Charlton Show - Back on Track

Community support for a long-held and much-loved tradition was back on track as the 140th Charlton A. & P. Society Show returned in October after a three year absence.

Big crowds, renewed interest and vibrant attractions welcomed the return of the event to its new home at the Charlton Park Complex-its first outing since the Complex was opened in 2019.

Qudos for the hardworking Show Committee - bouncing back from 2022's heart-breaking decision to cancel just 24 hours before Show Day due to floods - as their steady organization and volunteer commitment presented a highly praised event for 2023.

"Best Show for many years", "Highest number of entries" (in some of the Pavilion

categories) - these comments reflected the eagerness of community interest and the desire of the community to get back together again for one big celebration.

Agricultural features such as the Sheep Dog trials, fleece displays, small engines, sheaf toss and wood chop, mixed well with the outstanding exhibits on show in the Pavilion, and the add-ons such as the boomerang throwing, roving stilt walkers, children's entertainment, face-painting, and a large collection of stall holders with their wares in the main room of the Park Complex.

The ability to do online entries for exhibits was a huge bonus Pavilion Secretary, Aileen Allan said, and along with valuable feed-back from the judges, the continued improvement of one of the Show's feature attractions looks set to grow into the future.

The Show was formally opened by Peter Whykes, with Buloke Mayor, Alan Getley, also commending the Show Committee and community for retaining this important day in the calendar year.

Rides, jumping castles, climbing wall, showbags, and plenty of food vans were on hand, and music during the afternoon and then on into the evening brought the day to a close.

A day like this doesn't happen without considerable support and Show President, Billy Fitzpatrick and Secretary, Wendy Laffin expressed their thanks to the Committee members, stewards, judges, volunteers and the community for the extensive input.

The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. To mark this important occasion we are holding a special event on Sunday 19th November.

Dedication to Grace Cadzow

In recognition of her many years of service we are dedicating our main display room to the late Grace Cadzow. She was a founding member of the museum and would become the backbone of the organisation for over 40 years. Her wealth of knowledge on Charlton's history was invaluable and her many publications are still used today. Some of Grace's family will be in attendance for this special tribute.

Keeping the Faith

We are also using this occasion to unveil our new display, 'Keeping the Faith', located in the Wesleyan Chapel. This lovely old building is now one of the oldest surviving buildings in Charlton (1876) and the opportunity to bring it back into public use is exciting. The Charlton Uniting Church has generously allowed us to use this building and have also provided funds towards its renovation. The display explores the history of Charlton's many churches since the town's establishment in 1863 and includes several organs from local churches, new display cases containing a selection of church items and several interpretive panels.

On the first weekend of October, in Charlton, it was all aboard for the Sound Tracks festival, Volume 1, for a fun-filled weekend of music, arts, and small town hospitality on a whole other platform.

Though the community of Charlton is no stranger to welcoming the out-of-town "blow-ins", due to the ever-increasing popularity of the OK Motels festival, the train was certainly a first.

All Aboard

Starting at Melbourne and picking up fellow city-folk from Geelong and Ballarat on the Friday evening, the fully restored steam train featured thirteen carriages, cocktails and canapes, a well-stocked martini bar, the Click Clack club disco carriage, complete with a jazz band in a faux -leather lounge, and sleeping quarters – individual or pairs – for up to 200 people. The limited train space certainly didn't stop other folk from travelling to the festival under their own steam, though!

Chug! Chug! Chug!

While the train was chugging along, people were chugging drinks, and came to a halt outside the Charlton station on the outskirts of town on Friday night. For those early risers, the sunrise would have been a sight to behold, heralding the beginning of a brilliant day of music, friendships, and country hospitality.

Welcome to Charlton

Said country hospitality came in strong, with the Charlton Lions Club providing a tantalising barbecue breakfast on Saturday – and if there weren't many train-folk awake, then that just meant all the more meat for the locals!

With a break in the music for the visiting train travellers to refresh their ears in preparation for the evening's festivities, Charlton was open for exploration. Opshops and cafes had their fill, the river walk was worn down with the amount of people wishing to be absorbed in the scenery, and the streets were flooded with "blow-ins" and locals alike.

There were other activities to entertain, too. A walk through the Charlton Museum was fascinating and enlightening - locals were more than willing to share the stories behind the exhibits and the history of the town. One particularly fascinating exhibit showcased a bouquet of dyed paper flowers, made by a girl who died at only 25 years old over 100 years ago, it could be of national significance, and the loss of such an important piece of history would be devastating. As it is, about 30% of everything in the museum was lost; after the floods devastated Charlton in 2011, and last year threw everyone into fear that it would happen again. Everybody is just really excited that everything is back to normal,' said local, Cheryl Kemp.

This festival meant a lot to the locals, as well as the "blow-ins". It's evident that Kate Berry, organiser of the event as well as OK Motels, loves Charlton and wants to see the community thrive, but it's also a brilliant way of making friends.

New Friendships

"With the hallways between the carriages only being this big," train-traveller Karl said, holding his arms barely a metre apart, "you kind of had to make friends with other passengers – there was no choice!"

The excitement was certainly palpable. If this was to be a celebration of Charlton and its community, then said community was going to go all-out.

As such, in this highly arts-centric event, it's hardly surprising to note one of the activities on offer was helping create a new mural wall for Charlton. Bronwyn Fisher, the woman in charge, had set up a stall out

the back of the Charlton Club near the river, and had a spread of tables full of tin cans, old bottletops, wooden planks and nails, CDs, old jewellery, steel wire, and many more kitschy knick-knacks – the place looked like a crow's nest, and the analogy could not have been more apt, as Bronwyn's mural idea was getting people to craft knickknack birds.

With the Men's Shed having donated hammers, saws, and drills to the cause, with the bottlecaps donated by the pub, with Win from the vintage shop donating the old jewellery, and with locals and visitors alike creating the tchotchke birds, it really was a community art project. For those even more artistically inclined, there was spray paint on offer as well, if the finished bird was just missing a little pizzazz before it could truly be called "complete".

"Everyone is so creative with everything," said Bronwyn, beaming as she looked down at the created collection. "We have 45 absolutely beautiful birds in total so far – the wall beside the Globe is going to be filled in no time!"

Lunchtime!

But the wall wasn't the only thing that needed to be filled. When people started growing peckish as the day flew by, the bowls club opened its doors. Once again, the CWA ladies were back behind the scenes in the kitchen, serving up an always-delectable series of homemade scones alongside some tea or coffee. The bowling green made the perfect place for a lunchtime picnic (or breakfast, for those train-goers who were having their first meal of the day).

And, of course, there was music to set the scene. Folk Bitch Trio travelled all the way from Melbourne to serenade the picnickers with their beautiful (and, at times, haunting) melodies, with Maple Glider following as a solo act, singing whilst playing the guitar.

There was no point in being at the bowls club without getting a bit of a game on, though! Whether the competition was serious or silly, people partnered up for a good time, locals and visitors intermingling. For those who had never played, there were plenty of local professionals around to impart their extensive bowls and croquet knowledge. And though the competition may not have been fierce, the sun certainly was.

Stolen

It might have been a gorgeous day, but by the afternoon, people were grateful for a chance to escape the rays and flock indoors for the opening of Chris Wyatt's art exhibition, "Stolen", at the Charlton Courthouse Gallery. Don't worry for those who are thinking they missed it, for the exhibition will be open until February 25, next year.

"This is the biggest show I've done so





far," said Chris, "and I have another halfdozen in the works ready for a larger gallery."

This particular series of paintings is heavily inspired by the conversation in the year 2000 about whether the Stolen Generation really happened. Chris, though, had met survivors from said Stolen Generation, and couldn't believe the concept was still an ongoing argument. He was moved to create the paintings, depicting loss and longing in all its raw honesty, in order to help forge a connection and continue the discourse.

"Most of my figures are archetypal, the personification of grieving men and women. They're not meant to be specific, they're meant to be universal, the capture of the feeling."

Chris's son, Kenneth, was also present for the opening of his father's exhibition, and described how some artworks would take his dad years to complete. "I grew up with some of these paintings," he said, gesturing around the room.

If there was one word that could be used to describe Chris's paintings, it would be "powerful"; a word that is neither good nor bad in and of itself, but the ramifications of it can have wildly differing consequences.

"I may have only been in Charlton 5 years, but I love having shows here more than I ever did in the city," said Chris. "It's more personal. If you go to a show at the Australian Gallery in Fitzroy, for example, you may only get 8 people showing up – here, you get hundreds, simply because of the community support. It's a wonderful thing, to be able to share it."

Dinner is Served

And after the perusal of the fine arts, it was time, once again, to delve into the culinary arts. A beautiful lamb and turkey roast was served for dinner, with music by local legend Leo Tellefson's band, Blend It. The meal must have reenergised a lot of people, because there was a dance floor created in the hall by the end of dinner, folks twirling and twisting to Blend It's swinging tunes.

The music was only just beginning for the night, too. After food, folks braved the onset of night to trek to the local Rex Theatre, ready for a music show they would never forget. With the lights dimmed, people full of food and wine, the stage was set for song, and the night didn't disappoint.

Glass Beams certainly got the crowd not only beaming, but also dancing and cheering, and some of them didn't sit back down again for the rest of the night. With glitter and guitars, basically becoming their own disco ball, it was no wonder the crowd was on its feet.

Harvey Sutherland and his band were up next, and you could feel the bass in your bones and the synth in your soul. It was uncertain who was feeling the music more, at times – Harvey might have had better dance moves than the crowd!

And, finally, to close off the Rex concert, DJ Rona took centre stage to thunderous applause. Like Harvey, she, too, rivalled the crowd in her dance moves.

Farewell

With the night old but the morning still young (very young), those who wanted the party to continue flocked to the nearby East Charlton Hotel for further drinks, those meaningful late night conversations, and pool games of dubious skill. It was, perhaps, with a bittersweet note that the train began its long trek from Charlton early in the morning, but it was a weekend of more than just the sound of music – it was light and laughter and friendships forged without pressure.

What drew people to this event? Honestly, it is the community. It was personally my second time attending an OK Charlton adjacent event, and both times have been phenomenal. Visitors say they are drawn to this town and keep coming back because of the community and just how welcoming and open everyone is, and it must be contagious as they are just as welcoming and open. Everywhere I went, people were more than happy to talk, help, laugh, pose for photos when I asked them to, give life advice, genuinely answer my questions, everything and anything – locals and out-of-towners alike.

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There was a book club on the train ride home – a quieter close to the event. Though it may have been a stark contrast from the disco carriages, cocktails and jazz bands, and the old style lounge on the ride up, it was not an unwelcome contrast, and the perfect way to end an amazing weekend out.

The Charlton community, the musicians, OK Motels, and everyone else involved should all be extremely proud of their efforts. The festival, like the steam train itself, was the perfect blend of old and new. Modern bands in the historic Rex Theatre, creating a brand new mural out of repurposing old "rubbish", and forging new friendships or reigniting old ones, the final tune of the Sound Tracks' festival was certainly not a swan song, for there is always room for a Volume 2 next year!

NCGC Open Gardens Day

Building on an already strong reputation, visitors embraced the 2023 North Central Garden Club's (NCGC) Open Gardens Day in Charlton - held in early October - with a customary passion, and as opening time ticked over a steady stream of cars arrived at the registration hub. This year it was located at the Uniting Church buildings in Halliday Street as the Senior Citizens' Rooms had been commandeered for The Voice to Parliament referendum. The lure of outdoor plant stalls provided an instant attraction, setting the scene for all-thingsgarden to come.

As one of the few events not cancelled in 2022, the gardens meander seemed to generate a sense of eagerness this year, even though last year's event had continued as normal. The purchase of a ticket, the picking up of the brochure and planning out the garden visitation route was quickly undertaken as the traffic headed off from the main hub in all directions.

People opening their private land up to the general public is a generous gesture, and as in previous years there were six locales which welcomed visitors into their muchloved domains.

While finding inspiration, or just observing somebody else's patch is part of the Open Gardens appeal, it's the conversations which are generated which gives as much value as anything else.

At least four of the properties had flood stories woven into their regeneration, reestablishment or re-creation. For one at least, this had provided a sense of solace and purpose in dealing with the aftermath of the flood disaster. For another, a change in life circumstances had meant creating a considerably down-sized garden – a case of "how to have a garden without having a yard." Even those whose allotment had been breached by the overflowing Avoca River still commented that their "river view with the majestic river gums, was spectacular."

The genesis story of a number of gardens had seen an evolution from bare or neglected blocks to verdant, productive spaces – some geared around water-wise plantings, and others now sporting established and prolific surrounds. Edible gardens and climate-sensitive items were showcased as much as ornamentals, natives and the more traditional floral inclusions.

A real eye-opener for many was access to a number of the St. Andrews Village allotments off High Street. All were smallish spaces, but each participating resident expressed their own individual tastes and passion – be it the attraction of birds, enjoyment of the vibrant colours, access to the community garden, or the benefits which pottering in an outdoor space can bring.

One of the re-occurring comments from visitors was how gardening builds a sense

of community. How conversations begin between owners, strangers and fellow gardeners, with the sharing of ideas and tips and how continuity becomes an integral part of the ongoing plan. For newcomers to Charlton, Joan and John Sexton, it was talking about the appreciation of hard work which goes into making a garden and the associations which come from growing cuttings given by friends. For Wendy Laffin, it is in part the connection to a previous home owner whose plantings still continue to grow and thrive. For Sheila and John Grenfell, it was the reinvigoration of a neglected space which now harmoniously mixes cottage garden in the front with more hardy plantings in the back.

By far the largest property was spacious surrounds of Wes and Michelle Jenkyn's View Street residence. A participant in the 2015 Open Gardens Day, the family was pleased to showcase the changes which

While rain clouds threatened the event a couple of times, the heaviest downpour held off until later in the day, and the cooler weather made for more pleasant conditions for sight-seeing. This year was probably the first time the event was conducted in overcast conditions.

Appeal is always in the eye of the beholder, so preferences will vary, but what remains unshakable is the appreciation of endeavour which goes into creating these much-loved garden spaces. The North Central Garden Club – including President, Bernice Kenny, Secretary, Lynne McRae, Treasurer, Marieta Doughty and all the members - are to be commended for facilitating this opportunity for people to

enjoy and share their gardening passions, and given the interest generated, may the event continue on for many years to come!

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Participating gardens included the following residents: Elias and Katherine Giakimis, Sandra Runagall, Michelle and Wes Jenkyn, Bernie and Wendy Laffin, John and Sheila Grenfell, Bev Mullholland, Julie McGurk and Moria Sheanhan.

Their house name "Alonia" is a Greek word with associations to wheat and to harvesting techniques.

Recycling of materials has seen the addition of a tropical and native orchid house, shade house and a fish pond converted from the base of an old water tank.

Award for Charlton Bakery

Charlton Arts 'Art & Photography Exhibition'

A creative mainstay of the Charlton community made a welcome return on 13th October with the Charlton Arts 'Art & Photography Exhibition' back on board under new leadership and following a number of years' absence.

A long-time fixture in the cultural calendar, the event was formerly run by the Rotary Club of Charlton. Last year's show, which was to be one of the Club's final engagements prior to its disbandment, suffered a late cancellation as floods inundated communities across the region.

With Rotary's demise, a call for community interest to take on the event saw Charlton Arts assume the mantle, and 2023 has seen the inaugural outing continue the well-established traditions which have ensured the event's long and respected history.

Event co-ordinator, Julie Jenkins said that while this year had been a learning experience, her previous involvement in smaller scale activities had been valuable, and that the support of Charlton Arts members had made all the difference.

"If we want something done, people just say we're here to help", Julie said. "It's about getting it done and everyone is prepared to lend a hand."

A veritable trove of creativity was on display as the gala opening night unfolded last Friday, and as anticipation built prior to the announcement of winners, the crowd migrated between the rows of displays appraising and analyzing the varied works. As in the past there was a broad mix of art mediums, encompassing the traditional – watercolour, oils, acrylic, pastels - along with mixed media, prints, pencil, gouache and inks. Topics were diverse ranging from landscapes to still lifes, Australian flora and fauna, portraits, abstracts and interpretive works. Contributing artists came from a wide geographic area, including Swan Hill, Ballarat, Kerang, Bendigo, and Nhill as well as locals from the surrounding region.

Part of the more than 230 works was the extensive photographic section, which included both large-scale and small images, and featured predominantly colour shots, with just a smattering of monochrome prints.

Welcoming the opening night crowd, MC Bill Freeman gave a brief introduction to the Art Show, its history and acknowledgement of the Rotary Club's outstanding 28 years' commitment to the running of the event. For anyone knowing Bill, the introduction was peppered with his unique brand of humor as he explained that over the duration of the next couple of days Charltonians become "instant experts on art related topics, as well as becoming instant connoisseurs and members of the arty-farty set!"

Buloke Mayor, Cr. Alan Getley, then spoke, thanking Charlton Arts for the opportunity to attend the opening, and commending them for their desire to take on the event. He also acknowledged the support of the former Rotarians whose experience would be of assistance in the transition to the new leadership, before congratulating Charlton Arts and inviting the crowd to enjoy the evening.

Given the honour of officially opening the 2023 exhibition, Lloyd Paterson, (as the last President of Rotary and its longest serving member), gave a brief overview of the service club's extensive and farreaching contributions to the community throughout the organization's 65 year history.

From its beginnings in 1957, Rotary's outreach has included amongst many others, the establishment of both public spaces (Rotary Park), community infrastructure (erection of the Charlton Senior Citizens building), helping save the Charlton Show, educational support (Tybally Scholarship / Student exchange program) and the overseeing of more than \$500,000 of distributions following the 2011 flooding disaster.

With the rescinding of their charter, Rotary has now established a lasting footprint of their service with the recent erection of the train mural at the Travellers' Rest precinct. The work, by artist Noel Kilner, is a re-imagining the rail styles from the late 1950's which coincided with the Club's inauguration.

And in further gesture, Rotary provided a \$4,000 boost to Charlton Arts to assist with

Both practitioners drew many interested spectators on opening night, eager to hear more about the respective techniques involved in both disciplines.

With iconic Charlton identity, Dr. Brian Walklate, supported by foundation Chairman, Peter Whykes, formally cutting the ribbon and declaring the birth of a new bank, that day on 17th October 2003 marked a communal declaration to ensure local banking continuity with the added benefit of surpluses being reinvested back into the community.
