Wooroonook

Our feature story this month takes a look at the area around Lake Wooroonook. While popular today with campers, fishermen and women and recreational boating, many people may not know much about its early history. Originally named Watson's Lake after the squatting family, the first Selectors to take up tracks of land in the area were John Robertson, an exminer and his family. He was joined shortly afterwards by members of the Charleson family. By 1879, Sacred Heart Church was built, with a new church replacing that in 1913 to accommodate the many Catholic families. In 1895 the area joined with others to form The Shire of Charlton. In 1924 a Parliamentary Standing Committee visited the district and was presented a petition to extend a branch rail track from Wooroonook to Corack. It was argued (sadly unsuccessfully) the west side of Charlton was poorly serviced and farmers were disadvantaged in transporting their crops. It was anticipated a boom in tourism would follow a branch extension with easier access to the Lake.

The 1920s and 30s saw a huge growth in popularity for the lake with picnics, tennis, swimming and games regularly happening. This continued through to the 1950's, and in 1960 The Charlton and District Power Boat and Ski Club was formed. Duck shooting remained popular across these times. A Foreshore Committee was formed in 1977 with an amenities block being built in 1990 and recently replaced. In 2010 the Lake was guaranteed to never be dry with the arrival of the Wimmera Mallee Pipeline, and its regular allocation of water.

Cricket and football were popular pastimes with Wooroonook fielding competitive teams over the years and in 1952 the school bus run commenced servicing the area's large numbers of families. Sadly the Post Office in the delicenced Hotel burnt down in 1958, while fire destroyed the historic Catholic Church (which had been a private residence since 1974) in 2006.

Charlton Event of the Year:

Charlton Campdraft Club for the inaugural Campdraft 4th & 5th November 2023

A young and innovative group, the Charlton Campdraft Club successfully ran its inaugural Campdraft on 4th and 5th November 2023 after floods the previous year prevented the event from taking place. From securing a site to sourcing infrastructure, along with raising a considerable amount of sponsorship, the event attracted 160 competitors from NSW, VIC and SA, with approximately 150 spectators in attendance over the weekend. The event also raised funds for Breast Cancer Awareness and Fighting A-T with Grace.

The Club was commended for its initiative, vision, hard work and perseverance in achieving its' goals, and creating the potential to bring people together and attracting visitors to the town.

KEY TO COMMUNITY AWARDS:

A new award recognizing the ongoing contributions by former "Charlton Citizens of the Year" - the inaugural recipients were Joy Freeman (Citizen 1983) and Garry Larmour (Citizen 2005).

Joy Freeman was awarded 'Citizen of the Year' 40 years ago in 1983 for her volunteer work in the community offering assistance to those in need. Since then, Joy has continued her tireless endeavours within our town as a District Nurse for many years, as a marriage celebrant and conductor of funeral services, and as an invaluable member of numerous community groups.

In particular, Joy's involvement with the Red Cross has seen her provide support both here in Charlton and throughout Victoria and to Airley Beach, Bundaberg and Lismore during times of flood and fire and other confronting situations such as the Bourke Street Mall incident in 2017.

Joy is an active member of Charlton Arts and the Charlton Croquet Club. She is a volunteer driver for the Community Car, is a Friend of the EWHS Charlton Campus, and dedicated member of the Charlton Uniting Church where she is an elder and lay preacher.

Jov also provides immeasurable support in our community to those in need, conducting welfare checks, providing pastoral care, small gifts, food parcels and companionship. It's the hundreds of small things she does for us that makes her so special to us, from offering kind words when needed, to popping into the library each week with a coffee for the librarian. Never one to sit still for long, Joy is often the first one to grab a tea towel and start cleaning up and she is also the first to send a congratulations card to community members for everything from being Dux of the School, reaching a special milestone or having a baby. Everyone who knows Joy, is aware of how much she does in our small community.

Garry Larmour was awarded 'Citizen of the Year' in 2005 for his involvement with various community groups. Since then, Garry has continued his association with most of them holding positions on the executive and actively participating in numerous projects and events. He has been on the executive of the Charlton Forum since its inception in 1996, being either Secretary or Treasurer for much of that time. He has been Secretary of the Travellers Rest Committee for 30 years, Secretary of the Shire Hall Committee for 30 years, and a dedicated member of the

Charlton Lions Club for about 37 years. He is Secretary of the Charlton & District Ambulance Service Auxiliary and is a Justice of the Peace. Garry was treasurer, until recently, of Charlton Arts and actively contributed to the Annual Film Festival and other events for over 30 years. He was the driving force in the establishment of the Charlton Community Car and is a volunteer driver. Garry also sits on many subcommittees such as the community newsletter and community radio and volunteers his time to help many clubs with their annual auditing.



His continuing commitment to Charlton's prosperity is inspirational.

Both Joy and Garry gave heart-felt responses - saying that they did not seek recognition or reward for their actions. Both also emphasized the enjoyment they receive from their wide-reaching community involvement.

Tennis Tournament

The 2024 edition of the Charlton Lawn Tennis Club's Annual Australia Day Tournament was the biggest in recent memory with over 210 players enjoying the hospitality, fun and magnificent 16 grass courts Victoria's oldest regional club has to offer. The Charlton Club certainly put on a show for their guests and locals alike, helped by funding through the National Australia Day Council. Australia Day Friday saw live music and fireworks complement some fabulous mixed doubles tennis played under lights on the Charlton Park complex. Fantastic to see a swathe of locals join in the festivities, enjoying dinner served from food trucks and by local community groups to cater for the 500 strong crowd in attendance. The paella served from first time visitor Little Sangria—a massive hit, highly distractive for the players on court as the distinctive aroma drifted onto court as the staff demonstrated the art of paella preparation and cooking. A huge effort by the Charlton Lions Club members, backing up from feeding the crowd at Charlton's Australia Day breakfast ceremony to again 'man' the BBQ to ensure the large tennis crowd did not go hungry.

The Charlton & District Community Bank Tournament has continued to strengthen in recent years, this year's 213 players a remarkable 55 player increase on 2023, which at the time was seen as strong numbers. Players in attendance coming from as far afield as Merimbula, Adelaide, Colac, Sale, Euroa/Avenel, Shepparton,

Geelong and wider Melbourne as well as a good sprinkling of local talent, including from Horsham, Bendigo and within the North Central Region. The weather gods showing mercy on the players for the weekend's event, a day of rain preceding the tournament, with perfect tennis weather for the following three days.

Kicking off the weekend in style, and now almost the centre piece of the weekend's event, the mixed doubles day saw over 150 matches played on the day across five very competitive grades of tennis. Thirteen pairs graced the court in the Charlton & District Community Bank Open event, split into two sections, a battle of the fittest ensued over six and five matches in the two sections. With the crowd building following the dinner break, first time entrants Nyall and Laura Langmead outpointed Alex Bakogianis and Ash Andrews in an enthralling encounter, wrapping up the match 11-9 just in time to catch their breath and watch the amazing fireworks show put on for the large crowd – those in attendance in awe of the dynamic pyrotechnic performance. Other winners were – East Charlton Hotel A Grade: John & Rose Nihill defeating Ben Bath & Gen Gordon; Bakery Lane Apartments B Grade saw Sale's Mick & Jenny Luke defeat mother and son, Charlton's Rae & Roger Heenan; Atkins Family C Grade: Daniel & Heidi Addlem enjoying their first foray to Charlton defeating Dean Fergie & Ali Snow; and Charlton Caravan Park D Grade: David Patrick & Penny Coulson outlasting Keith Chittleborough & Elise Turner.

Highlighting the strengthening of number, the BQS Group Men's Open Singles saw 26 men enter the main draw – a number that hasn't been reached anytime since the 1990's, thankfully still in an elimination style format, players battled across the day through the round of 32 through to the final – fought between two of Shepparton's best, Nick Gattuso and up and coming Zach Ranson. The crowd that stayed and watched were treated to a high calibre exhibition, the raw hitting power of Ranson going toe to toe with the control and touch of 2022 title holder Gattuso. In the end it was a single break to Gattuso that decided the match, Nick holding onto the advantage to win the tussle and trophy 11-9. The ladies unfortunately could not match the numbers, Open and A Grades combining to play a round robin event between the five entrants. Charlton's own import English Jo Southcombe demonstrating her rapidly improving competence on the Charlton grass courts to win the 2024 Charlton Authorised Newsagency title, winning on a countback from long time supporter of the event Rhian Shepherd from Melbourne. players featured heavily in the winners' circle, ex local and club singles Champion Sarah Crutch winning the Fergie Family Ladies B Grade Singles, defeating doubles partner Luci Tanashevic to do so; Tessa Fitzpatrick winning the North West Ag Services D Grade Ladies defeating Layla grand-daughter of Brian, Fitzpatrick,

Presentation by BAREC (Bendigo Amateur Radio and Electronics Club)

Don VK3PDB and Vic VK3TTY provided a wonderful presentation at the January Probus meeting. Don serves as the Secretary of the Bendigo Amateur Radio and Electronics Club (BAREC) Inc.

Club Overview

BAREC, based in East Bendigo Community Hall, has experienced significant growth in membership, indicative of the thriving interest in amateur radio. Their responsibilities extend beyond radio activities to include managing the community hall, showcasing their integral role in the local community.

Don and Vic's presentation encompassed BAREC's mission and history of Amateur Radio.

BAREC is committed to fostering technological literacy, upholding amateur radio traditions, and providing training and support for all.

They also talked about the contribution that Amateur Radio Operators have provided in times of emergency and went on to list a number of events where disaster communication was provided by HAM radio operators:

A tropical cyclone in Cairns in February 1927 cut all communications and Andy Cooper VK4BW in north Queensland and Leighton Gibson VK4BN in Brisbane handled press traffic, then were allowed to send, and receive private messages for five days during the disaster.

Amateur Radio notably handled emergency communication during the 1939 Black Friday bushfires, Cyclone Tracey, in 1974, the Ash Wednesday bushfires in 1983, the Newcastle earthquake in 1989, which saw the death of 13 persons and over 15,000 people homeless, the Black Saturday disaster in February 2009, and in more recent times the Lismore floods, and Rochester Floods among others.

Don went on to detail BAREC's Operation Radar where BAREC members,

through meticulous training and preparation, demonstrated their readiness for emergency communication scenarios.

With an estimated two million amateur radio enthusiasts worldwide, the hobby boasts a diverse and widespread community. In Australia, approximately 14,000 licensed amateur radio operators contribute to this global network, showcasing the enduring popularity and relevance of amateur radio in the modern age.
