# RED CROSS SERVICE RECOGNISED

Three hardworking Charlton ladies are the recent recipients of the National Emergency Services Medal in recognition for their outstanding contributions and work for the Red Cross organization.

Joy Freeman, Janet Stafford and Jenny McGillivray are pictured with their awards which acknowledge the support offered in assisting communities and individuals recover from emergencies across Australia.

Formerly Red Cross members, the trio are now "Friends of Red Cross" following the closure of the Charlton group in 2019, however their commitment continues as members of the Red Cross Emergency Services for the Northern Lakes region which covers the Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Buloke, Gannawarra and Swan Hill.

Dedicated, and with a deep desire to help others, they have given a considerable amount of time lending a quiet hand when the call comes through.

Joy stepped up in 1983 when the Charlton Branch was in need of new members, and Janet made her start as a "spontaneous volunteer" when the 2011 floods hit.

"I went down to the Charlton Hall with a cake and offered to help," she said, "and I came home two weeks later! You can't do that now – you have to be a trained member."

Jenny also saw the need following the floods and signed up in 2012.

The girls have been involved in many of the "big" stories of the 2000's, which their medals testify. All were acknowledged for their work during the 2019 / 20 Bushfires, with Janet receiving an additional clasp for her deployment to Townsville following the January / February 2019 floods.

During the bushfires, Joy and Jenny worked with evacuees from Mallacoota at the Sale RAAF Base, while Janet worked as a Team Leader during three separate deployments to Bairnsdale with evacuees from along the East Coast.

Learning to deal with rapidly evolving situations, and with sometimes hundreds of people whose reactions are unpredictable and out of character, can add to already intense

With deployments of six days duration (including two for travel, if required), the work can range from handing out food and water, to assisting people with grant applications, through to offering psychological first aid. These humanitarian efforts can also involve interaction with numerous other agencies, all of which are focused on establishing support for those who have been impacted.

Citing one of their most difficult assignments, Joy and Janet both related their thoughts on working in the immediate aftermath of the 2017 Bourke Street Mall incident where six people died and 37 were hospitalized. Providing personal support to the general public grieving at the spontaneous memorial at the Melbourne GPO, they said the situation was confronting as they circulated amongst the crowd.

For all incidents, but especially for one such as the above, support for the helpers is readily addressed by the Red Cross through initial briefings, de-briefings and ongoing welfare checks to ensure that everyone is coping.

Despite the intensity of their assignments, Janet, Jenny and Joy all spoke of the rewards and satisfaction this work brings, and the opportunities for building networks across different groups and sectors of the community.

Although being the newest recruit, Jenny said as a result of her many experiences – both on the ground and through training – she had made many new friends and learnt a "huge amount, especially from Joy and Janet". For the McGillivray family, this is the third family member to receive a National Emergency Medal, with Jenny's husband, Allan and daughter, Louise, being so honored for their involvement in the 2009 Bushfires.

During the last two years as Covid has made its mark, the ladies have been busy with the delivery of food parcels and doing welfare calls across the three LGAs. "We have been busy working behind the scenes," said Janet, adding that new volunteers are always welcome.

# St Joseph's Presbytery Centenary

On Sunday 23rd October 2022, St Joseph's Charlton will celebrate the centenary of the laying of the foundation stones of the Presbytery and the Hall (formerly St Joseph's School).

In 1865 Charlton was included in the newly created Inglewood Parish. In 1875 a Catholic church was built in East Charlton. In 1876 a new mission of St Arnaud was created and East Charlton became part of the St Arnaud Parish. In January 1885 the new parish of Charlton was created and Fr Michael Costello was the first Parish priest. A foundation stone for a new church was laid in Feb. 1907.

In 1918 Fr Cornelius Kelly became Charlton's first Australian born Parish Priest. The post war years were a time of unprecedented church building activity and Fr Kelly was quick to take advantage of this. A bazaar conducted in 1921 was to raise funds for the building of a new presbytery. It raised £2,227 and was so successful it was decided to erect a new school as well. The land was donated to the church by the late Mr Joseph Fanning.

On  $8^{\text{th}}$  October 1922 Most Rev. Dr Foley, Bishop of Ballarat, in the midst of a large assembly, laid the foundation stones of the new presbytery and school. Prior to the completion of the Presbytery in 1923, and its occupancy by the priests, the residence at 120 High St was purchased (in 1885) and used by the local Catholic community as a residence for the local priests.

# Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome again to news from your local Charlton Golden Grains Museum. The volunteers at the museum are excited with the further easing restrictions. of and the opportunity for more visitors to come and view our wonderful collection. It has been a difficult 2 years for many businesses, groups and organisations, but we are hopeful 2022 will get back to some normality. We open every Sunday from 11:00am until 3:00pm, or by arrangements with one of the people listed below. Also in the planning are some themed events during the course of the year which will showcase various aspects of life in Charlton in bygone days. Details will follow as they come to hand.

The Museum was recently successful in obtaining a grant to purchase a showcase to expand its military display. We have also submitted an application for funding so we can extend our displays into the former Wesleyan Chapel.

Our feature story this month is the amazing life of one of Australia's pioneering women in the medical field; Mary Clementine De Garis. Born in Charlton in 1881, one of six children, to clergyman and pioneer, Elisha irrigation Clement De Garis, and Elizabeth Buncle, a midwife, Mary was dux of her year at Methodist Ladies College and enrolled in the male dominated field of medicine at the University of Melbourne in 1900. She was awarded a Bachelor of Medicine in 1904 and Bachelor of Surgery in

1905, and was appointed to two resident positions at the Melbourne Hospital and the Women's Hospital. Her first full time position took her to Muttaburra in north-west Oueensland before travelling to the United Kingdom and America in 1908-09 to further her studies. On returning to Melbourne Mary took up a position at the Queen Victoria Hospital and a private practice in the centre of town. The lure of the outback drew her to the western New South Wales town of Tibooburra to work at the hospital there between 1911 and 1915.

Wishing to be closer to her fiancé, Colin Thompson, who had enlisted in the Australian Imperial Forces, Mary sailed to London in 1916 and worked at the Manor Hospital. On learning of Colin's death at Pozieres in August 1916, she joined the Scottish Women's Hospital organization and was posted to the Ostrovo Unit in Macedonia on the Balkan Front. This was a field hospital and transport column that comprised around 200 tents and came under the command of the Serbian Army. Mary served there from February 1917 to October 1918 and was the Chief Medical Officer for 18 months. For her service she was awarded the Serbian Order of St Sava. Returning home in May 1919, Mary settled in Geelong and took up the cause for women to be members of the hospitals' general committees, and for a maternity ward, antenatal and postnatal care he to implemented at the hospital.

She was the first and only female doctor in Geelong from 1919 to 1941, and held honorary positions as Consultant to the Maternity Ward until 1959. Publishing over 40 articles in journals and writing 5 books, Mary practised until 1960 before dying in Geelong in 1963.

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is on the lookout for more volunteer members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish and don't need any experience; training will be provided. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. Another simple option is to become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items for future generations. When Maria first went to India there were more travellers but now very few young travellers. These travellers were vital to India's economy but now there is a much bigger middle class who travel and use 5 star hotels. A Tourist Visa was only for 6 months so Maria would go to Nepal or Pakistan so she could reapply. Now a Tourist Visa is only for 1 month. Although there are 26 separate languages in India English is the unifying language. Maria can speak Hindi. Maria hopes to go back to India.

# Stage 2 Nearly Completed at Charlton Park

After a year or more of Covid interruptions the implementation of the \$325,000 BBRF grant is finally nearing completion. Here is an update of the projects that are part of the grant and several other associated grants.

#### Road and carpark

The implementation sub-committee has been working closely with the Buloke Shire with the planning of the construction of the car park on the river side of the new building and if you have been over there recently you will know that this work has commenced and should be completed prior to March 20. There is a stage 2 of this work planned which will provide additional car parking behind the fence near the netball courts.

#### Water Fountains

2 fountains have been ordered at a cost of \$2986.50 They will have a spring loaded side tap and large drinking bowl and will be located near the lawn to the east of the netball courts and on the eastern side of the building in the harness racing precinct.

#### **Gym Equipment**

These is a double station set – chest press and leg press and is located near the netball courts and the existing playground.

#### VET Shed

The shed has been completed and is being used on race days by the Harness Racing Club. Thanks to Boyles builders for this work.

#### Stalls/sheds

There are 2 of these – a smaller covered stalls building on the north east corner of the horse stalls complex and a larger one to replace a line of stalls and relocate them with a covered area near the ladies' driver's room. It will also double as a wool display area for the A & P Show society.

The larger shed/stalls is funded by the State Government through VRIF funding but the two projects are being administered together.

The old stalls have been removed and they are currently being rebuilt and due to be completed within the next 2 weeks. They will at the same time be fitted out with the necessary stalls.

#### Parade ring

At the same time the Club, in association with Wes Jenkyn, is relocating the parade ring adjacent to the new covered stalls and close to the crowd on race days. This will add to the experience on these days. It will be unveiled on March  $20^{\text{th}}$  – Charlton Pacing Cup Day.

#### **Indigenous Garden**

Native garden and bush tucker. Dja Dja Wurrung are working on this and have started growing plants for the garden. This will be located to the south of the building.

#### Grand opening

The committee has set a date to finalise the BBRF project and invite the politicians to officially open the different parts. This will be held on April 28<sup>th</sup> - Dja Dja Wurrung Cup meeting at 11 am on the lawn area to the east of the building.

Chairman of Charlton Park 2020, John Harley, said it is great to see this long project nearing completion. He thanked Kaylene Cossar for the tremendous amount of work she has put in especially liaising with the bureaucrats in the Federal Government with all of the red tape attached to such a grant. He also highlighted the hard work of Harness Racing President, Joe Thompson, especially for working through all of the red tape to get the larger stalls building approved and to coordinate the other works.

Charlton Community Bendigo Bank and the Bendigo Community Enterprise Foundation issued a Challenge Grant of \$3,300 to Charlton Angling Club Inc toward a grant of \$4,740 applied for last June to construct seating at the boat ramp in Charlton Park and to add a defibrillator box to the wall of the Angling Clubhouse in Charlton Park. This Challenge meant we had to raise \$1,440 to receive the Challenge Grant which we did to receive the funding.

With receiving the grant back in June 2021, we had many issues with supply of the seats due to Covid, and when the parcel of the two seats arrived, no bolt holes would line up to bolt the seat and top to the frames. A phone call and photos to the supplier ended up with new frames arriving-excuse was they changed their supplier. This time we got one seat completed and half the next one. Another call and more photos, this time two more pieces arrived, and the job was complete. We did intend to put a seat each side of the boat ramp, but with safety in mind we didn't put one on the right-hand side as the big gum tree has some dead timber in it and looks a bit dangerous to be sitting under.

With our challenge grant now complete there is seating at the boat ramp for the community and passers by who may stop and have lunch within Charlton Park, or some locals may even throw a line in to catch a fish and use the seats.

The defibrillator is now on the wall of the

Angling Club for public use if needed. From sunrise to sunset there is always someone walking through the park around the river who may need this AED.

We are proud that we were allocated this grant for us to assist in making Charlton Park a more user-friendly facility for the community. Thank you Bendigo Bank, we do apologise for the lateness of this acquittal and thank you for the extension and being understanding.
