Decorating the town blue and white set the Charlton Harness Racing Clubs' day-ofdays on the road to success as the 2023 Pacing Cup and Team Teal fundraiser, "Bubbles in the Bush" wowed the crowd at Charlton Park on Sunday 19 March.

From the main street emblazoned with fluttering streamers, to the car-park signage proclaiming Charlton as "The Heart of Country Trots", the Blue Sunday theme was visible across the entire Charlton Park venue - from bunting to bean bags, table linen to umbrellas, balloons, napery, as well as a feature wall for the those all-important "selfies".

The featured social opener of the day,

"Bubbles in the Bush" is the CHRC initiative which raises funds to support Team Teal which bolsters research into ovarian cancer. Now in its 6th year, "Bubbles" continues its strong partnership with inaugural sponsor, St. John of God Hospital, Bendigo - the facility to which many local residents head for medical treatment.

Welcoming the large crowd, CHRC Marketing Manager, Andrea O'Gorman emphasized the Club's strong commitment to the Team Teal initiative, and thanked attendees for their support for this cause. Recognition of St. John of God's role in backing this event was also highlighted, as was the input of Claire Pysing, Nurse Unit

Manager (Day Oncology Unit) who is usually a regular face at the gathering, but was an apology for this year's event.

Praising the work of Club members Kerrie Soulsby and Kim Thompson for their support in the planning stages and execution of "Bubbles", Andrea also acknowledged the wonderful team of Club members who helped to share the load.

A short interview was then conducted with local driver / trainer Denbeigh Wade, who recounted her background in harness racing ("almost no horse background"), through to her and her partner, Michael Gadsden's relocation to the Training Facility in Charlton. Citing the wonderful community support ("through the good and the bad"), Denbeigh also highlighted the value of the Training Centre which eased the financial risk for them in setting up their training business. 

# 500KV Transmission Lines a Possibility in our Community



Victoria to New South Wales Interconnector West Project - (VNI West) is a proposed new high capacity 500 Kilovolt (kV) double circuit overhead transmission line connecting Western Renewables Link (WRL) in Victoria to Energy Connect in New South Wales. Connecting the VNI West from near Kerang directly to a new terminal station near Bulgana which is situated between Ararat, Stawell and Moonambel, this project is now referred to as Option 5.

The first preference, the most direct route starting northwest of Ballarat and then going Bendigo, Kerang, and then further north to tap into Energy Connect in New South Wales, would allow renewable excess energy to flow between the two states. This first option met with opposition from the local residents and subsequently Option 5 has now become the proposed alternative route.

Eighty (80) metre tall steel towers, at a spacing of 450 metres apart, with a compulsory acquired easement up to 100 metres wide, are the specifications proposed for local farm land. No one can say where these are going exactly. Australian Energy Marketing Operator (AEMO) have informed our community via Social Media, namely Facebook, of a Drop In Session for information at the Charlton Shire Hall which was held on March 16. The VFF held a meeting in St Arnaud at which the CEO of Vic Grid attended but he lacked the simple answers the farmers were asking in relation to 'where' the Proposed Option 5 was going.

# Charlton Forum Report

Charlton Forum held its monthly meeting on Tuesday 21 March. In addition to Forum members, Cr David Pollard, Travis Fitzgibbon (Buloke Director of Community Development, and our new Council representative, Nathan Cutting (Buloke Manager Financial Strategy) were in attendance.

Items addressed included:

- Council has sent a letter to Regional Director of Road about proposed changes to road speed limits in High Street and Armstrong Street. Forum has been advocating for these changes.
- Improvements to the Elliott Gardens (new plantings) in time for the Centenary celebration of the Charlton Cenotaph in June.
- Adding the cleaning of the new rubbish

- bin surrounds to the Council roster.
- An update on the TAC Accessibility Planning and Curb-side & Footpath Upgrades projects. These have both been postponed due to flood recovery projects.
- Charlton Community Plan. Carolyn (Secretary) & Wayne (Chairperson) met with Gaynor Atkin who has been commissioned help Charlton to developed an updated community plan. Information will be collected through several avenues including a survey, community consultations and one on one conversations with relevant community groups etc.
- The funds remaining from the streetscape upgrade will be used to paint the Travellers Rest.

- The Gordon Park playground project has been postponed until a new flood overlay has been developed.
- The Travellers Rest Committee met with representatives to discuss items related to the installation of two cabins to the caravan park.
- The state of the Mildura/St Arnaud road sign was raised. Council will pursue its replacement.
- Forum agreed to replace the Charlton promotional signage on Start's buses.
- The proposed AEMO high voltage powerline route which will now pass through our community was discussed. General agreement that the community consultation process was insufficient as was the lack of details on the project route and its impact on our community.

# Teal is Tops for Charlton Trots

Throughout the morning's program the spinning wheel, run by Chris Livingston and Wendy Laffin, continued to add to the fundraising tally, along with a surprise midmorning announcement of a \$500 donation from Inghams.

Leanne Fanning was the first guest speaker to share her cancer journey - a story which has ultimately yielded a positive outcome thanks to the funding and which research makes possible improvements in medical outcomes. Emphasizing that she experienced no symptoms from her ovarian cancer, Leanne said her diagnosis was only discovered thanks to a check up for breast cancer. She urged all women undertaking yearly checks to ask for a blood test which will identify ovarian cancer rather than just relying on a pap smear which does not.

The short address by Professor John Mattick (SHARP Professor of RNA Biology at UNSW Sydney, previously Executive of Genomics England (2018-2019), and Director of the Garvan Institute of Medical Research in Sydney (2012-2018) related a story about how the funds raised through initiatives such as "Bubbles" makes a direct difference to peoples' lives. Following support offered by the Echuca Lions Club, Professor Mattick related how that funding enabled their team to identify gene mutations in two young, seriously ill children, target their treatment and ultimately see both children declared disease-free. Professor Mattick also said

that research is very close to being able to use genetic testing to predict - with accuracy - who is at high risk for ovarian cancer and other cancers, and who should go into regular screening.

In concluding he said: "On behalf of all the people who do the research, I thank you for your generosity – now and into the future – and I'd like you to know that it does make a difference. Thank you".

As the morning session came to a close, attendees were invited to take part in the silent auction, before CHRC President, Joe Thompson, and Joe McGrath kicked off the live auction. Bidding was fast and furious, as an array of donated items came under the hammer. The Club acknowledged the generosity of donors and contributors for their support with prizes.

Excitement built during the afternoon when entrants for Fashions on the Field were called to the presentation area. A large crowd was on hand to see the stylish outfits which added glamour to an already classy day. With a prize of \$1,000 for the Racegoer of the Day, fully coordinated fashions in a variety of spring-inspired colours were on show. Choosing the winners proved to be a difficult task for judges, Vicki Morrow and Tori Glenister from Harness Racing Victoria, but there was much excitement when the prizes were announced.



# Festival Legacy More Than Just Films

While it was upbeat and thought-provoking, the 2023 Charlton Arts Film Festival revealed more than just interesting film selections as the town welcomed back this staple calendar entry following the enforced Covid lockdowns of the past two years.

Another week and another festival for Charlton, the attendees for this event were a different cohort again, and their reasons for coming are not solely linked to the movies.

While some have family connections, many were returnees. Some have been supporting the festival for up to 15 years. Pretty much everyone was glad to be back, and over a luncheon break hosted at the Charlton Club on the Saturday it was an opportunity to discuss more than the bigscreen features and to nut out what it is that keeps drawing people back.

And a common name kept coming up — that of Jo Russell. Jo was one of the early instigators of the event when it first started in 1992. Connections and friendships have grown over the years, and blossomed following a small group trip to India which Jo undertook in 2006. Talking about the Film Festival to the travellers, Jo said that the following year three people from the tour came along, then they brought their friends, and so it has kept on growing.

For Laura Pender and Grace Natoli, their connection with Jo has seen them heading up the highway from Melbourne for about eight years. They love the drive and the atmosphere of the town, then there's the "good movies" and they feel the event is far more inclusive than the bigger film festivals in Melbourne. Said Grace, "In Melbourne the popular movies at the festivals are often sold out, so you can't get in. Here it's more intimate, the people attending are friendly, and we think the Rex is just lovely." A surprising bonus is that they meet a friend who lives in their home-town suburb, but only when they come to Charlton. "That's the only time we see her," they both

laughed. Their up-beat mood was amplified after seeing the opening night movie about a Dolly Parton impersonator. "We skipped back along the street singing "9 to 5!" said Laura

Other patrons such as Jan and Bryan Park from Ararat have also been long-time supporters, returning to the Festival for over 15 years. Jo Russell's daughter, Julie-Anne also added that while some of the older generation are no longer able to attend, the legacy has passed on, and in at least one

instance, the daughter of a devotee now comes in her place.

While friendships were a strong link to the event, other out-of-town patrons commented on the affordability, saying that a season's ticket was value for money, covering not just the films, but suppers, lunch, afternoon teas and with wine thrown in. "With movie tickets in Melbourne costing \$24, this is great value," said one visitor. Of course, good country baking is always appreciated, (one person expressed a preference for jelly slices!), opportunities to avail are plentiful. While some headed to local hospitality outlets for lunch, most chose to sample the packed meal prepared by the Charlton Youth Group. For the Saturday evening dinner, one long-time patron had nothing but praise for the East Charlton Hotel, adding that as a connoisseur of country pubs, he knew what he was talking about!

Of course, discussion about the films is an integral part of the experience, and most were impressed with the Saturday morning opener, "The Lake of Scars". Centred around Lake Boort and local Paul Haw's quest to save and preserve the indigenous cultural heritage of the Yung Balug and Dja Dja Wurrung clans, this impactful and emotive documentary drew strong reactions from the crowd, with a number of attendees considering a trip to Boort to find out more.

For members of Charlton Arts, the busy weekend not only renewed friendships, but initiated new members into the outreach of the organization. Fresh input and the injection of new ideas is creating a renaissance for the stalwarts who have sustained the group over its 30 plus years.

Committing to the running of the annual art show following Rotary's closure, it's the injection of this new energy which is credited as the major factor in taking on this next big challenge.

The production of a quarterly (seasonal) magazine profiling arts and life-style topics, is also a recent addition to the club's activities profiling local creatives and former residents in a forum through which their talents are shared. Secretary of Charlton Arts, Carolyn Olive said, "It's amazing how many people in Charlton have

hidden skills which can be showcased and used to enrich the community. Directly opposite the gardens is the Charlton Cenotaph, which itself celebrates its centenary later this year. The Boer War Memorial was unveiled in 1907 as a tribute to the memory of two locals, Troopers Watson and Bawden, killed in South Africa. The original lamp attachment was removed at a later date and the current concrete topper added. Also found in the gardens is the World War One Memorial Board, the magnificent Peace Tree, planted in 1920, the Vietnam War Monument, and the amazing General Harold 'Pompey' Elliott bronze bust. Other items of interest include the Ben Green Band Rotunda and Pioneer Women's Memorial. Next time you are down that end of the street drop by and have a wander around. It is well worth the effort

The program for the day was a visit to the Charlton Boral Quarry's Information Day.

# Charlton Quarry Community Day Overview.

History: Boral Resources acquired the Extractive Industry Lease from BMG Resources on the 28<sup>th</sup> July 1989. This lease has since been extended to what is now known as Work Authority 75. This has allowed extraction up until today and up to a further 20 years in the future. Once the mining boundary of Work Authority has been reached, a new Work Authority will have to be obtained to ensure future expansion. This will most likely see the Quarry extend south, utilizing the full length of the rocky spur that the Quarry has been developed on. Work Authority 75 allows the expansion of the pit to develop slightly further outwards at the North Eastern and North Western Corners of the pit and to deepen the current pit floor an extra 20 metrws.

Geology: The geology of the rock is a well jointed Hornfels, otherwise known as Schist. It is well known for its consistent rich 'blue' colour and hardness. This makes it ideal for all

construction applications ranging from low grade road bases, to premium products such as concrete aggregates, sealing aggregates and railway ballast.

# Products/Markets/

**Customers:** Of late the Charlton Quarry has played a major role in supplying products into the Murry Basin Rail upgrades where large quantities of rail ballast have been delivered to numerous locations between Avoca and Merbein. Upon completion of this the quarry will continue to work closely with V/Line in supplying many more rail maintenance and upgrade projects. Surprising to most, it supplies the majority of sealing aggregates into the Mildura and Sunraysia area annually as well as suppling its own Concrete plants in Mildura, Swan Hill, St Arnaud and Charlton with concrete specified aggregates. The Charlton Quarry also plays a major role in supplying road works, road maintenance and road upgrades within the northern corridor of the quarry utilizing specified road base such at 20mm Class 1, 2, 3 & 4 crushed rocks. Most recently the Charlton Quarry supplied all the material in to the recently remade access road to the Lake Tyrrell viewing platform and currently supplying to road upgrades on the Birchip Berriwillock Road and Sunraysia Highway. Despite this, there is still plenty of work needed to be done. Last, but certainly not least, the

local community has the opportunity to buy whatever quarry products that suit their needs providing it can be collected in a truck or by using our delivery service, of note our 20mm Non Descriptive Crushed Rock (NDCR) (B-Grade) is especially popular with farming community and civil contractors.

A Snap Shot of the Quarrying Process: Firstly an area in the pit is decided upon for blasting following the quarry's pit plan. It is then marked and drilled using 30 tonne drilling machines. Once the 'shot' is drilled it is then filled with explosives and blasted by a shot firing technician. Depending on the size of the area being blasted this usually occurs once every 6 weeks. After the blast, the once solid rock is fragmented into size 600mm and less where it can be easily handled by excavators. Up to 35% of this is 20mm or less which is where our 20mm NDCR is derived from. This product is better known as scalping's quarrying terms. The process of excavating the blasted rock onto the dump trucks and then the blasted rock to the crushing plant is called load and haul. Once the rock is hauled to the crushing plant it is tipped into a large hopper where it begins the process of crushing and screening. There are 3 crushers in this sequence. Each crusher breaks the rock down approximately 1/3 in size as it passes through. There are 4

active double decked screens in this sequence. Firstly a scalping screen which helps clean the rocks which reveals a cleaner assortment of rocks that is sent to the tertiary crushing plant where all our specialty products are screened, separated and graded. The final products are then collected from overhead bins in the crushing and screening plant and delivered to many different stockpiles that we can all see today. We also have a pug mill—its like a giant cake mixer that has the ability to blend certain quarry products to produce graded or bituminous coated aggregates which are better known as pre coated aggregates. These are the black stone you often see stockpiled on the side of roads during warmer months of the year. From the stockpiles the quarry products are loaded onto trucks using wheeled loaders where they are finally taken to the customer or final destination.

Boxing Day 26/12 /1974 – Police knocked on my door at 9am and demanded 1 report to 8<sup>th</sup> Foor Commonwealth Gov't Centre, Cnr Spring & Latrobe Sts, Melbourne. People

everywhere were installing phone line & handsets (20 or 30). Details of Cyclone Tracy were given and requirement to contact all Social Workers/ Welfare Officers and bring them in for briefing. Many were on annual leave. In 1974 there were no mobile phones or personal computers only main frame (Huge). I was advised there was a plane load of evacuees coming Tullamarine, ETA unknown. Number & condition unknown but they were assessed as most urgent for evacuation. assumed 400 - 500 on either QANTAS or RAAF. I was then sent to Tullamarine to set up a Registration System - Capture full name, sex, date of birth, marital status, children, address in Darwin. Contact details of family members in Darwin who were on the flight or who were not. Employer details and details of family/friends they may be able to stay with in Melbourne, if any medical history prior to Tracy, medications, available or not. Details of any injuries sustained in cyclone and urgency in treatment. Every person was given \$100, only a signature was required. I assisted in setting up arrangements made by the army for a team of medical & nursing staff, social worker, Red Cross, Salvos etc to be available and for a staging area to be set up within the airport (Bedding, Cots, Tables & Chairs, Food, Tea & Coffee etc.). The first plane arrived 4pm with 400 people in various states of health, shock and calmness. One young chap from Melbourne went to Darwin to work with his uncle on a fishing boat as part of a rehab program after he lost his right arm in an accident. He was out on the boat when Tracy hit and lost several fingers of his left hand. I stayed the night at Tullamarine and a second plane load of 400 arrived about 9-30pm. The next day I was called back into Command Centre to assist in setting up the Springvale Migrant and Wiltona Hotel both of which had recently closed. I do not know the actual number but it would have been between 5,000 and 9,000 People. Being closer to Darwin,

Adelaide & Sydney had higher numbers.

### **Information About Cyclone** Tracy

- Cyclone Tracy hit Darwin in the early hours of 15/12/ 1974 (2-05am)
- It was classified as a category 4 Cyclone before the anonometer at Darwin airport broke at the wind speed of 217 kph. It is estimated that wind speeds reached 272kph which would make it a category 5.
- 70% of all buildings and 80% of all homes in Darwin were destroyed or seriously damaged, with 40,000 or 85% of the total population of 47, 000 left homeless.
- All but 500 of Darwin's 12,000 buildings were damaged and all Power, Water. Sanitation and Communication infrastructure was knocked
- 71 people died, and 22 people were lost at sea
- Darwin's population was 47,000 some 35,362 (almost of 75%) these were evacuated mainly to Adelaide, Sydney and Melbourne. Most of these people have never returned to
- 25,628 (almost 73%) were evacuated by air, 15,950 by civilian aircraft and 9,678 by military aircraft.
- 4,925 people were evacuated in the first three days with 25,000 evacuated in the first week.
- The estimated cost restoring and repairing was around 7.2 billion dollars in 2023 dollars.

Also in the February 2023 Meeting—A two minute talk was given by Heather Hargreaves. Heather is a daughter of the late Jim and Freda (Judd) Moresi. In 1850 Fransesco Moresi and his Italian born wife Susette (Turin), Heather's great grandparents, came from Switzerland to Australia, settled near Lake Marmal and grew grapes and crops. There are still grape vines growing on the property where they first settled. Suzette reported in letters she left, that their first accommodation was a

bark hut which was not rain proof and they spent many rainy nights sleeping under umbrellas. Fransesco travelled Inglewood to get supplies and this was a trip of days by horse Heather's dray. grandparents built the present homestead at Lake Marmal in 1892. Here they raised 8 daughters and 5 sons (2 sets of twins - Heather's father Jim was a twin). The house was built of pisse bricks grandfather also built a lot of furniture as well as setting his sons up on a farm each. Jim and Freda lived in the homestead after they married, in 1935, until they retired to Charlton. Heather and husband Rav purchased the property. Along the way Heather and Ray have made many renovations to the farm and house. Past relatives, who loved to have family reunions there, would be most impressed with the farm as it is today. After Ray passed away, son Anthony took over the reins and he and Heather now run things together.

In 2001 Heather and her daughter had a trip to Monaco. The trip was extended as they were keen to visit where Fransesco Moresi originated from. During a visit to a restaurant he once owned and the old home, they were made welcome and given refreshments. It was a very full on trip which included Monaco, Milan, a European tour, London and a week in Paris.

On 17<sup>th</sup> February 2023 the Probus Club of Charlton visited the New Extensions to the Rex Theatre. It was great to see. Thanks to David & Hayden.





For Christians, Easter is the most important celebration of our faith. It marks the resurrection of Jesus and his triumph over sin and death. Easter eggs have become a popular symbol associated with the holiday. But what is the significance of Easter eggs for Christians?

Early on in the history of the church, the egg became a powerful symbol for the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Just as a chick hatches from its egg and emerges into new life, Christians believe that Jesus emerged from his tomb on Easter Sunday, having conquered death and bringing new life to all who believe in him.

In many Christian traditions, eggs are also associated with Lent, the 40-day period of fasting and reflection leading up to Easter. During Lent, Christians give up certain foods, including meat and dairy products. Eggs were traditionally included in this group of foods to avoid since they were seen as a rich and luxurious food that should be set aside in favor of more modest fare.

However, while eggs were not being consumed during Lent, chickens were still laying eggs. To keep from wasting the eggs, people would hard boil them and keep them until Easter Day. On Easter Day, they would bring their eggs, along with all of the other foods that would be used for their Easter feast to be blessed by the priest. They would bring all of their food in a basket which is where we get the tradition of the Easter basket.

Having your Easter foods blessed was a way of expressing gratitude for the abundance of God's blessings and also served as a way to sanctify and consecrate the foods that were to be eaten on Easter Sunday. There was even a special prayer prayed over the eggs:

Lord, let the grace of your blessing come upon these eggs, that they be healthful food for your faithful who eat them in thanksgiving for the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you forever and ever. Amen.
