Charlton Lions Club Helping Hand For Refugees

It was the harrowing news footage of people fleeing the Taliban during the departure of American troops from wartorn Afghanistan which struck people across the globe.

The fear, chaos and desperation, etched into every scene, as men, women and children tried to escape a regime noted for its intolerance and archaic social codes. This was the catastrophic end to twenty years of conflict as Afghanistan collapsed even further into a dislocated abyss.

The emotional impact struck a chord with Charlton Lions member, and Zone 9 Chairperson, Zie Brindley.

Providing a catalyst for action, Zie approached the Charlton Lions Board about sanctioning a response to the crisis - a request which was readily granted.

"I watched the distressing scenes unfold on the television news," said Zie, "and I rang ABC TV to find out who they would recommend we contact to offer assistance."

Connecting with the Australian Relief Organisation (ARO) - (a not-for-profit NGO delivering humanitarian initiatives domestically and internationally) - the need to help refugees settling in Australia with the delivery of basic essentials was earmarked for the Club's Humanitarian Aid project.

"We are working with the Melbourne headquarters of ARO," said Zie "and they suggested supporting the families who arrive here with nothing."

As Project Manager, Zie has secured the support of not only the Charlton Lions Club, but the generous input from a range of local outlets which have provided necessities for day-to-day living.

"Our sponsors have been so generous," Zie said, "donating quality new men's, women's and children's clothing, new shoes, toiletries, toys, kitchen items, stationery, books and linen. Charlton supermarket – Tormey's IGA - donated the boxes, which we are currently packing, and which will be freighted to the ARO Melbourne headquarters, from where they will be distributed to those in need."

Support has also come from the neighbouring town of Wycheproof with the Wycheproof Info, Arts and Craft Centre and the Wycheproof Op Shop taking part, in tandem with the Charlton Au-Newsagency thorised Charlton Op Shop.

"We currently have around 13 boxes filled, and are looking to send the consignment during November," said Zie. "However, if people wish to contribute, items are still welcome. Please ensure these are good quality, and if you need any further information, or would like to make a financial donation, please contact me on 0447 899 968."

"This project aligns with the focus areas of Lions Club International Global Causes,

which addresess many unmet needs across domestic and global regions. These include issues like health, the environment, emergency response, as well as humanitarian aid," Zie said

With the Lions Australia tag -line of "Together we can change the world", this is exactly what the Charlton Club is putting into action.

Charlton Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome to another catch up from the Charlton Golden Grains Museum. As the year quickly draws to a close and our state reopens for business, the work of our dedicated volunteers goes on. We are able to welcome visitors who are double vaccinated to our building to view our displays. We continue the work of family research requests. We are looking forward to 2022 when we can again start our social road trips to visit other museums and historic areas, and also hold several delayed exhibitions here in Charlton.

Our feature story this month concerns a woman who was much loved in the Charlton community, Marjorie McDonald. Marjorie was the Sunday School teacher at St Andrew's Church between 6 August 1939 and 5 May 1959. Born in Balwyn to Colin and Catherine McDonald, she was the Manager of Judd's Store from the early 1940s. The Charlton Tribune, in its August 14, 1959 issue features a story on a presentation evening for Marjoire prior to her forthcoming marriage to Councillor W. H. Wood. Reverend A. H. Leitch presented a wrought iron flower trough on behalf of the Sunday School and Mothers' Group, as well as a crystal salad bowl and dishes from the church community. All attending wished her every happiness. Sadly Marjorie died suddenly in Melbourne on September 4, aged 41. Representatives of the Shire Council, Rotary Club, Masonic Lodge, Church and friends travelled to Melbourne to attend her funeral at Springvale.

Don't forget that for just \$10.00 we will scan and securely store an A4 size archival envelope of papers recording your family's story. This could include copies of family trees, photographs, written histories or similar items. These will be recorded on our database and available to view at a later date by researchers of your family or those with an interest in the district. The museum also raises much needed funds through research for individuals. Many enquiries for family history are received from around Australia, and we are often able to provide images and newspaper clippings for these requests. If you want to find out information about your family or home address contact any of the people listed below.


The museum is always looking for more new members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during

Horses For Different Courses

Highlighting the biggest week of the Spring Racing Carnival, it seemed timely to focus attention on our equine friends. And while Charlton is predominantly recognized for its harness racing association, this is a story about two stately steeds who, while not lining up at the barrier, still have plenty of pulling power.

Let me introduce you to "George" and "Edward" - two life-size horse sculptures which grace the Charlton High Street residence of Susan Nelson and Wayne Keenan.

Located at the southern entrance to the township on the corner of High and Kaye Streets, this dwelling was built on the former location of Charlton's oldest business – Kirk's Coach Factory.

Established in 1879, Kirk's quickly became one of the town's most successful outlets, winning numerous awards for its high-quality coaches and buggies, and prompting the East Charlton Tribune of 1896 to report that "Mr. Kirk has taken out more gold medals than any other coach builder in the colony."

When Susan and Wayne moved to town in 2018, they were aware that their new home was the former residence of the Noske Mill manager, however a catch-up with Carolyn Olive from the Golden Grains Museum revealed the connection to the earlier history and triggered the momentum for some overt recognition.

The couple erected signage detailing the history of Kirk's Coach Factory, added a restored carriage and now, the two teak horse sculptures have completed the picture.

While the carriage has had some "important" passengers over the past couple of years (Santa and the Easter Bunny), it is the horses which are now really capturing the imagination.

Owner, Susan Nelson said the sculptures had originally grabbed her attention at Schots Home Emporium (furniture and home improvements store) when she and Wayne lived in Melbourne, but not having enough space at their then home, they had to remain admired from afar.

With the move to the larger premises in Charlton, and the connection to the early days of transport, Susan said it was a perfect match to install the sculptures in the surrounds of their new home.

Made in Indonesia, from hundreds of small pieces of teak, each separate unit is dowelled together onto a frame to build up the bulk of the animal. Using an infinite variety of shapes and sizes, the horse's features are simulated through the shapes of the wooden off-cuts.

Weather-proofed with an American wood stain used for ship decking, the two structures are bolted onto concrete pads to keep them raised off the moist garden beds.

"We had plenty of attention driving them back from Melbourne in our trailer", said Susan. "And while they were forklifted on down there, at 150kgs and 100kgs, we ended up having to get help to have them unloaded back here."

Placing the figures near the fence-line

meant passersby had a clear view and makes it easier for anyone wanting to take photos. Susan said they have on average 5-8 people a day stop to take a look. "Wayne says we should have a donation tin at the gate," she laughed, "but we think it's more of a Charlton drawcard, and that people might then stop off in town to pick something up or drop in at the Museum."

Word-of-mouth has brought travellers from considerable distances to see the display, including relatives of the original William Kirk.

"We had a letter from his great, great grandson – also named William Kirk- and his great granddaughter dropped in for a visit last Christmas," said Susan.

So, as for the naming of the horses?

Well, Susan explains thus – "Wayne is involved with the

Charlton Bowling Club and George Parish was one of the mainstays of the Club, so we named one horse "George". And George had a twin brother named Ed, so the other horse is "Edward". However, the story gets even better, because when we purchased the sculptures from Schots the salesperson said they would be missed and referred to them by name – "George" and "Fred" – only this time they were named after the Weasley twins from the "Harry Potter" stories."

"I couldn't believe that we had both chosen the same name!" said Susan.

While "Edward" and "George" continue (in spirit) to gaze over their home town of Charlton, their fame, like many of their real-life counterparts continues to grow - even without having to set foot on a track!

Tackling a Problem Head On

Charlton's Bill Freeman is known for his quick quips and creative responses, but just lately, he has taken creativity to another level.

Bill has recently been observed cycling around town wearing what looks like a helmet from a Mad Max movie.

The futuristic item resembles an antenna-like contraption, and from a distance it could be construed as being some sort of transmitter or receptor – (earth to the universe, perhaps?)

A closer inspection reveals DIY of the highest order in response to the age-old problem of deterring swooping magpies. And while Bill hasn't experienced attacks along the lines of Hitchcock's famous avian thriller "The Birds", he has had to take steps to ensure his regular cycling remains free

from the bird blitz.

"About a month ago I was attacked four times on the left ear by a magpie," said Bill. "I did some research to find a solution and using cable ties threaded through the openings of the bike helmet was offered as something of a deterrent".

However, the spikey solution was only partially effective against the determined and overprotective bird.

With ears still unguarded, and the bird still aggressive, further additions were required. To the rescue came Bill's wife, Joy, who attached plastic food containers to the helmet to act as shields for the exposed parts.

While the resulting head covering is "unique", the design is unlikely to be patented Bill said, and even though the magpie is still attacking, at least his ears are now safe.

Having moved into Charlton

from Buckrabanyule a number of years ago, Bill has once again taken up cycling and is enjoying the exercise it offers.

Eager to recount some cycling exploits of his earlier years he offered the following (magpie-free) story.

"When I was about 20, I was living in Melbourne and once cycled from East Hawthorn to Yallourn to visit my friend, Russell, who was an apprentice chemist there. This was quite

some ride – in the vicinity of 70-80 miles" Bill said. "Greatly impressed by my feat, Russell would ever afterwards introduce me as "This is my friend Bill, and he rode his bike here from Melbourne". "However, having expended so much energy on the ride to Yallourn, I hasten to add that I did not cycle back to Melbourne, but rather hopped on a train for the return journey!"

Rex Extension - Funding & Renovation

An \$800,000 grant from the Victorian Government's *Regional Cultural Infrastructure Fund* will enable the Rex Theatre to commence a much-needed backstage upgrade.

Starting in the next week or so, the project incorporates the construction of a functional backstage area, toilet upgrade — with all-abilities access - comprehensive storage capabilities for diverse theatrical presentations and stage access supportive for all.

As the demolition and construction work begins, the blockage of fire exits on either side of the stage and the loss of the toilets means the Rex will not comply with building regulations and so cannot operate as a cinema/theatre. We, therefore, regret to inform patrons that our re-opening will be stalled until June 2022.

Although disappointing in the shortterm, the resulting outcome will set the Rex up for more diversified live performance opportunities, as well as better addressing the needs of both patrons and performers.

While the turbulence of the past two

years has tested everyone's patience with the "on-again-off-again" lock-downs, and numerous restriction guidelines, we are now looking forward to a new era of the Rex and the possibilities this extension/upgrade will provide for cultural variety. Bear with us a little longer, and the rewards will be evident. The Rex will be enhanced as a community hub, be more userfriendly and will, once again, be a shining light in our vibrant community!



Dr Walklate's Reminiscence

In June 2002 Dr Walklate was given a testimonial dinner by a grateful town after 49 years of dedicated service. During his acceptance speech, Dr Walklate reminisced about times past, particularly when he first arrived in Charlton in 1953. Below is an extract. I have added notations to allow for changes since 2002.

Garages

The garages we had were Neil Rogers's which is now Patton's [Signwise Solutions), Claude Dew which is now IGA, Bob Golding and Vince O'Brien where North Central Panel Beaters are, Jack Kerr was where Walsh's are now and Jack Dowey was ACA (next to Opshop]. They all sold motor cars and they all had mechanics.

Grocer Shops

We had five grocer shops, they all did well.

Egans had two shops, they did very well, they had a mixed store next to Ronnie Good's [Charlton Timber & Hardware] that somehow mysteriously got burnt down. They also had a grocer's shop which was taken over by the Club.

We had Luth's [now Foodworks]. It was a marvelous place. People who didn't live in the day of Luths really missed something. An amazing store, you could buy virtually everything from there. When we had our house built it was carpeted by Luths.

You could buy a car at Luths. You could go and get measured for a suit at Luths. When Bill Patton was there, I remember him measuring me up for different things. They had a grocer shop beside which was run by a fellow called Hal Erwin, who was a great character and actually an ex-prisoner of war with the Japanese.

Butchers

We had three butchers. There was one where the empty shop is near the theatre, and we had Bannons that is 'Bourkeys' now [Charlton Quality Meats]. Bannons was also very good, because he had a cart and he used to go around the streets and you could buy meat from the cart. He would chop it up for you.

Fruit & Veg

Old Joe Zinni used to go

around with a fruit and vegetable cart. You didn't have to go down the street for anything, he called on you.

We had Clarks, they all did

The Milkman

We had a milkman. He'd come around and we would put our 'billy can' out and he'd fill it up with milk. There was no such thing as bottles.

It was Cliff Jackson who practised from where Joan Cadzow lives today.

Clothing

Clothing, we had Luths, Roy Dobson had a shop, Maurice Kenny. I used to buy beautiful shirts from Maurice Kenny, and he was a good man. We had Bill Clark for the women.

Agents

Agents in the town were Dalgettys, Australian Estates, VPC and AML.

Tractors

Tractors, we had Ryans, Vince Bennett and Norm Lindhe who practised where Luths originally built their shop.

Saddlers

We had two saddlers, George Babidge, a mine of information in there with the things he had. Anything leather he could make it.

Bakers

We had two bakers, Allens the Baker is where the empty block is near the old Presbyterian Church [now Bakery Lane Apartments], and Jack Griffin in the same place as the present baker.

Telephone Exchange

One of the most wonderful things we had in Charlton when we first came here was the Telephone Exchange. I suppose the people on the party line didn't like it because when I had to ring up and talk to a patient, I had to be very careful what I said because you would hear the click, click as everyone had a listen. The other good thing about it was I'd ring up to talk to somebody and the telephonist would say, I'm sorry, but she's not home because I just saw her going into Luths. Or people would ring my number wanting to talk to me and the telephonist would say 'Oh don't worry he has gone to Wycheproof'. They were a fountain of information and it



was good, actually it saved a lot of heart break at times!

Electricity

The other wonderful thing we had was the Powerhouse. We had our own power source before the SEC came to town. I lived in Camp Street and we lived by the sound of that diesel motor going thump, thump all day and night generating electricity.

The Nightman

We even had a 'night man', that's something a lot of people miss!! I always used to say that he was just as important to the town of Charlton as I was. Without him we would have disease and that man helped keep the town clean.

Trade Fairs

There was a big old hall where the present hall is, the shire offices were in that.

We even had a Trade Fair—
it was amazing, the hall was lined with stalls all the way up the sides and in the middle they were double, back to back. All the trade's people in the town had exhibits even cars out the back.

Practising Medicine

When I came here we did hysterectomies, gall bladders, hernias. I remember doing 10 appendectomies in Charlton in a fortnight. It was an epidemic. I did 10 in Donald and almost the same in Wycheproof. At the hospital we operated every week, we would do 2 or 3 ops most weeks. I'd either give anaesthetics for Dr Jewell or he would give them for me.

We would have between 50-75 mids. In one year there was 100. Now we are lucky to get half a dozen.

I remember first coming to Charlton, it was January. We came up to spend a week with the Jewells. It was the most uncomfortable week I've ever had. I don't know why I came back to practise.

It was 107 for the whole week. I slept in a little room out the back that had one little window, one wire door, a tin roof and was about the size of a decent loo!

My God it was hot! We never had air conditioning in those days. Everybody walked the streets to keep cool and get a bit of fresh air.

Charlton has been a great place for me, I've enjoyed it, and I've raised my family here. The town has been good to me and good to my children....I thank you all for being part of it.






