Maurice James Claxton from Coonooer Bridge, Private, No. 1239, D Company, 32nd Battalion enlisted on 21 July 1915, embarked on 18 November 1915 and, sadly,

was one of over 1,900 Australian soldiers killed in the Battle of Fromelles on 20 July 1916. His body was buried by the Germans in an unmarked mass grave at Pheasant Wood, where it lay along with 244 other soldiers for over 100 years. Early in 2023 his remains were identified by DNA and reburied at Pheasant Wood Military Cemetery with full military honours and a headstone was placed over his grave.

The Charlton Cenotaph was unveiled on 23 June 1923 to honour the 47 men and women from Charlton, including Private Maurice James Claxton, who died in the Great War. On 11 November 1951, Remembrance Day, a plaque to honour the 13 men from Charlton who died in the Second World War was added to the Cenotaph. On

Sunday 2023, recognised the centenary of the Charlton Cenotaph and remembered Charlton's war dead, the 60 whose names appear on the Cenotaph, and also the two commemorated on the Boer War memorial in Elliott Gardens, Troopers Alfred Bawden and Robert Watson. Thanks to research carried out by the Charlton Golden Grains Museum volunteers, the story of the 60 war dead from the two great wars has been recorded in a commemorative booklet. copies of which are available from the museum and Charlton RSL sub-Branch. Thanks to their sacrifice yesterday, we can enjoy our today and tomorrow.

Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome to the August update of happenings from your local Charlton Golden Grains Museum. The museum is looking great with some new displays completed or near completion. If you haven't visited for a while, or have friends or family staying, why not make it a point to drop by. We are open every Sunday from 11:00am until 3:00pm, or by prior arrangements with one of the volunteers listed below. Please give as much notice as possible to arrange your visit. Admittance is still a very low \$5 and free for children. Perhaps your local club or organization would like to drop in and have a look around; group tours are most welcome.

Museum AGM

The museum recently held its Annual General Meeting. We have a new President—Diane Wood, who has been a volunteer at the museum since moving to Charlton. Anne Kenny, who had been in the role for six years, was thanked for her dedication to the museum and her help in steering the museum towards accreditation with AMaGA. New member, Judy Stephen, is our new treasurer. We thank Glenda Litton who had served in this role for many years including the difficult years after the 2011 flood. The committee look forward to a busy year and the museums 50th Celebration planned Anniversary November this year. Carolyn Olive continues as Secretary, a position she has held since 2008 and is also our Curator. David Beaty is Vice President and Markus Phillips, Archivist.

The Mechanics Institute

This month our feature will look at something that is very close to us, and that is the premises that we are located in. The beautiful Mechanics Institute building is owned by the Buloke Shire and is generously made available to us to house our collection. Opened on December 31, 1882, the building re-housed the Charlton Mechanics Institute's library of over 1000 books. Charlton Shire agreed to rent the building after its formation for 3 years from August 1895, and continued as tenant until 1911. The Education Department held cookery classes for girls between 1911 and 1923 until a cookery room was built at the High School. The building was also used as clubrooms for the RSL, CWA, Bowls and Croquet Club, and later Senior Citizens Room.

Taking ownership of the building in 1948, Charlton Shire undertook some much needed renovations and extensions moving the Infant Welfare Centre into the vacant reading room. The larger room was used by the community, with its piano popular for dances and concerts. In 1953 the council was keen to move its offices into the building, but after community objections reconsidered. With its new premises built the Infant Welfare Centre relocated to Armstrong Street in 1962 and the Soil Conservation Authority took up occupancy where they remained until 1973. With the forming of the Charlton Golden Grains Museum, the Shire offered free tenancy, with the public and community still accessing the main room for meetings and functions until 1997. A special centenary anniversary plaque was unveiled in December 1982 by Charlton Shire President, Cr Bingham. If you haven't been inside the building, make time for a visit; it is wonderful to view.

Looking for Volunteers

Do you have a few hours free each month? The Charlton Golden Grains Museum, like so many other groups in our community, relies on the great support of volunteers. We are always looking for new members to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. No experience is needed and appropriate training will be provided. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations contact the museum; you will be made most welcome.

Another way to help is to become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar from this and our other fundraising goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items.

Charlton Lions Club Changeover Dinner

EXPERIENCED HANDS LEAD LIONS

The leadership status quo remained unchanged when the Charlton Lions Club held their change-over dinner on Friday 14th July at the East Charlton Hotel.

Under the very capable guidance of President, Ross Lane, all executive positions - including that of President – retained their current status as the club looked back over the previous year's achievements and took note of future directions.

The warm and convivial atmosphere allowed ample opportunities for members, guests and visitors to mix as well as acknowledge the valuable contributions which Lions make to the local community.

Although somewhat smaller in number the passion which fires both individuals and the group was clear as the President revealed the club's decision to purchase a CORPULS CPR machine for the Charlton ambulance. Following a presentation by local paramedics Mark Passalick and Jarryd French Lions decided to commit to the purchase of the equipment which enables regular and ongoing compressions in cardiopulmonary cases and has proven to be a game changer in saving lives and improving the quality of patient care.

At a cost of \$20,000, President Ross

said Lion Peter Watts "hit the phones", securing funding from the Australian Lions Foundation, the Charlton Op Shop, the Hospital Auxiliary, along with Charlton Lions own contribution. The mechanism will be on show at an up-coming Ambulance Open Day.

Lions have also donated \$1,000 to the District 201 v1-4 project - the purchase of a \$334,000 Incucyte live cell imagining platform for the St. Vincent's Institute of Medical Research. The equipment, which provides real-time cell monitoring and surveillance, allows for a faster and more efficient way of collecting medical data. While District 201 v1-4 has raised approximately \$40,000 to date, it is being promoted as a state-wide initiative where each of the 326 Victorian Lions Clubs contribute \$1000.

With MC Garry Larmour welcoming the crowd, acknowledgement of guests included: Buloke Mayor, Alan Getley, Deputy Mayor David Pollard and his wife, Jenny, Immediate Past District Governor, Robyn Falloon and PDG Stan Falloon, PDG, Harry Brindley (ASM), plus the family of President Ross Lane – wife Amanda, mother Marion, son Chris and wife Lucy and their children Ollie and Charlie. As a friend of Lions and the Lane

family, Leo Tellefson was also invited as a special guest.

The formalities of the evening were conducted between courses of the delicious meal, with Mayor, Alan Getley carrying out the toast to Lions International and the Lions Club of Charlton, and IPDG Robyn Falloon presenting the response.

One of the highlights of the evening was the induction of new member Craig


Charlton Croquet Club

In very wet and slippery conditions at St Arnaud two of Charlton's youngest players in Kevin Sait and Bill Baird scored 4 and 3 goals respectively, to help their team to a hard fought victory.

John Giblett's return to the club gave strength around the packs, and with ruckmen Grose and Hindson in command, Charlton's brigade of runners dominated. Roberts, Hillier, Avery and Thompson were excellent in defence, keeping star Wedderburn full forward Alan Jackson to 1 goal for the afternoon.



Topics will be tailored to each region, including local initiatives from the Go Fishing Victoria plan, upgrades as part of the state's biggest ever boat ramp construction program being led by BBV, the vital work of Fisheries Officers and research insights from fisheries scientists into iconic fish like Murray cod and yellowtail kingfish.

VFA CEO Travis Dowling said this year's run of forums was the biggest yet and presented an opportunity for fishers and boaters to learn something new, share an

idea or ask that burning question that has long been the source of debate with family and friends.

"We're excited to be heading out to even more clubs to catch up with fishers and boaters and discuss how we're helping make their pastime better than ever," he said.

"What we're really keen to do is hear what matters to fishers and boaters in their neck of the woods. Locals know their patch best and their ideas can help us make fishing even better in Victoria. "There's so much to chat about, from where we're stocking your fish, the growing all-abilities boating network, reinvestment of fees from your fishing and boating licences, important education work and much, much more."




