum members also form part of the Project Control Group for the streetscape improvements. When everything is complete it is hoped that these improvements will enhance the High Street and Avoca River precincts, ultimately encouraging more visitors to stop and also make Charlton an even nicer place to live.

# More than 'Just Another Brick...'

While Rod Heritage could be forgiven for channeling the Pink Floyd classic ("Just Another Brick in the Wall") his recent reconstruction work on Charlton's Mensland building has unearthed a surprising find.

Under the instigation of the Buloke Shire, to address safety issues with the western wall, Rod has currently replaced more than 100 bricks recently to ensure the structure remains solid.

In the course of his work the discovery of possums' feet imprints on a number of the original bricks has come to light. Rod believes that when the bricks were made and left to dry overnight, the possums scampered across the damp surfaces, leaving their marks for perpetuity.

The century-old wall displays one of Charlton's much admired street murals. The eyecatching work, which showcases graphic icons from around the town and district, also carries the defining "Welcome to Charlton" sign which greets travellers heading south on the Calder Highway. Completed in 2019 as part of the town's "Three Walls" project, the painting by Melbourne artist,

Kate Pullen, is part of the township's growing initiative for engaging people by bringing art to public spaces.

While the refurbished space

now ticks the safety box, its unexpected discovery adds another focal point to the art-trail experience!

# Charlton Landcare News

Thirty-five years ago, the Landcare movement began in Victoria, Australia, in 1986 when a group of farmers near St Arnaud formed the first Landcare group, a voluntary group to repair the natural environment. Since then, the Landcare concept has spread across Australia and to about 15 other countries. The Charlton Landcare Group recently held the Annual General Meeting and under the leadership of a younger generation are looking at expanding their membership group. Incoming President Tessa Fitzpatrick, supported by Vice President Andrew Wright, Secretary/ Treasurer Julie Bourke and new committee person Marcus McGurk are all hoping to expand the membership and activities to capture urban issues along with agricultural.

Tessa said, "The strength of Landcare groups is the community members and the networks formed with local government, and organisations. Previous executive and continuing members Greg Carmody, Marion Watts and Geoff Winsall, have worked hard to establish these over the last decade and now it is up to us to grow them. "

As the group sought ways to extend, they approached the Charlton Neighbourhood House to assist them with their vision. CNH president, Kaylene Cossar said, "Part of our House's strategic plan for the upcoming 3 years was identified to seek ways of incorporating a community approach to climate change adaptation. When Tessa explained the Landcare vision, we were very excited to form a partnership, to help us localise some of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals we are working towards."

Together the partnership has already conducted 'Adapt Loddon Mallee Climate Ready Communities' Workshops; applied for funding to construct bird hides along the Avoca River, Community Forest and Wooroonook Lakes; worked with the Lions Club to complement the existing native garden at Lions Park; advocated for weed control along the Riverbanks; and conducted biodiversity walks along the River.

These walks were led by Andrew Borg, Facilitator Buloke and Northern Grampians Landcare Network. Andrew explained to the two groups about the importance of biodiversity for provision of functioning eco-

systems that supply oxygen, clean air and water, pollination of plants, pest control, wastewater treatment and many ecosystem services. He identified many native grasses, fungi and native species and birdlife along the river walking track. Andrew suggested that if the Charlton community could start cataloguing their unique biodiversity through a website like https:// inaturalist.ala.org.au/ it would help with future projects and funding. It is as simple as taking a photo, or recording a sound of any bird, animal or plant on your phone and uploading to the app. You don't even have to be able to identify it as others will assist. Images can be copyrighted too if you prefer.

Tessa said, "There are so many amazing apps that we can use to record what is around us and if we want to learn, apps like frogid or birdsong are great. Then there are the apps like Snap Send and Solve that we should all have on our phones. This allows us to take a photo of weeds in our district and send them straight to Buloke Shire Council. We will work with the right authorities to ensure they do not become problematic like the gazanias, boxthorns, and wheel cactus. The image records the precise location, and we will work with Buloke to advocate for action in these problem areas."

"But we are not all about weeds, we would love to undertake projects enhancing our ecotourism and regenerative agriculture, but first we need to reach out for new members. Membership is free and you can either email <a href="mailto:charltonlandcare@gmail.com">charltonlandcare@gmail.com</a>, or pop into the Charlton Neighbourhood House and we are encouraging everyone to follow us on Facebook." Tessa explained.


Year 5 & 6 have been having some fun on their weekly Webex catch ups.

# Vale Dr Brian Walklate 1925-2021

Dr Walklate has been a significant presence in the Charlton Community for over sixty years. In his role as a country G.P, he impacted many lives, bringing some into the world, saving others and being present at the end when someone passed away. He delivered many babies and in some cases, two generations of the same family.

Dr Walklate was the son of Rev. Cyril and Irene Walklate, born in Wangaratta on 19th October, 1925. He attended Wesley College, and after completing school, aged 16, he commenced medical studies at Melbourne University. Upon failing his first year, he joined the Navy and served during WW2. At the end of the war he was offered the opportunity to recommence his studies, which he did, completing his internship in Melbourne.

Dr Brian Walklate came to Charlton in 1953 with wife, Mary and baby daughter, Sue, and formed a partnership with Dr Jewell who had been practising in Charlton since 1950. Like many other practitioners of his era, Dr Walklate would make house calls, day and night. He would think nothing of returning from holidays and driving for hours to deliver a baby, before driving all the way back again. In the days before there was an ambulance, he would transport an accident victim using his own station wagon.

Dr Walklate's expertise in surgery, obstetrics and anaesthesia made him greatly in demand for locum work, not only in the surrounding districts but also in southern N.S.W. Dr Walklate tried to 'retire' on a number of occasions only to be called back into service so Charlton was not without a doctor. He also supervised three overseas doctors in their bid to become registered in Australia.

Dr Walklate was involved in obtaining a new twelve bed Bush Nursing Hospital for Charlton in 1965 and was also instrumental in setting up the Meals on Wheels, Home Nursing and Home Help Services. He was a major promoter in the establishment of the Senior Citizens Club in 1961. Dr Walklate, as with other previous doctors, was heavily involved in community affairs. He joined

the tennis and golf clubs soon after arriving in Charlton taking on various roles over many vears. He was awarded a Charlton Golf Club Life Membership in 1986. He was an inaugural member of the Charlton Rotary Club and served as President on multiple occasions. Brian was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship for his service to Rotary in 1988 as was Mary. For his services to medicine and the community Dr Walklate received the Charlton Citizen of the Year Award in 1994, was accorded a testimonial dinner and received the Rural Health Award in 2002, and received an Order of Australia in 2006. In July 2009, Rotary erected a plaque in his honour in Rotary Park.

Dr Walklate finally relinquished his medical registration in 2010.

Dr Walklate is survived by his wife, Mary and children, Sue, Ric, Jan & Phil.

#### Remembering Dad As read by Phil Walklate

The longevity of a life creates a wealth of memories and much to reflect upon - and so now I reflect on "Doc", "Walkie", "Pro", "Bri" and "Pa" to recall some of the monikers attached to him along the way.

As his long career as the local doctor came to its conclusion, the town he tirelessly served generously acknowledged his contribution. His achievements have been recorded, but what of the man himself – his character that gave him his purpose to life and the way he lived it. And how he shared his journey with our own? This is how I reflect on the man I called "Dad".

No doubt about it - he was a unique character, a product of his lineage perhaps, for his father was something of a character as well – and now I have witnessed them both in the final stages of life.

If I had to choose one word to describe the man - then it would simply be "busy", and how I will probably remember him most. He always needed to feel useful, to have purpose in his presence - doing something and it often didn't matter what or how menial the task. In his later stages as his physical capabilities were taken from him, you could see the frustration in



him as his capacity to do things and contribute waned, and he began to lose his own sense of purpose. In the end he was hanging on for mum but ready to go – in his mind his purpose served.

I've often felt that he was introverted if not shy in his nature - not naturally inclined to seek the limelight or the attention, and comfortable with his own company. This might surprise some because he would often put himself out there, and attention came to him none-theless through the course of his work and his place within the community he served, and sometimes when he felt the need to stir the pot or to prick the conscience of his target. This was no doubt his father Cyril's influence living on in him, a man who was also known to speak out on issues even if unpopular to some - and yet the introvert remained his essence throughout his life. This may explain in part his "busyness" - sometimes as an avoidance of social situations or as an icebreaker - it's easier to relate to people while working on a shared task.

Trying to describe him as a father I find quite challenging and complex and one that I will reflect upon for some time. Being older now I better understand that we are all complex in our own way – products of our own upbring and life events.

Only recently chatting with Mum and Dad I learnt a part of the story of his WW2 service. Brian was initially deployed to munitions, but a government minister known to the family came across his path and arranged to have him moved to the navy where he served as a medical orderly. Mum and Dad

later reflected that they felt his father's hand was behind his war service involvement. Both Cyril and Irene lost their brothers in the first world war – they knew the cost.

He would say he always knew he wanted to be a doctor and he was devoted to his work. But I know, despite his dedication to his profession and where we stood in his priorities, he loved us all and we wanted for nothing material and I have fond memories of time spent together.

But it will not be the material things that I will remember. It's the time we spent together, and I can still recall:

- \* sitting on his lap as a small child allowing me to steer the car as we came back from a trip to the tip
- \* being in the back yard and him telling me of the frogs he kept for pregnancy testing. I don't know how or if he ever used them in any meaningful way
- being carted around on the golf bag on a Saturday so he & Mum could play golf
- being taught how to play golf in the back yard with the seemingly lethal practice ball on a string
- \* as a young teenager building the train-set together
- \* our various wood-working projects in the shed (he was never far away to lend a hand on these projects)
- and out on the golf course, but particularly the time playing at Barwon Heads.

We will all carry our memories of him - but perhaps the most cherished for me will be his smile.

Maybe it's what a child seeks

most from a parent - that acknowledgement - it never leaves you.

In his final days even when he would struggle to open his eyes, it was there – that smile and acknowledgment.

He loved playing his chosen sports - there was football in the younger years (though I don't recall him ever talking about his playing days and anvthing I heard was from others). Tennis was a sport he enjoyed for an extended period of his life, and of course golf was something he enjoyed most of all and was able to share with his family. His golf tutoring at the course was how he acquired his nickname of "Pro", that or the fact he didn't mind telling you what you should be doing but the coaching was just another example of how he kept himself busy – as if he didn't have enough to do being the GP for the town. He loved the game and studied it with many books.

Even when relaxing at home he would be active - model making, collecting model cars & tapestry for a period, and of course his woodwork were just some examples of the interests he would pursue.

Physically he has gone but he will always remain with us in our minds where he will live on larger than life. His legacy to us are the values he has shared with us by example – in the way he lived his life. (These values I feel were his father's also).

I know he will be with me for the rest of my life's journey, as I am reminded constantly in the mannerisms I often exhibit!

We reflect on his life and sadness weighs upon us – but such emotions were not to be dwelled upon too long by his way of thinking. These thoughts only got in the way of what needed to be done next.

Again - being busy was his way.

Faint praise and overt encouragement were not the tools of his trade! I think maybe he saw these as tools often misused. His approach was to challenge you if you strayed from good form or a path where your intent was about self-first or not thinking of others or the greater good (Again I feel this was also his father's influence).

The Rotarian ideology of "service above self" perhaps captures how he approached life. He didn't speak of it, he just did it.

Charlton became his home in every sense of the word. Serving the community gave him his purpose and fulfilment in his life. We would joke amongst us of Dad's reluctance to be on the other side of the town's speed restrictions!

Dad and Mum came to the town in its 'rebuilding' phase after WW2. My child's memory from the 60's is that it was a vibrant time in the town's history. The shops, full of businesses and the community hard at work creating the services it needed. It was a busy community – just the fit for him.

And as the town has thanked him for his service, so I would think he would thank the town in return—for it has given him a good life – a place to practise his profession, raise a family and make a contribution to the community.

Remembering Dad cannot be done without the acknowledgement of Mary (Mum) by his side and the marriage they shared for over seventy years. It was their partnership in life and love for each other that gave them both a blessed life. Mum's support for her husband, raising and nurturing the family gave him the opportunity to practise his profession and serve his community in the manner that he did.

So now, if I were to sum up his life with two words, I would need to look no further and draw inspiration from the man himself and a turn of phrase he would often use.

The memory comes to mind of the old family home in Camp Street, Dad sitting at the kitchen table and Mum enquiring if he had had enough to eat. Dad would look up from the paper he was reading – it was The Age newspaper, and he would probably be doing the crossword – and he'd simply reply "Yes thanks, I've had eloquent sufficiency"

Well Dad, your life has indeed been one of "eloquent sufficiency"

- and we will miss you.

# Vale Raymond Walsh 1940 - 2021

Tribute as read by Hayley.

Born at Epworth Hospital Richmond on the 6<sup>th</sup>February 1940, Raymond was the only and eldest son of George and Pauline and sister to Heather.

Growing up in Elsternwick, Melbourne, he attended Elsternwick Primary school and then his secondary schooling was at Caulfield Grammar, where he enjoyed footy days and the camaraderie and friendship he had with his peers. He would help out after school in his Dad's shoe repair shop, which was located near the Elsternwick railway station. He excelled at mathematics and was very good at figures, he had an opportunity to study and work in accounting but chose not to.

Dad commenced his apprenticeship at age 16 on 9th January 1956 at Melford Motors, South Melbourne, attending Richmond Tech for 5 years and completing his apprenticeship on 17 January 1961. One of his first jobs was to paint the entire workshop. He worked on Lindsay Fox's first truck which some of you will remember featured, restored in a TV ad with Lindsay. He also related tales of the Fox family's petty criminal past. He also did a wool classing course at RMIT 1954 – 1955.

Dad knocked around with Athol Guy of Seekers fame and often talked about him playing his Mother's piano and how he played it so aggressively he thought it may fall apart. He also spent some time around the St Kilda football club as Athol played under 19's and was a quietly passionate Saints supporter. He and some mates got into some strife at the football club one Saturday night and luckily Carl Ditterich was able to step in and help them.

Most Friday nights would see Dad head from the city up to his Aunty Flo's farm at Cooma near Stanhope, to spend time with his cousins, the Millers. Here they enjoyed their time together boating and fishing. He loved the farm and I think he would have loved to be a farmer. There were also get togethers with his cousins in Melbourne, which were always a highlight. In his younger days there were trips to the trots at the Showgrounds, with his father, which were much treasured. Race 4 horse 7 was the Saturday bet which Dad's parents started and he continued, one of us will have to keep the tradition going.

Dad came to Charlton in 1965 where he was in business, where Tormey's Supermarket is today. Dad quickly established himself in the local community and often told the story of having to go out for several days in a row to start Steve Zagame's tractor for him when Steve first moved to the district. His knowledge of trucks came in handy over the years especially keeping the older trucks on the road. Farmers would go and see dad about their old trucks right up until his retirement. His knowledge and contacts in the industry will be sadly missed.

He met Mum in 1968 while she was working across the road at the hairdressers.

In 1970 he commenced work as the Service Manager and RACV Patrolman at R J Lowes, where their current business still exists today. He spoke highly of his former colleagues during this time.

Mum and Dad married in 1970 at the St Andrew's Presbyterian Church, having the reception at The Cricket Club Hotel and enjoyed a honeymoon in Mildura at the caravan park. This commenced a life long partnership. To borrow a line from Forrest Gump they were like peas and carrots, al-

They first lived at Barrakee after they were married, moving to Charlton in 1973 and into their current residence at View St in 1974. The travel time to work would not have been much different from how I have heard both of them would drive the big V8 cars on the Borung Road.

The children soon followed with Craig being born in 1971, Hayley in 1972 and Raquel in 1975.

In 1991 Walsh Motors was established with Craig, where dad worked until 2020 when he was forced into retirement with his health starting to deteriorate and the potential impact of the pandemic looming on his health. He was very proud of all his children and of Craig on all he achieved and how he grew the business.

His was a working life unselfishly dedicated to the motor trade industry and the RACV. Although I shudder to think the reception some of the stranded drivers who had broken down received on a Saturday night after a couple of beers when Raquel would drive him to jobs. Perhaps not the same as the TV ads.

In his spare time you would find Dad tinkering in his shed or Ray's hardware store as we all like to refer to it as. It was his place to be fixing and building things.

Model trains, which he had a room dedicated to, were a passion, as were trains in general, particularly riding on and train spotting. Dad knew his trains.

Family was obviously his great love, even though work and RACV calls kept him busy, he always made time to follow us kids, in whatever we did. This flowed down to the grandkids following them and having a healthy interest in their sporting pursuits be it footy, cricket, netball or anything else they were involved in. He was a great supporter of the Charlton community sponsoring many community events over a long period which Craig has continued. For example, the business has sponsored the Charlton Football Club for over 30 years.

Dad loved all his family including his extended family, cousins and second cousins. He spoke glowingly of them all and always seemed to know what they were up to.

Proud of us all and supporting us no matter what, he never had a disparaging word



even though he must of shook his head at some our decisions.

Basically his life was dedicated to his work and to his family. I recall one of their trips to our house in Castlemaine with the car and trailer full of tools and material for jobs around the house, due to the ineptitude of his son in law with tools. Dad would be pleased to know he has improved, slightly. They would work all weekend, Mum being his loyal labourer. Around 4 o'clock on Sunday the car would be packed up, it seemed Mum did most of this, and they would head home for another week of work on Monday. The trips were extremely appreciated and I know they did the same for Chris and Raquel. I hope we can also do the same for our children although probably with less skill.

Dad could do nearly anything, electrical, plumbing, carpentry, brickwork. I remember one time he was up a very tall ladder, it was nearly the height of a two story house, working on a leaking gutter. He would have been in his early sixties, way too old to be climbing a ladder but always wanted to help. He never saw himself as old even in the last few months with Mum wanting him to use the walker. 'No I am not using that I will look old,' he said. You will see a photo of Dad taken 9 days before he passed, sitting on the verandah on his phone to his sister with a crocheted rug on his lap, even then when I called him Grandpa he didn't like that.

Mum and Dad enjoyed many live shows and musicals. They enjoyed a few interstate holidays when us kids sent them on trips including Tassie in 1995 to celebrate their 25<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary, Perth in 2000 to

celebrate their 30<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary and in 2010 a train trip on The Ghan for Dads 70<sup>th</sup> birthday. They enjoyed trips away with Raquel and Chris which involved fishing, travelling on trains and holidaying at the beach. Chris and Dad any chance they got would go fishing, with little or no success. They also enjoyed a few trips in their caravan.

An important feature of Dad's day were the daily newspapers, which always consumed his time, especially the comics. He also liked his monthly train magazines, keeping him up to date with all things rail.

Dad liked a beer. I remember Jamey coming for tea at Mum & Dad's house and couldn't believe that after having dessert Dad would have another beer. For Jamey the sweet food would ruin the taste, not for Dad. Adam on several occasions when talking to Dad at the office just before 5, he would have to follow him around to continue the conversation as he found his basket, which Mum always sent lunch for him and Craig in, and turning all the lights off as it was time to go, Beer o'clock.

Dad enjoyed and looked forward to his Friday nights at The Charlton Club after his working week, to catch up with friends, have a beer and discuss all matters of interest. He was always happy for friends to drop in for dinner, a chat and enjoy a beer or a glass of wine (or 2)!

Dad was Dad, what you saw was what you got. One of the most big hearted grumpy buggers you could meet. His best kept secret was he was quite emotional, but don't tell anyone.

We will cherish the time and many memories we have all shared with you, that is something that can never be taken away.

You never complained and fought the battle until the end and to lose you is so hard but you knew it was time.

A friend who also lost his Father to Cancer 2 months ago said to me 'they must be after the extra special ones this year' and Dad to us, you were very special.

A good, honest and well lived life. Rest easy Ray, Dad and Pa

We would like to pass on our thanks and appreciation to East Wimmera Health Charlton, The District Nurses Anne and Deb, Dr Webb, St John of God Hospital and Oncology Staff and Dr Sam Harris, for their care and attention given to Dad over the past 2 years.

Thank you to Mum for taking care of Dad for the 50+years of your marriage, especially the last 2 years since diagnoses and the last months when his health deteriorated. We know Dad really appreciated it and hated being helpless.

# St Joseph's Churches in Charlton & Banyena, East Wimmera Parish

In the East Wimmera Parish, we have two churches named after St Joseph, one in Banyena and the other in Charlton. Both were built at a time when Australian gold rushes were changing the convict colonies into more progressive cities with the influx of free immigrants.

Banyena, 40 kms west of St Arnaud, is the church recognised in the recently released film "The Dry". St. Joseph's Banyena was built in 1876 using timbers from the local Bolangum Hills. These timbers were carted by bullock teams and it was indeed a labor intensive exercise. The church still stands to this day with some modifications.

The original church in Charlton was built around the same time as Banyena, although 30 years later the Bishop of Ballarat, Dr Higgins, appealed to the people of Charlton to build a new church and the corner stone was laid in 1907. It was unfortunate that on January 1, 1991 this church was destroyed by fire but has since been replaced by a more modern building which stands in pride of place today.

Although a similar start to Banyena, Charlton also has a catholic school attached to it. St Joseph's primary school started in 1895/96 and classes were held in the church during the week. The four main classrooms of the present school were built in 1959,


and more rooms were added in the sixties and seventies. The school is still in operation and values the role of St Joseph in its teachings.

Throughout St Joseph's Banyena and Charlton's 145-year history they have played a central role in the life of local families. They have been the place to celebrate both joyous occasions and to join together to support each other during times of loss and difficulty.

# Charlton Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome to the latest catch up from the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. It has been a great pleasure to again open our museum doors to the public following the easing of some lockdown restrictions, and we are looking forward to the vaccine rates in the community being at a level where life will be getting back to some normality. As is always the case, our members have continued to do a great job working on listing new donations and trying to keep doing all the behind the scene things that require atten-

We were pleased recently to be able to hold our Annual Meeting General within COVID-19 restrictions, and even though the year was severely interrupted with lockdowns, so many achievements were listed by our President, Anne Kenny. All Office Bear-ers accepted nominations to remain in their current roles. and it was agreed that the year ahead would be a very productive one for the museum with planned exhibitions and road trips.

Our Secretary, Carolyn, had the privilege of showcasing our museum to the Governor of Victoria, The Honourable Linda Dessau AC, and her husband, Mr Anthony Howard. It was a virtual visit and Carolyn had the opportunity to talk about the museum and showcase some of our treasured items. The 1928 Football Premtrophy, won iership Woosang Football proved a winner with both the Governor and Mr Howard being avid AFL fans.

The museum also took part in the AMaGA Awards on Tuesday 5th, where in another virtual event, we were awarded our accreditation. This can be viewed on YouTube at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=nD\_Hcy3pxWY.

With the longer days and warmer weather approaching, this month's feature looks at the history of the Charlton Swimming Pool. Many old images are held at the museum of happy days being enjoyed at the popular swimming spots prior to the pool's construction, including the old Charlton Weir. Following the successful 1926 'Back to Charlton' celebrations, 100 pounds of the event's profit was allocated towards the establishment of community baths, on condition a similar community amount could be raised within 12 months by the Charlton Progress Association. This was achieved, and with a further grant from the State Government, sufficient funds were on hand to start construction of the concrete baths and changing shed. The official opening was

on the 19<sup>th</sup> November 1937 by Cr William Williams and was so successful 150 pounds was made which went towards the baths opening debt of 390 pounds. Total cost was 1083 pounds for the 20 metre x 40 metre structure which had a depth of just under one metre to over 2 metres. It was the first baths opened in northern Victoria.

With the hot summer climate, the Charlton Council realized from the late 1940's the desirability of a better pool with a water filtration plant and children's paddling pool would be required, but construction of the new pool was held up due to shortages of steel and concrete. The old baths remained in operation until the current Charlton pool was opened in December 1961, where in its first year of operation over 18,000 visits were recorded, excluding school groups. This grew to almost 21,000 attendances 2 years later in the 1963/4 season. This pool continues to serve Charlton with upgrades to the buildings in recent years.

The museum is always looking for more new members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. You can also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection or historic

- Or you can ring the Australian Immunisation Register 1800-653 809 and they will send it to you. This takes approximately 14 days. We recommend you make copies of this certificate.
