# LANDMARK DESTROYED AS FIRE **CONSUMES CHARLTON POST OFFICE**

**Contributed by Jenny Pollard** The landmark Post Office in Charlton's main street was severely damaged when a late morning fire spread through the building on Sunday 19th November.

The fire, which was thought to have been started by a washing machine explosion in the residence, spread to the front of the building, consuming the roof and creating damage to the postal service area. While the Post Office's brickwork façade and walls initially remained upright, the internal damage to the front section of the building was clearly visible from the street. The front portion of the building was later bulldozed to enable firefighting efforts to continue more effectively with the blacking out process. Owner, Russell King, was not in the

residence at the time of the fire.

Shocked residents lined the main street as numerous fire-fighting appliances attended the scene. The mood was sombre and disbelieving, with many saying it was a sad day for the town. With the highway closed to south-bound traffic at Armstrong Street, diversions were set up to allow for the continued flow of vehicles - a job made more challenging with many grain trucks on the road with harvest underway.

As the afternoon progressed a ladder platform and heavy pumper from Bendigo were commandeered and continued to provide fire suppression with the mechanized extension ladder and hose raised high above the building.

Fortunately, no one sustained any injuries, and the King family pets were

rescued, with their cat re-emerging from the debris a couple of days later.

Since the fire, the Postal Service has been relocated to the Charlton Hall in Armstong Street before it moves to an interim location in the Mensland store at the western end of High Street.

Community support for the King family was swift and ongoing and despite the trauma, Russell was working on getting some of the services operational the very next day.

The Post Office location in the High Street was on the site of the original Charlton postal service which opened in 1879. Over the years the building had undergone a variety of renovations and changes with a significant upgrade in 1961. More photos on page 5.

# Golden Grains Museum News

Welcome to the final 2023 update from your

local Charlton Golden Grains Museum. It is hard to believe the end of the year is almost upon us, and what a year it has been. The tragic continuing war in Ukraine and the situation in the Middle East should make us all aware just how lucky we are to live in our special corner of the world, despite the recent sad loss of our historic Post Office. All our thoughts are with Russell and his family and friends at this time.

From our museum's point of view we can be very proud of the huge amount of work that continues to be done by our wonderful volunteers who freely give up their time: from helping archive items, selling raffle tickets, conducting research, opening the rooms for visitors, and attending meetings, the museum simply couldn't operate without them. If you have an interest in history, would like to help preserve items for Charlton's future generations, and enjoy spending time with friendly like-minded people, contact the museum; you will be made most welcome. You can also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items for future generations.

#### Highlights

Among many highlights was the celebration of our 50th Anniversary and the official opening of the former Wesley Chapel in Halliday Street for our 'Keeping the Faith' display. We are so grateful to the community organisations that donated funds to the restoration of this magnificent historical Charlton building, which included the Charlton Uniting Church, Charlton Op-Shop and Charlton Rotary Club. This is a permanent display and Stage 2 of the project

will explore Charlton's Medical history. We were thrilled to dedicate our main display room to the memory of Grace Cadzow; a tireless worker and driving force in the establishment of our museum. All of her children were present which made the occasion even more special.

We were also proud to support, in collaboration with the Charlton RSL Sub-Branch, the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the Cenotaph. A fitting service for the occasion was accompanied by the Charlton-Wycheproof Band playing music from the war years and a lovely morning tea. Visitors were able to also enjoy a wander around the museum at their leisure and collect a souvenir program compiled by Carolyn Olive.

Fundraising is essential to the museum to purchase archiving supplies, pay regular monthly expenses, and for larger projects. We receive our funds through membership fees, admission charges, research requests, grants and donations. We are also very grateful to Charlton residents who support our regular trips to Donald Bingo where we receive monies for our group's attendance. Thank you to the drivers of the vehicles; we hope you have all had a little luck with the calls, but most of all have enjoyed a great social night out. Our last Bingo trip for the year is on Thursday 21st December which is a special Bingo Christmas break-up.

#### The Old Vic

Our feature story this month looks at a building that served the Charlton community for almost 80 years from the early 1880s until 1963. Named affectionately as 'The Old Vic' by locals, Victoria Hall was built privately by E. H. Miles and officially opened on Her Majesty Queen Victoria's birthday in 1884, remaining the main public building until 1956. On opening night over 350 locals enjoyed an evening of music provided by the Charlton Band with reviews stating, 'It was a spacious, well lighted hall, with all the accessories to give the right tone to either musical or dramatic entertainment'.

Located in Armstrong Street, it was the for celebrations focal point and commemorations which included amongst other things, the announcements of the Boer, First and Second World Wars, as well as send-offs and welcome homes for service men and women. In 1911 the Council purchased the Hall to accommodate the shire offices and council chambers. The premises were also rented out to obtain much needed revenue to groups as varied as the Charlton Higher Elementary School, The Victorian Rangers (a volunteer military body), the Empire Patriotic Fund, Australian Natives Association, the Table Tennis Club and many more. The hall was also used as a movie theatre for many years but by 1937 the venue was in need of repairs. The shire proposed a loan of 14 thousand pounds but ratepayers strongly objected to the spending. The issue of a new shire hall was raised again in 1945, but it wasn't until 1963 that it was a reality.

On behalf of everybody here at the Charlton Golden Grains Museum, have a very Merry Christmas and a happy and safe 2024. We look forward to welcoming you some time soon.

# Charlton Remembers

The annual Remembrance Day observation in Charlton was shared by RSL members and community attendees, on Saturday 11 November, as the 105<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Armistice formalizing the end of the First World War was commemorated.

While our contemporary ceremonies now acknowledge the service and sacrifices made by all those engaged in conflicts across the modern era, the Charlton RSL Sub-Branch presentation held a significant inclusion this year with the recognition of two local servicemen – Private Maurice James Claxton (died 20 July 1916) and Private Bernard Francis Carlson (died 31 August 1942). Descendants of both men attended this year's ceremony and also laid wreaths in memory of their ancestors.

Against the backdrop of the Lone Pine tree on the Clubroom forecourt, the crowd was welcomed by RSL President, Alan McGillivray who extended an invitation to all members, guests and community representatives to lay wreaths for the fallen.

On behalf of the RSL, Alan McGillivray and member John Stiley paid their respects, as did Member for Mildura, Jade Benham MP, who laid a floral tribute.

The recitation of John McRae's poignant poem "In Flanders Fields" by Sub-Branch Secretary, Bill Freeman followed, before the playing of the Last Post, and the call for a minute's silence at 11am. The rousing sounds of the Reveille broke the period of reflection before the ceremony then moved on to the acknowledgements and backgrounds of Private Maurice Claxton and Private Bernard Carlson.

(The following extracts were taken from the Centenary of the Charlton Cenotaph booklet - reproduced with the permission of the author, Carolyn Olive):

#### **Private Maurice James Claxton:**

"Private Claxton was the son of John and Sophia Claxton, farmers at Coonooer Bridge. After the outbreak of war, he and his brother, Theodore, enlisted on 21<sup>st</sup> July 1915. At the time he was working as a farm teamster in Western Australia.

On 20<sup>th</sup> July, 1916 during the Battle of Fromelles, Private Claxton was reported missing and subsequently pronounced as killed in action by a Court of Enquiry held in the field in August 1917.

His brother, Theodore, took part in the same battle and was wounded and taken as a Prisoner of War.

The Battle of Fromelles remains one of the war's most tragic events for Australian soldiers with almost 2,000 killed in action or dying of wounds and 400 captured - all in a period of 24 hours.

In April 2023, it was announced that Private Claxton's remains had been identified from 245 soldiers recovered from an unmarked grave. He has been reburied in Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery."

#### **Private Bernard Francis Carlson:**

"Private Carlson was the son of William

Margaret and Carlson. Known as 'Slim' he was one of six sons to in serve the Second World War. He sailed from Sydney in October 1940 and saw service in Egypt, Libya and Syria. He returned to Australia in March 1942 on leave and was able to visit his family in Charlton.

In August his battalion set sail for Port Moresby in Papua and by the 16<sup>th</sup> August was advancing along the Kokoda Trail to confront the rapidly advancing Japanese. The battalion's first clash took place at Isurava on 26<sup>th</sup> August 1942. After holding for three days they had to retreat facing much bitter, desperate fighting. It was during the retreat that Private Carlson was killed in action."

The formalities concluded with the public being invited to place a poppy on the small, white crosses encircling the base of the Lone Pine, before all gathered for refreshments and social time in the adjacent clubroom.

Speaking after the ceremony RSL Secretary, Bill Freemansaid that while the Sub-Branch operated as a small and traditional organization, it greatly appreciated the support given by the community on these commemorative occasions.

Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> November saw the end of an era as the doors closed on Charlton's muchadmired retail outlet, *House to Home*.

The High Street business, which has been run by Marea and Greg Judd for just shy of 13 years, bid a sad farewell to customers when the doors were shut for the final time late on Sunday afternoon.

The premises has been a haberdashery / home wares outlet for many, many years - as *R.J.Tippets* (under Bill Sheeran), then *House To Home* (under Matt and Jacinta Holmes-Brown) and finally with the Judds as proprietors.

While it was an emotional time for Marea and Greg, both said it was "time" to make the call, and that they were looking forward to what they call the "next chapter of our lives".

"We want to spend more time with family, do some travelling and re-engage with the farm and many of our passions," said Marea as the remaining items of merchandise were condensed into a small area in the cavernous floor space.

House to Home has been a beacon for quality product over the years, presenting a range of items which have frequently been unique to this outlet. From customized local product through to clothing, footwear, personal items and an extensive range of homewares and home décor, the business has been a drawcard for Charlton, enticing travellers from well outside this area and capturing the attention of visitors passing through.

Friendly service and a welcoming environment has been as much a part of the experience as browsing the exquisitely decorated shelves. Presenting a complete package of quality merchandise combined with premium service was acknowledged at the 2014 Buloke Shire Business Excellence Awards when the business won the Best Retail category. While recognition such as this was welcomed, Marea said it has been the opportunity to welcome people to the area, build new connections and establish friendships – from both far and wide which has been rewarding.

And supporting the wider community has also been an integral part of *House to Home's* outreach with generous donations and contributions to numerous clubs and organisations over the years.

Despite experiencing some difficult and trying times – floods, two robberies and COVID lockdowns – Marea said that with the help, support and encouragement from locals and friends they had managed to keep the outlet operating.

"We have loved our time in this business," Marea said, "and with commitment, passion, hard work and drive we have made this enterprise into what has affectionately been known as "Marea's Mini Myer Store".

Now with new horizons looming, Greg and Marea want to sincerely thank all those who have supported, helped, and contributed to the wonderful success of *House to Home*.

Fifty years of operation was celebrated by Charlton's Golden Grains Museum on Sunday 19 November on a day which was dedicated to both reflection and the evolution of the local historical powerhouse. Unfortunately, the event was somewhat overshadowed by the fire and destruction of the town's landmark post office just further down the main street.

The acknowledgement of half a century of amassing, curating and maintaining Charlton's local historical content was showcased and applauded as the unveiling of the Museum's latest addition and display was dedicated and formally opened to the public, and a special recognition for former foundation member, and driving force behind the Museum, Grace Cadzow, was conferred.

Opening with a welcome to the large crowd and a brief introduction, Museum President, Diane Wood, related the origins of preserving Charlton's local history - a matter which had been of concern for the Charlton Chamber of Commerce in the early 1970s.

#### BACKGROUND

Following a public meeting called in October 1973, and attended by "17 enthusiastic citizens" - one of whom was Heather Hargreaves who was at last Sunday's gathering - the Charlton Golden Grains Museum Committee was formed and tasked with establishing a museum to preserve and showcase the town's history. The group received free tenancy at the Mechanics Institute building which had recently been vacated by the Soil Conservation Authority. Aligning with the wheat growing area, the name of "Golden Grains Museum" was suggested and, following an appeal for multiple items of historical interest, the committee held their first successful display in December of that year.

Momentum continued in the following years with the donation of local newspapers dating back to 1878 by Charlton Tribune proprietor, Ian Cameron, along with the acquisition of copies of the North Central News.

Further rooms in the building became available for use in 1977 and 1995, significantly increasing the display capabilities.

Like most of the Charlton community, the 2011 flood wrought significant damage to the Museum, impacting both the building and collection with almost half a metre of water washing through the premises. Following restoration and repairs, operation resumed in March of 2013, and since then the Museum has become a point of inspiration for similar small operatives. Recognition has continued through the receival of a significant industry award for excellence, along with acquiring Australian Museum and Galleries Association Accreditation.

#### MEMBERS RECOGNITION

Recognition of members' contributions was also highlighted by Diane, with special acknowledgement for Joan Mundy for 30 years of service, and Sue Walsh for 25 years service (14 of which as President). Current Secretary, Carolyn Olive, was also recognized for her outstanding contributions as curator and writer having published 6 books on various aspects of local history, including Charlton's 150 years.

#### HONOURING GRACE CADZOW

Honoring the huge contributions of former member, and backbone of the Museum, Grace Cadzow, current Secretary Carolyn Olive related the following.

A foundation member of the Golden Grains Museum, Grace Cadzow was passionate in her dedication, her drive and ability to share her extensive local knowledge to both nurture the Museum and build its outreach to a wide audience for over 40 years.

"Today we would like to acknowledge a very special person, who sadly is no longer with us, but has left behind a valuable legacy," said Carolyn. Reflecting on her personal connections with Grace, she said she was a 'terrific teacher' and her knowledge of local history seemed endless. "I wish we could have digitized her brain," said Carolyn. "What an amazing resource that would be!"

The dedication of the main display room as the "Grace Cadzow Room" was a fitting tribute on this half-century anniversary and as Carolyn continued, "While Grace was given a Life Membership many years ago, we didn't want her legacy to be forgotten." Researching, compiling publications,

archiving, freely assisting volunteers, embracing new technologies and industry advancements, Grace also encouraged the next generation of historians to step forward, thereby ensuring the future preservation of Charlton's history and creating a centre for ongoing research.

The dedication plaque to Grace reads:

"This room is dedicated to Grace Cadzow, a foundation member of the Charlton Golden Grains Museumand a passionate volunteer, archivist and historian for over 40 years. Grace created a valuable legacy that will never be forgotten."

With Grace's four children in attendance, son, Mark spoke on behalf of the family, reiterating his mother's passion for history and research - often to the detriment of the family, he quipped – before saying how much they appreciated this gesture of recognition.

#### KEEPING THE FAITH EXHIBITION

An additional celebration for the day included the official opening and dedication

of the Wesleyan Chapel in Halliday Street which now houses the display "Keeping the Faith" presenting memorabilia from all of Charlton's churches from the town's inception through to contemporary times.

A long-time project, the 1876 Chapel which is now one of Charlton's oldest remaining buildings - was used as a storage space for the Museum over the past 15 years. Considered to be an ideal display area, the process of bringing this to fruition was encumbered by a variety of factors, before the donation of a number of organs, a successful grant for showcases and the looming 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary triggered what was a "slow jog, into a sprint to the finish."

Thanks to significant donations, generous support from the Charlton Uniting Church, local clubs, organisations, local trades people and many supporters, the renovated structure currently showcases the extensive Church exhibition which includes extensive memorabilia and interpretive panels. While covering all the denominations reaching back to the establishment of Charlton in 1863, Carolyn Olive also included and acknowledged the heritage of the Dja Dja Wurrung First Peoples – honouring their deeply held beliefs and respecting their enduring connection to the land of this area.

#### MEMORIES

Longtime resident and Uniting Church member, Graham Curnow, then spoke about his recollections of the Chapel saying, "This building has so many memories for me" as he related the fun times from Sunday school to Youth group gatherings, games nights,

The tour commenced with a video presentation on the inspiration and development of the complex. The vision of Lama Zopa Rinpoche, the Great Stupa, is 50 metres square and almost 50 metres tall, making it the largest stupa in the Western World. The stupa is approached via a road that takes you past tranquil gardens on either side, allowing members to enjoy a peaceful walk or use the on-site transport. Within the Great Stupa, guides explained the plans and ongoing work, detailing the arrangement of alcoves, interior decorations with statues, and ceiling panels. The ambitious project is anticipated to span 100 years.

#### Hand Weaving Presentation:

David Beaty, guest speaker, shared a presentation on his early career at Macquarie Worsted Ltd in Albury and its early history, from its inception as Amalgamated Textiles in 1926 to becoming Macquarie Textiles in 1956. Starting as an apprentice in 1980 and working for 15 years, David explained the Repco Spinning department and the development of selftwist spinning by the CSIRO. Upon returning to Australia, he pursued his interest in handweaving, crafting his equipment from recycled timber. Presenting images of the 8-shaft, counter-marche, floor loom, David recounted his inspiration drawn from Hamburg Weaver Andreas Moller. Armed with hand-tools, he successfully constructed the loom, warping mill, and other equipment. David intends to

create his set of combs for producing worsted yarns in the future.

# Ambulance Open Day

The community was invited to attend an Open Day and learn more about their ambulance service when the Charlton and District Ambulance Auxiliary in association with Ambulance Victoria (AV) opened the doors at the Learmonth Street station on 26 November.

Providing attendees with the chance to take a look inside the station, which was built following the 2011 flood, the session consisted of information sharing, along with demonstrations of life-saving equipment, techniques and interactions with AV personnel.

A sizable crowd of Charlton locals took the opportunity to also view the new Corpuls machine – a thorax compression CPR device which provides automated chest compressions to cardiac arrest patients. The consistent and continuous application not only frees up paramedics to undertake other treatment which the patient may require, it also overcomes the fatigue factor which manual compression entails, ensuring the potential for a more successful outcome. The machine, which can be used in either a stationary situation or in transit, has variable settings and attachments suitable for accommodating a range of patient requirements.

The acquisition of the Corpuls machine was a community supported initiative, evolving from a Charlton Lions Club drive to raise funds for the Ambulance Auxiliary for the purchase. Contributing organisations included the Friends of East Wimmera Health Service (Charlton Campus) and the Charlton Neighbourhood House - Op Shop group – both of whom contributed \$5,000 each. The Lions Club of Charlton then applied to the Australian Lions Foundation who matched the community amount with an additional \$10,000. Representatives from all agencies were at the gathering and spoke of their unhesitating support for the purchase of the machine. Lions Club President, Ross Lane also acknowledged the input of member Peter Watts, whose commitment to the project was a driving factor.

Australian Lions Foundation spokesperson, Bruce Hudgson said that any monetary costs were outweighed by the outcomes the machine can deliver - "even if it saves just one life," he said.

Welcoming the crowd, Jamie Jones, Team Manager of the Charlton Branch, thanked all for their support for the Ambulance service and encouraged everyone to chat with paramedics, local ACOs, and visiting AV personnel, including Senior Team Manager for Buloke / Gannawarra, Libby Fox.

Complimentary activities included manual CRP and Zoll AED (Automated External Defibrillator) demonstrations run by Community Engagement Coordinator, Ben Miller, along with snake bite management presented by Andrew Jochs (Paramedic Community Support Coordinator – Buloke / Gannawarra). ACO, Tameeka Kelly also ran blood pressure and oxygen level checks, and ACO Nathan Rogers had AV literature to share with attendees.

Service Award presentations were made to local Ambulance Community OfficersDavid Pollard (30 year) and Ian Walsh (15 year).

The Lions Club of Charlton provided a BBQ luncheon during which time people could mingle and gain deeper insights into the services provided by Ambulance Victoria and the support which local Ambulance Auxiliaries can generate towards creating improved health outcomes for their communities.

# A Taiwanese Experience

Kim and Joo and their son Ping, travelled to Hualien, Taiwan in July to take part in a Tzu Chi retreat and to be present for Ping's certification as a Tzu Chi commissioner. Kim described Taiwan as their spiritual home.

Kim and Joo are members of Charlton Action for World Development (AWD) and Kim spoke at the August AWD meeting.

She said that while Taiwan is half the size of Tasmania the population of Taiwan is forty-two times the population of Tasmania.

Tzu Chi is a nonprofit organisation that was founded in 1966 by Master Chen Yeng. The aim was to help the poor and educate the rich.

It prompts character building and the values of charity and love, as well as practical ideals in areas of medicine, education, environment and community volunteering.

Kim and Joo have been volunteering since 2002 when they were living in Malaysia and they continued this work when they moved to Australia.


Ping was introduced to volunteering from an early age and was keen to continue at university and when he started work in Melbourne.

Kim said the recent retreat was a wonderful experience. There were 558 people from 19 countries and 600 local Taiwanese volunteers to help them – so almost one-to-one!

Master Cheng, the founder and leader of Tzu Chi, encourages them to take care of their health so they can reach out to the needy.

She says, in observing suffering you come to appreciate your blessings.

Kim had seen the young volunteers in 2019 in Taiwan when she'd been involved as a supporter and mentor, and she said she was pleased to be there to witness their commissioning. It was an inspiring and informative talk.
