A On Show

It was the high-quality workmanship which caught the judges' eyes at the May CWA East Wimmera Group Creative Arts and Home Industries Exhibition held in Charlton as more than 800 items were on display for public viewing.

A showpiece for the talents of many members, the seven Branches which comprise this region come together every two years to present the best-of-the-best across a wide range of categories.

The 2023 event was co-hosted by the Charlton Cabbaritta and Wedderburn Branches, with the organization of the show carried out by East Wimmera Group Craft Secretary, Cherie Duncan, and her assistant, and incoming Craft Secretary, Barbara Douglass.

Held at the Charlton Hall, the magnitude of skills contained within the membership of Bealiba, Cabbaritta (Charlton), Kara (St. Arnaud), Marnoo, Stuart Mill, Wedderburn and Wirrem (Birchip) Branches appears limitless, as tables of exquisite knitting, sewing, embroidery, floral arts, quilting, cookery, and much more, both inspire and amaze.

President of East Wimmera Group, Sharon Douglas, said that while the event showcases truly exceptional skills, she believes it is also an important vehicle for all exhibitors to have their workmanship available to be shared with others.

"People love seeing craft work," Sharon said, "and often these pieces just sit in people's homes and we never have the opportunity to see it. There are so many beautiful items amongst the ones which don't receive prizes that if it weren't for exhibitions such as this, the appreciation of this work – much of which is so meaningful to the creator - would be limited.'

Mrs Douglas also said that while the CWA profile is frequently centered around creativity and cooking, the exhibition showcases only one aspect of the wider work of the organization. "While the Women's Association is a-Country political, it is also an active and respected lobbyist across both Federal and State governments with its work for the welfare of women and children (both rural and urban), and for its social advocacy."

Amongst many highlights at the exhibition a stand-out is always the table displays entered by each Branch which are based on a theme (this year it was "Four Seasons") and feature five different crafts. Mixing the traditional with the innovative, interpretations ranged from collections of separate items, to Wedderburn Branch's reimagining of their local park and

integrating autumnal features within that framework.

Junior members of CWA also compete within their own age group, and it was encouraging to see the diversity of contributions at this year's event.

While a considerable amount of planning and execution is needed to make a show like this happen, it also needs people who are willing to enter. Craft Secretary, Cherie Duncan, said the judges had expressed concern that some Groups may no longer be able to support events like this due to dwindling entries. Hence, the glowing appraisal of East Wimmera's presentation was both a compliment and an endorsement of CWA's strength across this region. Continued on page 5.

Rex to Launch Strategic Plan

Following on from the community consultations earlier this year, the Rex Theatre, Charlton will launch its Strategic Plan on Tuesday 6 June at 9am at the Rex venue.

Using community feedback, from both the meetings and from an online survey, the community owned and operated facility has been hard at work finalising the document, guided by Leah Sertori from Sertori Consulting. Enablement of the process was made possible thanks to a grant through the Foundation for Regional and Rural Renewal (FRRR), funded by ANZ's Seeds of Renewal Program.

Rex Chairperson, Hayden McKinnon, said the Board had spent a considerable amount of time reviewing and refining the content to accurately reflect the directions and priorities needed to take the organization forward.

"Input from both the community and the Rex Board helped us identify five areas of strategic priority which will guide our direction into the future and which will strengthen both our internal structure and external outreach," Hayden said.

"The community response was very clear about how this facility is perceived and how we need to have an all-embracing scope."

Hayden expressed gratitude to ANZ and FRRR for their support, saying it was an investment which would guide the Rex in its ability to provide a service and to build its community connections. He also acknowledged the work of consultant, Leah Sertori, for the facilitation of the community consultations and her drafting and development of the strategy.

"We are now ready to share this document," Hayden said, "and we extend an invitation to everyone to be a part of the launch."

The event will take place at the Rex Theatre on Tuesday 6^{th}

June at 9 am prior to the *Small Towns Big Difference* Forum which is on the same date in Charlton.

The Strategic Plan will be

available on the Rex website (rextheatre.org.au) and hard copies will also be available at the theatre.

Continued from Page 1. The inclusion of demonstrators Sally Wright (wool felting), from St. Arnaud, along with Bealiba creatives, Lyndene Higgins and Amanda Latter (upcycling of vintage fabrics and vintage baskets) was an added attraction.

Sally's fibre processing interest has evolved over the past five years, and utilizes wool from their own sheep which she cleans, dyes and spins. Using both natural and commercial dyes, the wool is stabbed through a canvas or blanket

backing to create the image as colours are intermingled to build tonal transitions.

Amanda's collection of vintage crotchet and card baskets included a 100-year-old heirloom as well as more recent examples. Passionate about the craft, Amanda runs classes in the craft in her home town of Bealiba.

"Waste-not-want-not" could be Lyndene Higgins motto as the talented craft practitioner creates the most exquisite items from old-fashioned rejects. Surrounded by old buttons, beads, lace and fabric, Lyndene was working on a queen-sized wedding quilt for her granddaughter made completely from recycled items. The ivory and oyster coloured squares were embellished with antique lace, ribbons, beads, buttons and doilies, imbuing it with a heritage made up from multiple background stories.

Officially opening the exhibition, Buloke Councillor (and CWA member) Bronwyn Simpson spoke about her own CWA journey and the directions which joining the organization had opened up to her. Acknowledging the exhibitors, and the tireless work of Craft Secretary, Cherie Duncan, Bronwyn then formally announced the exhibition open.

In response, Cherie thanked Group President, Sharon Douglas, and in-coming Craft Secretary, Barbara Douglass, for their incredible support in the lead-up to the event. Also acknowledging the work of the stewards, the hostess Branches of Cabbaritta and Wedderburn, exhibitors, judges ("we were one of the few exhibitions which had lots of judges") and demonstrators, the prize winners were then announced.

NATIONAL SERVICE.

Charlton RSL sub-Branch is compiling a list of all locals who have served Australia in the National Service schemes in the 1950s to 1970s. There were two such schemes:

Charlton RSL Sub-branch

1951 to 1959. All 18 year old males who were fit for service served in the forces for 176 days, 98 days basic training and a further 78 days in Civilian Military Force (CMF) over the next three years; and,

1965 to 1972. A birthday ballot was held for 20 year old males and, if balloted in and fit for service, they served in the army for 2 years full time and a further 3 years part time in the reserves. They could be sent overseas, and many of them served in Vietnam.

We have details of those who went to Vietnam, but not of other national servicemen.

Ike Richards

Our feature story this month relates to a popular man about town who you may already know a little about. If you visit the East Charlton Hotel you may notice a faded newspaper article on the back wall concerning Mr Ike Richards. Following a suggestion from a friend, Alf Dabron, about a terrific opportunity to take over a hairdressing business in Charlton, Ike arrived in town in April 1920. The story suggests that Ike first went to check in at the Cricket Club Hotel but there were no vacancies. He then went to the East where he intended to stay for a few days to get settled. He finished up staying for 65years, firstly in the old hotel, then eight years later in the newly built one. He first occupied Room 17, then moved into Room 8 which was more convenient being away from the busy and often noisy accommodation trade of those days. Ike commented that even having 14 landlords over all those years, there was never one occasion where a disagreement had occurred.

Ike managed his new business in High Street that comprised 5 hairdressing chairs, first class fittings and accessories, and had 42 regular 'Pot' clients. This was an individual shaving cup that showed men their value as customers and assisted with goodwill. Ike paid seventy pound for the business, walk in, walk out, and had the very good rental price of just 15 shillings per week for the premises. Retiring from hairdressing 25 years later, Ike next established a popular gift shop in High Street that many older residents still remember that he ran until 1978.

Not only a business man, Ike was a tireless worker in the community for many organizations. He was honoured at a special council meeting in 1979, where he jokingly commented on his 'Family Special' price for haircuts when he first opened; 3 people for 2 shillings. That is why, he said, he had to work until he was 83! His 90th birthday was celebrated in 1986 at the Charlton Senior Citizens Room with a large crowd in attendance. He moved to the Bush Nursing Hospital in 1987.

Everyone is vulnerable to scams so everyone needs information about how to identify and avoid being scammed. Some people think that only the gullible and greedy fall victim to scams. The truth is scammers are clever and if you don't know what to look out for, anyone can fall victim to a scam. Have you received an offer that seems too good to be

true, perhaps a phone call to help fix your computer or a threat to pay money you do not owe, an alert from your bank or telecommunications provider about a problem with your account or even an invitation to 'befriend' or connect online? Scammers know how to press your buttons to get what they want. They are getting smarter, moving with the times to take advantage of new technology, new products or services and major events to create believable stories that will convince you to part with your money or personal details.

Contact Your Bank Immediately

If you have sent money or personal banking information to a scammer, **contact your Bank Immediately**, they may be able to stop a money transfer or cheque or close your account details, reverse the transaction if your credit card was billed fraudulently.

Some Golden Rules To Protect Yourself

Be alert to the fact that scams exist. When dealing with uninvited contacts from people or businesses, whether it's over the phone, by mail, email, in person or on social networking . Remember if it looks too good to be true, it probably is.

Know who you're dealing with. If you have only ever met someone online or are unsure of the legitimacy of a business, take some time to do a bit more research.

Do not open suspicious texts, pop-up or email – delete them. If unsure, verify the identity of the contact through an independent source such as a phone book or online search. **Don't** use the contact details provided in the message sent to you. Keep your Personal details secure Put a lock on your Mail Box and shred your bills and other important documents before throwing them out. Keep your passwords and pin numbers in a safe place. Be very careful about how much personal information you share on social media.

Beware of unusual payment methods. Scammers often ask for payment by wire transfers.





Charlton Cenotaph Centenary Anniversary

The Charlton Cenotaph, which stands proudly at the western end of High Street, was unveiled 100 years ago on the 23rd June, 1923.

Topped with an Italian marble Australian soldier, the memorial commemorates the 47 Charlton WWI and 13 WWII soldiers who died during these wars. It also includes Nurse Munro, who died during WW1 in Salonika, Greece.

To mark this special milestone, the Charlton RSL Sub-branch has planned an Centenary event for the weekend of the 23rd & 24th June.

The Pacific Belles will be live at the Rex Theatre on Saturday 24th June. This retro trio will be singing all the foot tapping hits of the 1940s. Tickets are \$35 and bookings can be made online at https:// events.humanitix.com/charlton-rsl-pacificbelles.

On Sunday 25th June at 1:30pm, a commemorative service will take place at the cenotaph. The Charlton-Wycheproof bank will be playing and afternoon tea will be available. A wet weather contingency plan is in place.

A booklet has been produced to accompany the service. It contains the details and stories of those who are listed on the memorial. The Charlton Golden Grains Museum's, secretary, Carolyn Olive, has been researching the stories of the men & women who served. She says, "It's been a sad but rewarding experience. Particularly as this booklet concentrates only on the men and women who died. However, I'm

pleased their stories are being told."

Everyone is encouraged to attend the event and the Charlton RSL Sub-branch look forward to seeing you there.

They caught a railway motor-tricycle which unfortunately broke down near Buckrabanyule so a goods train was commandeered and they eventually arrived in Charlton late and covered in mud.

But behind that is a deeper and more comforting truth. When we come before God in prayer, we come with everything we are and everything we are carrying. Part of that is the fact that we were asked to pray for "so-and-so" and forgot! God can handle that. God takes the intention of the heart to pray for that person and it is enough. All God wants is our desire to pray. So we can be sure that when we come to him with our forgotten prayers, he will be able to find them, and he will not forget. Good one, God – what a relief!






