The Silver Medal is contested annually between players selected from Division 1. Lindsay competed in a double round robin against players from Belmont, Yarrawonga and Traralgon. Lindsay's only loss was to the runner up. He has now reduced his handicap to 4. In 2002 Gordon Cook, who was a member of the Charlton Croquet Club at the time, also won the Silver Medal.

Multiple local organizations come together to present Charlton's annual ceremonv breakfast and and acknowledgement was directed to the following: Cabbaritta CWA, Charlton Forum, Charlton Lions Club and Lions Ladies. Charlton RSL. Charlton Neighbourhood House, Charlton Choir, along with support from the Buloke Shire, David Pollard and John Stahl. All were applauded for their time, availability and input into the event.

The announcement of the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAMs) Awards for the incredible contributions of local couple, Brian and Rae Heenan, set the tone for the morning with other individual and collective recognitions filling the program.

With a large crowd, and as the detailfilled citations of the award winners were revealed, this was the backdrop against which newcomers were formally welcomed to the town and presented with welcome packs prepared by the Charlton Neighbourhood House. The outdoor setting at the Charlton Hall forecourt looked a picture, and made for a relaxed atmosphere which encouraged plenty of socializing over breakfast and after the ceremony.

Following the raising of flags by RSL members Bill Freeman and Bill Young assisted by CWA Juniors, Lacey Jenkyn and Lilymae McPhee - the National Anthem was sung before CWA President, Janet Stafford, welcomed the crowd. Highlighting the town's extensive number of volunteer organizations, Janet said, "Charlton really pulls its weight for a small town with its volunteering".

President of the Charlton Forum, Wayne Litton, then proceeded to announce the local award winners, along with the presentation of a Special Recognition Award and Special Certificates of Appreciation for the flood mitigation efforts of late 2022.

The musical component, featuring the Charlton Choir under the guidance of coordinator, Gil Gretgrix, presented a medley of Australian favourite tunes, before leading the crowd in "I Am Australian" and the perennial "Aussie, Aussie, Aussie, Oi, Oi, Oi" chant.

Xanthe represents the Charlton Hockey Club on the North Central Hockey Association Committee, and played an active role in the Association's "Hook into Hockey" Roadshow in 2021 and 2022 visiting schools to undertake hockey clinics.

An active member of the Charlton Youth Group whilst a student, Xanthe has continued her involvement, acting as a mentor and advisor, and sharing her experience as a leader through the compilation of handbooks detailing each role. She also works with the group (in a paid capacity) to coordinate FreeZa events.

Charlton's A & P Society is also a beneficiary of her membership, with Xanthe regularly attending meetings, working bees and creating promotional material.

Čharlton Citizen of the Year – Wes Jenkyn

Widely know for his sporting achievements on the football field, Wes's association with the Charlton Football Club extended beyond his has personal achievements of 280 games and two Senior Premierships, and moved into coaching roles at both Senior and Junior Levels, along with acting as a selector at Senior level. Well respected by all, Wes has also been a runner for both levels of the



competition, ultimately transitioning into umpiring at numerous Junior games for Charlton, as well as at Senior level in the North Central Football League. Wes was awarded a Life Membership with the Club in 2015 for his enduring and committed efforts.

Above and beyond his gardening and landscaping business, Wes shares his skills and time extensively, frequently in a voluntarv capacity, maintaining and enhancing many of the town's community weeding, areas. Mowing, watering, providing advice and going above and beyond to keep playing facilities and recreational areas in top condition, this significantly improves the appearance of the town. Organisations and facilities which have benefited from Wes's input include: the Football and Hockey Clubs, Charlton Park Community Complex (development and ongoing maintenance of surrounds), Charlton Harness Racing Club (maintaining landscape areas and extra preparation for Cup Day, along with planting over 400 trees in his own time between the horse yards and the Training Centre), Charlton Lawn Tennis Club (landscaping and knowledge regards the watering system), Charlton Netball Club (grounds person and driving force for keeping the courts and surrounds safe, neat and tidy for many years) Charlton Cemetery (maintenance and landscaping to beautify the area), Charlton Lions Club (maintaining and improving the Lions Park Precinct and providing assistance at the Travellers Rest.)

Wes's efforts also extended to the Charlton College, where he served as a

member of School Council, a member of the Infrastructure Sub-Committee from 2009-2015 and as school gardener.

Not confining his skills to just the great outdoors, Wes, along with his wife, Michelle, have also trained the Debs for the Charlton Debutant Ball for many years.

In responding, Wes said he was humbled by the award, and that volunteering had been a big part of his life.

"When you are involved with clubs, it's not about what the club can do for you, it's about what you can do for the club", he said. Thanking all the groups who made the Australia Day event possible, Wes also thanked his family – "they have been wonderful, allowing me to do what I do. It certainly gets me out of doing the cooking and the chores around the house! Thank you, again."

Charlton Community Event of the Year – Yeungroon Reunion

Held on 2^{bd} October 2022, the celebrations included the unveiling of the Yeungroon War Memorial, the unveiling of the Yeungroon History Project and the 100th Anniversary of the Yeungroon Rural Fire Brigade.

This event was a celebration for past and present Yeungroon and Charlton community members and their families, and was attended by 150 people, many of whom were descendants of the armed forces personnel listed on the memorial. The memorial recognizes nearly 100 locals serving in the Boer, WW1, WW2, Korean and Vietnam wars, with 13 men making the ultimate sacrifice.

The history project, comprising the construction of a colourbond shed housing 13 interpretive panels, tells the Yeungroon story from settlement through to today. The original Yeungroon Hall also received a facelift with minor repairs and a fresh coat of paint.

The CFA 100th Anniversary celebration included the unveiling of two interpretive panels showing the history and images of the brigade.

A significant addition to the local district, the projects now provide past residents, their descendants and local tourists with something tangible to visit.

The award was accepted by Yeungroon local, Fran Lanyon who spoke of the pride in the small community, before encouraging everyone to come along and see the upgrades.

Thanking her co-eduators, and work partner for the past 18 years, Deb Whykes, Sharon also acknowledged the community, the executives, committees and supporters who worked to keep the program, facility and happenings at an "amazing level in a small town."

"To all the 3, 4 and 5 year-olds who made it such a magical journey as they explored, discovered and shared their learning," Sharon referenced the time as a "many-chaptered adventure" as the future beckons for the new arrivals, through to those who now bring their own children to the centre.

Australia Day Honours for Brian & Rae

A much-deserved accolade for the popular Charlton couple, Brian and Rae Heenan, was the announcement of their Medal of the Order of Australia (OAMs) Awards at the town's recent Australia Day ceremony.

Acknowledging their considerable sporting (and community) contributions to the local area over many years, Brian and Rae have given unstintingly of their time across many organizations which have flourished and grown under their leadership and guidance.

Highly respected within the community and beyond, the dedicated pair have received numerous messages of congratulations both online and in person since the announcement was made public. Prolonged applause greeted the disclosure when Charlton Forum President, Wayne Litton, opened the town's formal ceremony with the news.

Helping create opportunities for young people, Brian and Rae's voluntary contributions have enriched sporting codes, provided developmental openings, encouraged participation and laid strong foundations for the many who have received their encouraging ministrations.

Highlights of their service include outstanding commitments to the Charlton Lawn Tennis Club and Charlton Badminton Club, along with committee membership to the Charlton Little Athletics and Netball Clubs. Contributions as members of School Council for both St. Joseph's Primary School and Charlton College were also recognized, along with Brian's involvement in the Charlton-Wycheproof Citizens' Band and Rae's leadership with the Girl Guides.

Both have also been acknowledged for their local service to the township with Charlton Citizes' of the Year awards– Rae in 1991 and Brian in 2003 - and both have also received the Distinguished Services Awards for 25 years' service from the Victorian Badminton Association – Brian in 1993 and Rae in 1999.

Speaking with the couple following the formalities, Brian said that the award won't change anything – they will still be involved as much as before. With the annual Charlton Tennis tournament opening on Australia Day, and both heavily involved in the event, Rae laughingly said their son told them that today they could spend extra time at the town community gathering – that the tennis would run without them!

On hand to celebrate the announcement were the couple's extended family, including children and grandchildren.

Our volunteers are looking forward to another year of archiving our town and district's local history. When was the last time you dropped into the museum? We will be reopening from Sunday 4th February, every Sunday from 11:00am until 3:00pm, or by arrangements with one of the people listed below. Admittance is still a very low \$5, and free for children. Perhaps your local group or organization would like to have an outing. Group tours are most welcome, and a cuppa and biscuits could accompany your visit.

Fund raising efforts will continue and will include our popular Bingo trips to Donald, as well as our upcoming 'Vintage Market'. Donations of items for our market are most welcome. Monetary donations are always welcome to help our work, and a deductibility receipt is tax available if you require it. Another simple option is to become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items for future generations.

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is always looking for members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. You could give as much or as little time each month as you wish and don't need any experience; training will be provided.

Australia Day

As we have just celebrated Australia Day 2023, this month we look back through the archives at how our predecessors spent the day. The earliest record of celebrations being held is in the East Charlton Tribune on January 26, 1888 where it is noted that the date was being celebrated for the first time. After Federation, The Charlton Tribune regularly featured stories on the various activities that went on, including the hugely popular tennis tournament and sports days. Also noted were babies born to local couples on the day, each of whom received a silver spoon from the Shire to mark the occasion. From 1951, regular mentions are made of the CWA's hosting of initially morning teas,

and later BBQs with special guest speakers.

The Australian Natives Association hosted a huge sports carnival on February 1, 1932 for Australia Day that included amongst other things, a Life Saving and swimming display at the Charlton Baths, foot and cycle racing at the recreational reserve, a swimming carnival and Tug-ofwar. The day finished with a dance at the Victoria Hall. Afternoon teas, ice creams, soft drinks and a publican's booth were available throughout the day.

Would you like your family's for story recorded future generations? Late last year we introduced a service where you can record your history for us to scan into our digital reference library, and store a copy of the papers, family images or genealogy charts in an A4 size envelope. This is a wonderful opportunity for stories not to be lost, but preserved for researchers at a later stage. Cost is just \$10, which goes towards helping to maintain our collection.
