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Kelvin awarded PhD

Recently Kelvin Getley, son of Alan and Lorna Getley, was awarded a PhD after many years of hard work. Kelvin agreed to provide some details on his thesis and his plans for the future.

My graduation ceremony at USQ was postponed due to Covid so my award was conferred "in absentia" (so I'm officially graduated), however I'll be attending a ceremony when things settle down a bit.

My PhD in Astronomy was completed through the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) as an off-campus student. I started it in 2013 and finished in 2021. My PhD was supervised by Prof. Brad Carter (Professor of Physics and Director of the Centre for Astrophysics at USQ), Associate Professor Rachel King (Associate Professor of Statistics at USQ) and Dr. Simon O'Toole (Head of Data & IT and Data Central Project Scientist at the Australian Astronomical Optics at Macquarie University).

My thesis (completed as a Thesis by Publication) was titled "Detecting binary star planetary and brown dwarf companions from analysis of eclipse timing variations" where the bulk of it is made up of my three articles that have been published in the Monthly Notices of the Royal Astronomical Society. The focus of the thesis was on eclipsing binary stars (two

stars that are gravitationally bound together and happen to be lined up so that they periodically pass in front of each other, or eclipse, when viewed from Earth) and analysing the times of the eclipses to look for variations in the expected eclipse time and the actual eclipse time to determine if there are any other objects orbiting the stars.

The three papers I've had published are:

1) "Evidence for a planetary mass third body orbiting the binary star KIC 5095269" — Where I provide evidence of a planet that has 7.7 times the mass of Jupiter orbiting two stars outside our solar system.

2) "Stability of planetary, single M dwarf, and binary star companions to Kepler detached eclipsing binaries and a possible five-body system" — Where I analyse previously reported systems to ensure they are stable over the long term (i.e. the planets/stars remain gravitationally bound) as well as discover a few additional bodies (mostly stars) such as a non-eclipsing binary that itself eclipses an eclipsing binary.

3) "The detectability of binary star planetary and brown dwarf companions from eclipse timing variations." – I ran tens of thousands of simulations on the National Computational Infrastructure (a supercomputer located at the Australian National University in Canberra) to

determine the extent to which eclipse timing variations can detect low-mass objects around binary stars.

In the immediate term (i.e. over the next few months) I plan on taking some time to rest and relax after a lot of years of hard work. After that I'm hoping to find a postdoc position so I can continue doing research including possibly finding more planets and other weird and wonderful objects hidden out in the universe.

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Polish Consul General Visits Rex

A visit to Charlton's Rex Theatre by the Australian Polish Consul General has laid the foundations for an exciting performance opportunity in 2022.

The Consul General, Dr. Monika Konczyk, along with her son Marcin, and Greg Machnacki (co-ordinator of Polish performance throughout Australia), were touring Victoria during late December, and dropped into the Rex courtesy of a connection with local pianist, Dana Czarski.

Consul General Konczyk was excited about seeing another side of Australia, having travelled from Sydney down along the Great Ocean Road, the Grampians, Halls Gap, then Charlton over the Christmas break, before heading back to NSW.

Visibly impressed with the Rex, Dr. Konczyk said that her role as Consul was about bringing people together and building mutual understanding.

As Dana Czarski played the Steinway Concert grand, the Consul General spoke about building cultural bridges saying, "Music joins people - music finds friends everywhere and brings different nationalities together."

With 2022 marking the 50th anniversary of Australian / Polish diplomatic relations, the visit entailed discussions about holding a special musical occasion at the Rex as celebrations unfold across the country.

The association between Poland and Australia was formalized on 20 February 1972 and acknowledges the connection between the two countries stretching back more than 150 years. While Polish influence filters through Australian culture and can be seen in the naming of the Strezlecki Ranges and Mount Kosciuszko, the country has also absorbed a range of high-profile people with Polish heritage. Actor Jacek Korman, pianist, David Helfgott (Polish Jewish ancestry), Magda Szubanski, personality Karl "Dr. Karl" Kruszelnicki, Lidia Professor Morawska, (Queensland University of Technology) whose research into the transmission of Covid has influenced the management of the disease - are just some who have become established citizens, enriching our national identity.

In consultation with Greg Machnacki - coordinator of the Australian PolArt

Festivals - the Rex management discussed ideas about bringing performers to the theatre to celebrate the diversity and richness of Poland's cultural heritage.


Tapping into his wide resources, Greg and Dr. Konczyk believed that a diversified musical program could be curated for later in the year following the completion of the Rex renovation. Having previously attended the Rex in early 2020 (providing technical support for pianist, David Helfgott's stellar performance) Greg was already familiar with the scope and possibilities offered by

the theatre

Two years into her four- year tenure as Australian Polish Consul General, Dr. Konczyk was effusive about her trip across Victoria, making special mention of the mountainous terrain of the Grampians, which reminded her of her homeland region in Northern Poland. Praising the beauty of the Australian land, and the chance to see a different landscape she said it had provided an opportunity to appreciate the real spirit of the country.

More Than Words - A Remarkable Journey

As we return to a more normal world, and with entertainment back on the agenda, Charlton resident Bruce Gardner's story, about living the life in the rock 'n roll world, is surely one to share. And it was his way with words which helped to make the dream of many a youngster – that of being part of a successful rock band – come true for this teenage boy from Broadmeadows.

While numerous others aspire to fame and fortune, the group Bruce joined ended up creating a sensation not just in his local area, but through backing many of the biggest names in the Australian music scene of the 1960's and '70's.

Now retired, Bruce recently shared his tale at a gathering in Charlton, opening his address with an outline of his passion now for writing poetry. He then back-tracked to reveal the amazing beginnings of his wordsmith work which culminated in providing songs for the hottest new talent on the 60's rock scene – a very young Broadmeadow's group by the name of "Total Fire Band".

As part of the four, then five-member group, Bruce's writing skills were honed during his apprenticeship as a typesetter at the local newspaper, where he also regularly wrote a column about the growing music scene

Initially called, "Platter Chatter" it later morphed into "In Time with Bruce" and provided snappy reviews on the changing music styles generated by the impact of Beatles and the Rolling Stones. Reviews of up-coming records and groups were a feature.

Also a guitarist, (though somewhat modest about his skills), Bruce was invited to join "Total Fire Band" in 1967, following the City of Broadmeadows "Cavalcade of Youth" - an event designed to showcase the talents of all forms of local entertainers within the region. At just 18, he became the oldest member of the group, with the youngest – a school boy of just 15.

The importance of "Total Fire Band" relates as much to the setting in which it was formed as it does to the talents of its members. Broadmeadows in those days was the much-maligned northern suburb of Melbourne - notorious for its rough background, hooliganism and gang fighting. Against such negative associations, the rapid rise and glowing high profile of "Total Fire Band" was like a beacon, and provided an uplift for the area. So much so that the current Broadmeadows Council is planning a retrospective acknowledgement of the group, (hopefully set for next year), with a big music event, complete with special staging and a book to revive interest in the local band which created such a buzz.

The five band members included Wayne Morrison (lead guitar), Mark Eustace (lead singer), Trevor Misselbrook (drums) Doug Willmot (organist) who, along with Bruce, projected a wholesome, clean-cut image. Originally managed by Channel 9 employee, Geoff Crozier, after judging at the "Cavalcade of Youth", the group received massive exposure through television appearances on prime-time shows like "New Faces", "Blind Date", the Royal Children's Hospital Appeal and the iconic, "In Melbourne Tonight", hosted by TV legend, Graham Kennedy,

Starting off small – with local gigs across the northern and western suburbs of Melbourne - "Total Fire Band" rapidly built a following with a fan club and newsletters breathlessly heralding their arrival on the music scene. Given the limited communications of the day, incentives offered through fan membership (including personally autographed photos, a badge, band member bios), plus the attraction of five young men in tune with the "happening" music scene, did the rest.

The band also gained traction through the highly rated radio 3UZ disc jockey of the day, John Vertigan, opening up access to huge numbers of listeners on his immensely popular show.

Profiles in industry publications such as "Go Set" magazine, the Sun "Young Sun" columns, the Herald's "In Black and White" column, support from the prominent DJ, Stan Rofe, plus significant publicity through local newspapers kept the boys in the spotlight.

Commenting on his writing for the band Bruce said: "Normally music is written first, and then lyrics are fitted to the tune. But we did it the other way, and it worked for us. Even today when 1 write poetry or song lyrics 1 put the chords to it last. 1 still have contact with Wayne (Morrison) who lives in New Zealand, and he has helped me through a couple of tricky spots if 1 am struggling with what 1 have written. The range of songs we wrote together was well varied and ranged from soft ballads to heavy and plain old rock and roll,"

The band released a record on their own label (a first back in the day), titled "Billy Cart b/w Lady l Love You", both written by Wayne and Bruce, and released through the Fan Club with initially strong sales. Other hits such as "Flight 224" also gained prominence.

As their profile grew so did their desire to move on to the next level of entertainment. Believing that Geoff no longer had their best interests at heart, the boys went with a change of management, enlisting Arthur Merriman – the Victorian Sales Manager for Overeem Amplifiers - who had seen the band on television. In a move made in heaven, the company supplied the band with state-of-the-art music gear which improved and enhanced their sound, consequently raising their profile even more.

Under Arthur's guidance, and in keeping with their "fire" theme, the band wore red outfits, complete with ladies red, decorative shoes. Bruce remembers the pain endured when the boys took part in the Moomba Parade and instead of being transported on an old fire engine as planned, they had to walk the entire distance in their high heels!

As the audience reactions became more frantic, the boys' shirts were designed with detachable sleeves so they could be ripped off, thereby adding to the frenzy of the moment. Their tagline of "Think pink –but wear red", saw the fan base also adopt their idols' fiery colour scheme. While Bruce no longer has this trend-setting costume, a colour photo from an old press clipping captures the impact!

A reservoir of information is contained in the many scrapbooks of memorabilia which chronicles the band's rise to fame. Progress from local outlets, to regional stopovers and then metro gigs saw them supporting some of the biggest music stars of the time - Ronnie Burns, Normie Rowe, Issi Dye, the Master's Apprentices, Billy Thorpe and the Aztecs – the list reads like a who's-who of Australian musical talent, and confirmed the band's emerging status as a group destined for stardom. They certainly lived up to their moniker of "hot stuff" with reviews proclaiming: "predicted to be one of the top bands of 1970", "teenagers are clamoring for this group to appear in their area", "Total Fire Band - the hottest property around".

Amongst the highlights of their career was their involvement in the 1970 Moomba Parade, of which they were the only accepted rock group to take part. Featuring in the evening pop concert, the boys performed in front of a crowd of around 10,000 spectators. A stint at the 1970 "Battle of The Sounds" at Festival Hall, was another big step which the band embraced. Meeting and supporting the late, indigenous Boxing World Champion, Lionel Rose, at an Australia Day performance where he sang his hit "Let Me thank You", was yet another highpoint.

As 1970 progressed Bruce felt that a cross road had been reached and it was time for him to leave the group. While the band continued for a short time after - capturing a spot at the Sunbury Music Festival, and with member, Denis Dunstan going on to become the Australian manager for Fleetwood Mac, the group knew they had reached the end of the road.

"It was a great experience," said Bruce, "and of course we loved the atmosphere and adoration, but being so young none of us were ready for the really big time which we felt we were being pushed towards. We had a very rapid rise over a short period of time."


Using his writing skills, he headed into

the real estate business, before moving to Charlton with his partner, Annette, in 2012 where they opened the business, "Timeless Treasures and Tea Rooms".

While arthritis now limits his guitar playing, Bruce is still passionate about writing, and is spending time developing his evocative poetry. A trip to Port Arthur triggered an intense affinity with the location – one which he is keen to explore more thoroughly through his poems.

While life's journey can take many routes, an astute way with words has underpinned much of Bruce Gardner's life. This is his story to share.

Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome to our first update from your local Charlton Golden Grains Museum. All of us here are very excited about the year ahead, and all the opportunities that may be presented to continue to grow our wonderful collection of items. It is only thanks to a small number of people who volunteer their time that we are able to present such a wonderful experience to both local and out of town visitors.

We are looking forward to again being able to undertake a few visits to other museums and places of interest during the year, and to welcome like minded groups to make the trip to Charlton and view our displays and records. The museum also intends hosting events during the year that will have a distinct Charlton flavour, and encourage more people to attend and view our collection. Keep an eye open for further details in coming months. Don't forget that we are open every Sunday from 11am to 3pm or by contacting one of the numbers below for all museum related enquiries.

Would you like your family's story recorded for future generations? Late last year we introduced a service where you can record your history for us to scan into our digital reference library, and store a copy of the papers, family images or genealogy charts in an A4 size envelope. This is a wonderful opportunity for stories not to be lost, but preserved for researchers at a later stage. Cost is just \$10, which goes towards helping to maintain our collection.

Many people would not be aware that the museum is also the 'Place of Deposit' (POD) for many old council records, and records for many clubs and organizations that were once located here in Charlton. This ranges from sports' groups to Guides and Scouts, Swimming Club, Young Farmers and many, many more.

This month we are going back to 1933 when The Shire of Charlton signed a four year agreement with The Charlton Electric Light and Power Company Limited to provide public lighting to the town. The cost of the project was two hundred and thirty eight pounds & eight shillings, payable in quarterly instalments of fifty eight pounds & twelve shillings. The contract stipulated that the lights were to remain on from dusk until midnight, apart from two located on the bridge over the Avoca River, which stayed on from dusk until dawn. In total 57 lamps were to be installed, with the electric company providing additional lights free of charge if requested by the shire, so long as they were able to be connected to the main line.

In 2022 the Charlton Golden Grains Museum is continuing looking for more enthusiastic members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish and don't need any experience. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. You can also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items for future generations.

RSL Thank You For Australia Day Award



On Australia Day, Charlton RSL Sub-branch was presented with the Charlton Community Event of the Year 2021 award. The award was in recognition of the Sub-branch/Bendigo Legacy Club celebratory dinner held on 17 April

2021. This dinner was to note and celebrate the raising from Diggers Day golf days of a grand total of \$100,000.00 for Bendigo Legacy.

The first reference to Diggers Day we can trace was in 1935: the event had been most successful, the net profit was 3 pounds 9 shillings and 9 pence.

Charlton Sub-branch decided to donate the net proceeds from Diggers Day golf days to Bendigo Legacy Club; unfortunately the date this decision was made has been lost in the mists of time. Legacy was chosen as beneficiary as Legacy's role is to care for the widows and children of servicemen who die on active service or who die from service related injuries or illness.

Diggers Day resumed after World War 2; in 1947 the net profit was 14 pounds 15 shillings and 4 pence; in 1959 the net profit was 331 pounds 4 shillings and tuppence ha'penny! Look after the ha'pennies and the pounds will look after themselves!

In 1964 the popularity of Diggers Day can be gauged by an entry in Sub-branch minutes: that an extra 18 gallons of beer be obtained as a reserve for Diggers Day. In 1976 the net profit was \$1,040.55. And so Diggers Day continued, and each year our Sub-branch sent moneys to Bendigo Legacy Club.

Old soldiers never die, they only fade away and, as Sub-branch numbers declined, we called first on Apex Service Club and then on Oasis Service Club to help out on Diggers Day, which they were only too willing to do. The first reference to their assistance was in 1981. We thank them sincerely for their support over many years.

Last year the Sub-branch donated \$1,252.00 to Bendigo Legacy Club. An odd amount, but this brought the grand total donated over the years up to \$100,000.00.

And so we come to Saturday 17 April 2021 and the Charlton RSL Sub-branch and Bendigo Legacy Club celebratory dinner, the culmination of 86 years of community service and of \$100,000.00 donated to Bendigo Legacy Club. We thank all who assisted in putting on the event and all those who attended.

We thank Charlton Forum for making the Charlton Community Event of the Year 2021 award available; we are honoured to accept it. The award plaque will be displayed in pride of place in our Subbranch clubrooms.

Welcoming the crowd, Cabbaritta President, Janet Stafford opened with an acknowledgement to Country before inviting people to reflect and to recommit towards making Australia an even better place for the future.

Following the recitation of the Australia Day Pledge, President of the Charlton Forum, Bruce Gardner was introduced to announce the Charlton Australia Day awards.

Charlton Citizen of the Year Kaylene Cossar

(Award presented by Kevin Mathews – 2021 Charlton Citizen of the Year) Citation

Kaylene has been heavily involved in numerous community organisations and projects over many years. However, it was her involvement in the establishment of The CIRCLE after the 2011 flood, and more recently, the Charlton Neighbourhood House, that was highlighted in her nomination.

After the devastating January 2011 flood, Kaylene stepped up to help the community and subsequently became a key member of the Charlton Recovery Committee and it's People's Sub-committee. The committee identified the need for a Community Resource Centre as a central point for individuals to obtain advice and support. It was Kaylene who came up with the name 'The Charlton Information Resource Centre and Learning Environment', known as The CIRCLE. A location was secured and Kaylene sourced the bond and the first year's rent. Her amazing energy combined with her consummate skills as a communicator, networker and negotiator, led to The Circle being painted by volunteers, furnished, and fitted with telephones and computers within a matter of days.

Kaylene's strong organisational skills were evidenced with her ability to match the numerous offers of help and resources with community groups and individuals in need. This included 'The Buddy System' which involved volunteers visiting the vulnerable and isolated for a 'Cuppa & a Chat'. Kaylene also successfully negotiated with the East Wimmera Health Service for the provision of a psychologist for 2 days a week for most of the first two years of the life of the CIRCLE.

The CIRCLE eventually closed due to a lack of funding but had served the community admirably when it was most needed. Kaylene's input over that time was substantial and a large proportion of The CIRCLE's success can be genuinely attributed to her driving force, vision and dedication.

In 2018 when new funding became available to establish Neighbourhood Houses, Kaylene was approached by Charlton Forum to assist with the submission to the State Government. A very strong application was submitted and was successful. Auspiced by Charlton Forum, a subcommittee was established with Kaylene as the inaugural Chairperson. Again, she was the driving force, providing excellent leadership for her committee and strong direction. Kaylene was instrumental in negotiating with the Rex Theatre to use part of its premises and she was responsible for producing most of the operational policies and procedures required to operate as a Neighbourhood House.

The Neighbourhood House quickly became operational opening in February 2019, offering numerous services to the community. Kaylene was instrumental in fostering various collaborations with other community groups and is also the driving force behind many of the programs and services it offers. It has since become an invaluable asset to the community. With her guidance they have secured numerous grants for many programs and projects in the three years it has been operating.

Kaylene has been re-elected as Chairperson for a third term and continues to provide invaluable support to the coordinator, other staff and the Committee, and dedicates many hours a week to its continuing operation

In other community service, Kaylene served on the Charlton College P-12 School Council from 2006 to 2018, including two terms as President. An extremely hands-on President, during her first term Kaylene was a welcome support to the Principal during the construction of the new Primary School and Science & Language Buildings.

Kaylene was actively involved in her children's sport. Most noteworthy was her involvement with the Football Ladies' Auxiliary for approximately 10 years, holding the roles at various times of President, Secretary and Treasurer. Kaylene was also Secretary of the Basketball Club for a period of ten years in which she was involved in all aspects of the running of the club and was awarded a Life Membership.

Kaylene is a Charlton Park 2020 committee member and is manager of grants for the committee. She undertook the major work involved in obtaining the \$325,000 Building Better Regions Fund grant. Kaylene also contributed many hours to help prepare the new building to be ready for the opening.

Kaylene has been involved with the CFA for many years and at one point was employed as a Brigade Support Officer. Kaylene became Secretary of the Yeungroon CFA in 2017 and has been Secretary of the Volunteer Fire Brigades of Victoria for 2 years. She brings her extensive experience to these roles.

Kaylene is Chair of the Buloke Shire Economic Development and Tourism Advisory Committee. This is a volunteer role, and she represents both Charlton and the wider Buloke Community.

Kaylene is currently involved in numerous community projects ranging from art and culture to the environment and community wellbeing. She is also a member of several project control groups including the newly completed River Front Project and the upcoming Streetscape works. Kaylene's dedication to the ongoing wellbeing and prosperity of her local community is outstanding. We have all, or no doubt will, benefit from Kaylene's contributions in some way.

Congratulations Kaylene, the Charlton community thank you for your efforts.

Response

Thanking the Forum and her nominators, Kaylene said she was humbled to be a recipient, and acknowledged the volunteering work of many in the crowd.

While touching on the sensitivities generated by Australia Day, she emphasized that "Reflection, Respect and Celebration" were communal grounds upon which all shared agreement.

"Our community survives on volunteerism," she said, "and no one person can achieve what we as a collective have. I have been very fortunate to volunteer in a number of organizations, and I thank everyone involved in these for guiding me, mentoring and supporting me. Volunteering has helped me develop many skills, form many friendships and networks, and helped me feel connected."

With goals of making community "better, stronger, more cohesive and inclusive and giving everyone a voice", Kaylene said witnessing Charlton bounce back from setbacks to become stronger and more vibrant has been the result of tireless community work.

In the long journey towards the establishment of the Charlton Neighbourhood House, Kaylene also acknowledged the many supporters, highlighting Geoff Wright as a visionary, who unfortunately did not see this dream become a reality.

Thanking her family and friends for their "tremendous support", Kaylene concluded by congratulating Tessa Fitzpatrick on both her Charlton and Buloke Awards.

Young Citizen of the Year Tessa Fitzpatrick

Citation

Tessa has a remarkable sense of community and a willingness to contribute. During her secondary school years she was active in the SRC, a house captain and sports captain, involved in the Youth Group and also travelled to Canada on Rotary Exchange. Tessa was also involved in the Charlton Hockey Club as a player, umpire and coach, and was the Junior Girls Coordinator and a committee member for the Charlton Basketball Association.

After completing her schooling and working for a few years in Canada, Tessa decided to move back to Charlton and has chosen to work locally and study online so she can continue to live in her local community. With her return, she has taken a very active role in the Charlton community. Tessa has been a representative on the Charlton Neighbourhood House committee for the last twelve months and brings a wonderful youth perspective that is greatly valued. Tessa expressed her desire for the Neighbourhood House to have a stronger focus on the under 35 age group and what they have to offer the community. She also encouraged the inclusion of our local natural environment in the Neighbourhood House strategic plan. These will both be a focus for the Neighbourhood House for the next three years. On behalf of the Neighbourhood House, Tessa also liaises with the OK Motels event manager to ensure a strong connection with the community as well as coordinating the roster of local hospitality staff.

The Neighbourhood House worked with Tessa to present a proposal to the Charlton Landcare group that had been dormant for a number of years, and as a result Tessa raised her hand mid-year to take on the role of President of Charlton Landcare. She has commenced the huge task of rebuilding the organisation. Already they have conducted two well attended biodiversity walks and have made applications for funding bird hides along the river and Wooroonook Lakes.

Referencing the many "cogs in the machine that make things work so well", Tessa thanked the Forum, The Charlton Hockey Club, the Charlton Landcare Group, the Neighbourhood House, the A. & P. Society, the Rotary Club, and lastly her family and

friends for the experiences and opportunities made available to her.

Tessa concluded by acknowledging the disparity between the celebration of Australia Day for some and its recognition as a day of grief for others. "I just hope that as a community and as individuals, we can act with compassion and empathy towards each other when it comes to our celebrations today," she said.

Charlton Event of the Year RSL Diggers' Day "Thank-you Dinner"

The Charlton RSL sub-branch held a 'Thank you dinner' on Saturday 21st April at the Charlton Golf Club in recognition of reaching \$100,000 in donations to Bendigo Legacy - the proceeds of RSL Diggers' Day golf which started in 1935. Invitations were sent to sponsors, trophy donors, Legacy representatives, RSL members, Golf Club members, OASIS members, the local Police and anyone who has helped with the running of Diggers' Day. The OASIS Club catered and the Charlton College Year 10 work experience students waited tables as a fundraiser. Eighty-five meals were served on the night.

Speeches were given by the Presidents of RSL, the Golf Club, Bendigo Legacy, OASIS Club and the family of the late Norm Lindhe, a tireless organiser and worker for Diggers' Day and the main trophy is named in his honour.

The President of Bendigo Legacy stated that Charlton RSL is the largest contributor to Legacy outside the Bendigo area.

This event was run during Covid, inbetween lockdowns. The Covid-19 requirements were onerous but the organisers persevered and a terrific night was enjoyed by those in attendance.

In responding, Bill Freeman outlined the 86 year history of the Diggers' Day Golf event, acknowledging that the award covered much more than a single year's community service.

"From little acorns great oaks grow," said Bill, referencing the first event of 1935 which raised 3 pounds, 9 shillings and 9 pence, the net of which was donated to Bendigo Legacy.

Over succeeding years, the profits have increased, with a notable entry in 1964 that 18 gallons of beer be obtained as a reserve for Diggers' Day!

Enlisting the help of Apex and OASIS service clubs in latter years, Bill acknowledged their support, before expanding on the celebratory dinner held on 17 April 2021 as the culmination of 86 years community service and \$100,000 of donations to Bendigo Legacy.

"Today's award will be displayed with pride of place in our Sub-Branch Clubrooms," he said.

Guest Speaker Harry Brindley

Following a musical medley of Australian songs by the Charlton Choir under the leadership of Gill Gretgrix, guest speaker, Charlton local Harry Brindley, presented an informative Australia Day address. He spoke about the scope and impact of the "Freedom Across Australia" (FAA) touring initiative which seeks to provide travel opportunities for severely disabled people.

Starting with the origins of the activity, which is based on a UK initiative known as "Across Trust", the Australian version, which began in 1988, has become a Lions initiative since its beginnings at the Lidcombe Hospital in NSW.

Addressing the issues of long-distance travel for adults with disabilities, the project has enjoyed the support of Lions Clubs

across Australia, with the Auburn Lidcombe Club NSW accepting it as a Club activity in 2002. Fundraising by the Club over a number of years enabled the purchase of a fully modified trailer complete with kitchen, along with a fully modified bus with capacity for three wheel-chairs and seating for 15.

Charlton's connection with the initiative evolved out of a group visit during the 1990's where the local Lions Club hosted the overnight stay. Offering both his generosity and his ambulance skills, Harry's assistance so impressed the organizers that, as they were leaving the next day, they asked him if he would take part in their next trip. And, as they say – the rest is history!

The Charlton connection has since been enhanced further with Charlton Lions Club adopting the FAA following the disbandment of the Auburn Lidcombe Club. Operating through online meetings, the group is eagerly anticipating a return to travel once the impact of Covid eases. And true-to-form, Harry has taken on the role of Field Officer for the tours.

Emphasizing the immense benefits and positive outcomes for the participants in these tours, Harry re-counted a number of examples where life-changing results had yielded complete, and lasting, changes of attitude for the individuals involved.

From providing respite for carers, to broadening horizons for participants, the opportunity to increase self-confidence and self-sufficiency is an important aspect of the activity.

Hosted by Lions Clubs across the country, and offering satisfying volunteer oppor-

tunities, Harry said, "The pleasure of giving is a personal reward."

Concluding by thanking the community, and highlighting the supportive embrace extended to himself and his family all the years ago on his arrival as the town's paramedic, Harry acknowledged the input of the Australia Day organizers, before being presented with a (long overdue) Charlton mug.

The morning concluded with the rousing rendition of "I Am Australian" before award winners were congratulated by family and friends.

Charlton Ladies' Singles Winner was again Lynne Southwell.





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



Jesus left there and Jesus left there and went to his hometown, Nazareth, accompanied by his disciples. ² When the Sabbath came, he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were amazed. "Where did this man get these things?" they asked. "What's this wisdom that has been given him? What are these remarkable miracles he is performing? ³ Isn't this the carpenter? Isn't this Mary's son and the brother of James, Joseph, Judas and Simon? Aren't his sisters here with us?" And

Help me Lord, not to give offence nor take it. Give me a thick skin and a warm heart. Amen.

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


