## Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome again to news from your local Charlton Golden Grains Museum. As another step towards life getting back to some form of normality, we were very pleased to recently welcome back our first organised bus tour of visitors to view our collection. The travellers were impressed by our amazing, well presented displays, and left pleased they had made the visit. When was the last time you dropped into the museum? We open every Sunday from 11:00am until 3:00pm, or by arrangement with one of the people listed below. Admittance is a very low \$5, and free for children. Perhaps your local group or organisation would like to have an outing. Group tours are most welcome, and a cuppa could accompany your visit.

Keen Bingo players made the trip to Donald to recommence our fundraising efforts and have an enjoyable night out. We are very fortunate to receive monies when we can get a group to visit which goes a long way to support the running of the museum. Our next trip across will be **Thursday 26th May** and everyone is welcome to come along. Contact Glenda Litton for details. Other fund raising ideas are in the pipeline and will be advised as details are finalised.

The museum recently took possession of a new display case thanks to a grant from the Australian Museum and Galleries Association. This will enable us to expand our WW1 display. Another new temporary exhibition just completed features the story of F. J. Edwards. A farmer, Freemason, Champion Bowler and Shire Councillor, Mr Edwards was instrumental in the community tree plantings that took place in the late 1940s & early 1950s. The collection includes items related to his time as a Freemason and success as a bowler.

This month we revisit a publication

produced in 1976 by the Donald History and Natural History Group called 'Knocking About'. It covers a period from January 1874 to November 1876 and features numerous stories from the St Arnaud 'Travelling Mercury's Correspondent'. The booklet records the day-to-day tragedies and triumphs of settlers in the district, with many stories coming from Charlton, It tells the history of the birth of towns and industries, follows the clamour and progress of the railways, the mass clearing of the land by Selectors, the importance of education and religion, and the popularity of sporting events like horse racing, cricket, and pig hunting. Other features include the ravages of storms and bushfires, and the loss of a small child in the bush.

So many familiar family names today appear regularly throughout the publication, and issues of the times were well covered: a petition to prevent Peter Johnson acquiring 111 acres of land reserved for Charlton's future expansion on the hill area north of the Avoca River; Mr Luth making great improvements to his property such as a large brick extension to the hotel, new stables, a landscaped garden and water reservoir; Four pairs of large grinding stones arriving for Mr Foreman's new Flourmill by the Avoca River, where 30,000 bricks had already been laid; Dissatisfied and grumbling Charlton residents complaining about lack of footpaths, the inconvenience of having to travel to St Arnaud to pay rates and taxes, and lack of all weather roads and representation to the Colonial Government; Mr Mile's cordial factory was reported to be doing very good business providing the town's six hotels with supplies for their very thirsty patrons.

The identity of the 'Travelling Correspondent' remained unknown, but

later research suggests it may have been a gentleman named George Sinclair Fraser. This book is available for sale at the museum for \$15. The Charlton Golden Grains Museum holds a multitude of publications in our reading room, research files and family histories. Make time to come in and view those that may be of interest to you.

Would you like your families story recorded for future generations? Late last year we introduced a service where you can record your history down for us to scan into our digital reference library, and store a copy of the papers, family images or genealogy charts in an A4 size envelope. This is a wonderful opportunity for stories not to be lost, but preserved for researchers at a later stage. Cost is just \$10, which goes towards helping to maintain our collection.

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is looking for members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish and don't need any experience; training will be provided. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. Another simple option is to become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items for future generations.

## Beautify Charlton

Stage 1 of *Beautify Charlton*, the complete replacement of the thoroughfare street trees, is nearing completion. In mid 2019 the first replacement trees were planted in High St and in mid 2020 and beyond the completion of planting took place in Mildura Way. The trees selected were two varieties of Ornamental Pears, Crepe Myrtles and a Prunus variety. They will provide a spectacular look in the coming years.

Aside from a setback here or there and a few problem spots which continue to be worked on, the end result is that Charlton will have a completely new look in the coming years.

It has not been a small task, and in many ways it has been a big ask to complete the replanting in this timeframe. The end result will justify the approach. It has been the collaborative nature of the venture and the effort of hard-working volunteers which has enabled this stage of the project to be completed as planned.

Many thanks must go to:

The Buloke Shire who gave vital support and without which the project would never have got off the ground. Without making an example of too many people the early support of Ken Rowe, Darren Gould and Ken North has been greatly appreciated and the positivity of Darren Mills will have a marked effect on our town in the coming years.

GWMWater who had no hesitation in providing water free of charge from the discharge point in Halliday St. The generosity of spirit of GWMWater to support this community project has meant a lot to the volunteer committee.

The residents themselves who have taken it upon themselves to water "their own trees" as an assistance to the watering volunteers. Seeing beyond our own fence or shopfront is so important to how we present as a town.

Finally, the watering volunteers themselves, who deserve so much commendation for all their grunt work and

keeping it all going. Summer can be hard for young trees in our part the world and the work of all has been significant but two parties in particular have been immense. Neither party ever seeks any thanks but Peter and Kathy Rogan contributed an enormous amount of time (and water) to the project as did Sue and the late Ray Walsh. It makes it easy when you have a group of volunteers where nothing is a problem.

The Committee will be making public

plans for Stage 3 of the project in the coming months. Progress has been limited due to Covid but the outlook is positive. Once Stage 3 is complete the *Beautify Charlton* project itself will be complete, although a small working group will continue indefinitely on town projects in conjunction with the Buloke Shire. All funding partners will be acknowledged once more in the appropriate manner as the project comes to its completion.

## 'Nyernila' Art Trail Launched

The launch of "Nyernila" – the First People's Art Trail in Charlton - was announced at the Charlton Park complex recently as part of a day of celebrations entwined with the running of the Dja Dja Wurrung Cup.

A Wergaia/Wotjobaluk word, "Nyernila" - which means "deep listening/to listen continuously"-will represent an open-air gallery of Djaara cultural items and art works, commencing at the Traveller's Rest precinct, and meandering along the Avoca River to Charlton Park.

The collection of works will relate a range of stories connected to the Charlton area, and will reveal the heritage of the Dja Dja Wurrung clan to this locality.

Announcing the initiative, President of the Charlton Neighbourhood House, and Project Lead of the First People's Art Trail, Kaylene Cossar, opened with a brief background to the project which evolved from the repatriation of the Jaara Baby from the Melbourne Museum back to country south of Charlton in 2003. Addressing the gap in the local story of Baby Jaara's ancestors, and their connection to country, was raised

in active discussion at the time, however it took until the establishment of the Charlton Neighbourhood House in 2018 for a plan of action to materialize. Drawing together many ideas, a concept was compiled and presented to Djandak (the commercial arm of Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation) with the aim of forming a collaborative working partnership to develop a project plan.

The plan has three stages, of which Stage 1 is almost complete. This includes collaboration with Dja Dja Wurrung via Dumawul Creative Enterprises, and the connection with Diaara artists. This initial stage will also see the installation of featured artworks at each end of the trail, plus accompanying and promotional signage materials for visitors. A bush tucker garden will also be established at Charlton Park over the coming weeks. Stages 2 and 3 work towards expanding and enhancing the project, with a view to ultimately touring an exhibition of curated artworks to other Buloke localities.

Acknowledging the input of Djandak members - Jim Brooks, Rodney Carter, Steve Jackson - Kaylene also recognized the input of Dumawul Manager, Leanne Rose Munro and Cultural Consultant, Pauline Ugle for their help bringing the project to fruition.

The funding partners for Stage 1 were also acknowledged and include: the Buloke Shire (CEO Anthony Judd and Wayne O'Toole, Trevor Rumbold, Project Manager of "Our Rivers, Our Region" Funding, and the Federal Government for that funding), Charlton Community Bank (Chair Jon Whykes and the Board, for the provision of seed funding which enabled leverage for further funding for the project), FRRR and Future Drought Funding (Kristy Shay, representative) for enabling the planting of the indigenous garden, and Charlton Park and the 2020 Committee for helping with the planning and their assistance with provision for the audio component at the Park.

Promoted as an open-air gallery, the trail commences at the back of the Traveller's Rest, showcasing a yet-to-be-revealed sculpture and an original work by young Yorta-Yorta artist, Troy Fibrace. The route will continue along the Avoca River with six pieces of art to be reproduced from a variety of items on display at the launch. An additional piece will be acquired from the Torch – an organization which supports indigenous men and women both in prisons and post-release in Victoria, helping them to explore their Indigenous culture and identity through practising art. The trail concludes at the entrance to the Charlton Park complex. Audio components at the beginning and end will provide visitors with the opportunity to better understand the Djaara culture and provide reflection points on the route.

A short address by Leanne Rose Munro, Manager of Dumawul, briefly outlined the meaning of "Dumawul" as a "thank you between two people, which respects the good spirit." She also thanked the artists for their partnership and the production of such a wonderful outcome.

Handing over to the Pauline Ugle (Cultural Consultant of Dumawul), the context of the project title -"Nyernila" - was explained as "an act of being present in the space where you are – an individual's connection to country". Pauline also acknowledged the work of Reece Hendy (Artist and Creative Lead of the Bendigo based Nacho Station) in bringing together 12 Dja Dja Wurrung artists in a first time on-country exhibition reflecting a deep connection to the waterway of the Avoca River.

Introducing three of the participating artists - Aunty Millie (Cecelia Taylor), Stephanie Taylor and Levi Jessem Femmell – guests were then invited to meet and talk with the artists and view their works, before a light luncheon was shared by all.

## Stage 2 Official Opening & New Beginnings

It was a day of highlights at the Charlton Park complex on 28<sup>th</sup> April with the official opening of the Stage 2 redevelopment and the announcement of the First People's Art Trail; an occasion which was unfurled against the backdrop of the Charlton Harness Racing Club (CHRC) indigenous day featuring the running of the Dja Dja Wurrung Cup (Djaara Baliki Wuka)

The growing partnership between CHRC and the Dja Dja Wurrung People continues to foster strong bonds with the traditional owners of this area. Along with the launch of the "Nyernila" Open Air Gallery (an initiative of the Charlton Neighbourhood House), the day saw the drawing together of visions which have many already, and will continue to, establish a progressive and visionary future for the Charlton township.

In a prelude to the official Charlton Park Stage 2 opening the additions of which include the car park, solar paneling, covered stabling, landscaping, safety fencing, veterinary room, machinery shed and outdoor active equipment - the Chairman of the Charlton Park 2020 committee, John Harley, welcomed guests and supporters

to the occasion

Invitees included: Dr. Anne Webster (Federal Member for Louise Mallee), Staley (Member for Ripon), Cr. Daryl Warren (Buloke Shire Mayor) Buloke Crs. Alan Getley and Stewart, Mr Rob Pongho (Harness Racing Victoria Development Infrastructure Manager), Mr. Stephen Bell (General Manager, Racing Harness Victoria), representatives from the Dja Wurrung people Dja and representatives from Charlton Community Bank. Apologies were received from Buloke Shire CEO, Wayne O'Toole, and Cr. David Pollard.

Outlining a brief history of the venue's development, Mr. Harley paid recognition to the following organisations and individuals for their assistance in the realization of the second phase of the facility's development.

Those acknowledged included: Federal Government (\$325,942 from the Building Better Regions Fund) - a primary source of funding which enabled the auspicing of additional monies for additional works; the Victorian Government and Harness Racing Victoria (Victoria Racing Infrastructure Fund), plus HRV \$141,000

covered stalls and associated works; Buloke Shire (\$10,000 Sustainability Community Grant) solar panels; Sustainability Victoria (\$106,000) - car park; Victorian Government - Department of and Recreation (\$695,000) for the lighting project at Charlton Park (while not a project of the 2020 Committee, the lights have added an important further development to the facility).

Mr. Harley also acknowledged the input of the Dja Dja Wurrung people for the forthcoming additions to the outdoor area, the Landscaping sub-committee of Charlton Park 2020, which included Greg McGurk, Shane Fitzpatrick, Amy Nicholson, Luke Zagame, Matt McGurk and Kirk Boyle, the Buloke Shire for the design and co-ordination of the carpark, along with the numerous contractors who carried out the various works.

Commending the significant work and liasions by CHRC President, Joe Thompson, Mr. Harley also acknowledged the substantial work carried out by Kaylene Cossar, who also liaised with multiple organisations to secure the additional grants to complement the "Building Better Regions" funding. "I know personally,

just how hard these two individuals worked", Mr. Harley added.

"All told, this amounts to \$1.278 million on top of the \$4.2 million for Stage 1", John said

Member for Mallee, Dr. Anne Webster, then spoke saying, "These projects only happen when you have passionate locals who go into bat and fight, and when you have collaboration." Honouring John Harley for his vision, Dr. Webster said "he was dogged enough to see this project through, and while he would be the first to say he didn't do it all himself, it takes individuals, and that's what excites me . . . to hear the heartbeat of every small community."

The General Manager of HRV, Mr. Stephen Bell, then addressed the commending the progress of the project, and saying it was "unbelievable to see Charlton and the Harness Racing Club being so proactive in gaining Federal and State grants to make this possible". Expressing his congratulations, he said the ability to leverage funding, and the resulting benefits to harness racing and the community through things like establishment of the training centre, and now the increased

undercover stabling complex, plus the additional upgrades, was "sensational". Calling it a "state-of-the-art facility", Mr. congratulated President, Joe Thompson, and his committee, commenting that the ability to draw and relocate trainers to Charlton also benefits harness racing in surrounding regional areas such as Bendigo and Swan Hill. He concluded by thanking his associate Rob Pongho ("he's lived and breathed project"), the levels Government for the funding, and the trainers who have relocated to the area as a result of improved infrastructure. He said "It gives me great pleasure being here, and I thank everyone involved."

The formal cutting of the ribbon to open the facility was undertaken by Dr. Webster, accompanied by John Harley and Joe Thompson.

With the project now completed, John Harley said that after 16 years it was likely that the Charlton Park 2020 Committee would cease to exist, and with his recent relocation to Ballarat, this

would be his final function as Chairman. Thanking all the members of the Charlton community who had "stepped forward . . . who had provided their ideas and many hours of voluntary work, as well as their support for me to bring to fruition the wonderful facilities that we see here today" he concluded the official opening.

Member for Ripon, Louise Staley then acknowledged John Harley's work, saying, "The commitment and dedication you have shown to this project, and other projects throughout Charlton . . . has been truly extraordinary. No one has been more persistent - and more irritating - and it's the squeaking wheel that gets the oil! This is your life's work, amongst other things, and you should be so proud of this, because it is a great facility which will do this community proud for many years." This was endorsed with spontaneous applause from the crowd.

Guests were then invited to move to the upper concourse to take part in the Dja Dja Wurrung smoking ceremony.

Opening with an indigenous

There were also enough "gross-out" moments to make the kids laugh, without laboring the point. The show's lighting tech and designer, Sarah Platts, adds her own skills the production having worked for Circus Oz, CASUS Creations and the Adelaide Fringe Festival amongst other groups.






The reinstatement of sharing refreshments and fellowship with the RSL members in the Club room afterwards marked a welcome return to pre-Covid times.

## ANZAC Day Address

SHAPING OUR NATIONAL CHARACTER

An inspiring address by Charlton's ANZAC Day guest speaker, Lieutenant Ammar Sukhera, drew multiple threads of historical content together using the town's connection as the birthplace of World War 1 military titan, Harold "Pompey" Elliott, as his theme.

Lieutenant Sukhera recounted the high esteem with which "Pompey" was held by those he led in battle, saying "that he was a man who truly cared for, and had love for his diggers".

Often a voice against unnecessary risk where his men were concerned, "Pompey's" on -the-ground knowledge and "profound grasp of tactical possibilities" meant his meant judgements were well based, and coupled with his own actions, earned the respect of those who served with, or under his command. "He understood that it is our brave soldiers who are our biggest assets and source of inspiration," said Lt. Sukhera.

That bravery was viewed as the linchpin of the Gallipoli landing. Reading an extract from a letter written by Second Lieutenant, David Martin Gillies (15<sup>th</sup> Australian Infantry Battalion) who landed at Gallipoli on 25<sup>th</sup> April 1915, the content of the quote marvels that, "I don't know how ever our boys got ashore at all".

Heading directly into attack, and amid the confusion of landing, what must have been going through the minds of those first soldiers of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corp as they charged onto the beach of the Gallipoli peninsula postulated Lt. Sukhera.

With 2000 Australians killed or wounded on that day, and a total of 8,700 Australians and 2,700 New Zealanders killed by the time of evacuation in December of that year, it is little wonder that the qualities of courage, service and sacrifice have become the defining characteristics of what it means to be "Australian".

From honouring the original Anzacs on that first Anzac Day in 1916, through to the present times, the 25<sup>th</sup> April "has become an occasion to honour all who have worn our country's uniform in service," said Lt. Sukhera.

Reflecting on all who have served – whether in conflict or as peace-keepers, from Anzac Cove to Afghanistan – the "values of loyalty, selflessness and courage, invested in the original Anzacs" have been a measure by which succeeding generations have viewed their own achievements against those who fought on Gallipoli, said Lt. Sukhera.

"At the start of my address, I said that history is important, it is an inspiration. As a nation we face difficult and uncertain times ahead. Let's honour the service and sacrifice of others in days past, so that we may draw inspiration and confidence for the days to come."

(Lieutenant Sukhera is currently Platoon Commander of Bravo Company 8<sup>th</sup>/7<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Victoria Regiment. He joined the Australian Army Reserve in 2016 as an officer cadet and was commissioned in 2020. He is a systems engineer with the Department of Defence in the Capability Acquisition Sustainment Group. migrated from Pakistan to Australia as a ten-year-old, and completed his education at RMIT, graduating Bachelor of Electrical and Electronics Engineering (Hons)).
