CHARLTON ANZAC DAY

Under grey skies the formalities began at the cenotaph, commemorating the fallen with wreaths laid by RSL members, school captains from Charlton College and St Joseph's Primary School, Red Cross personnel, and Charlton Fire Brigade representatives. Bugler, Corey Harrison, played the Last Post before the call to order brought participants together for the march to the Hall. As traffic on the highway was brought to a standstill the march progressed down High Street to the accompaniment of the Charlton/Wycheproof Community Band and the applause of the crowd.

MC Troy Heenan welcomed a packed Hall to the 2025 commemoration service, briefly touching on the significance of both the historical and contemporary contributions by defence force personnel and the values which the ANZAC spirit continues to embody.

Official guests were introduced, including: Charlton RSL President, Allan McGillivray and Secretary Bill Freeman, Padre Reverend Judi Bird, Buloke Shire Councillor, Bruce Stafford, and guest speaker, Squadron Leader Michael Lowe, along with his wife, Tara. Recognition was also accorded to OAM attendees Bruce Hudgson and Brian and Rae Heenan.

A new component of this year's service saw students from Charlton College and St. Joseph's come forward to place a poppy on rows of miniature white crosses placed in front of the stage. This gesture of respect and remembrance continues the connection between the generations as the ANZAC legacy is perpetuated.

Buloke Shire Councillor, Bruce Stafford then presented a reflective address in which he acknowledged the service of two family members at Gallipoli, the loss of another family member during a World War II RAAF training exercise and of his wife's grandfather who perished at Borneo's notorious Sandakan Prisoner of War Camp. Reflections on their duty, the sacrifices and the hardships for those both at home and abroad, along with acknowledgement of the support organisations such as Legacy and Red Cross, rounded out his presentation.

The Reverend Judi Bird (RSL Padre) then led the proceedings with the recitation of the Lord's Prayer, an introduction to the Choir singing "Abide with Me" and the reading of the 23rd Psalm by Charlton College School Captains, Emmersyn Nelson and Fletcher Holmes-Brown.

GUEST SPEAKER BACKGROUND AND ADDRESS

The guest speaker, Squadron Leader Michael Lowe was then introduced by RSL Secretary, Bill Freeman.

A resident of St. Arnaud since 2010, with a busy legal practice, Michael's distinguished Australian Defence Force

career began with the Air Force from 2001 where he was commissioned as a legal officer. Following numerous Australian postings, he was deployed to the Middle East in support of Operation Catalyst in 2006, and after discharge from the permanent Air Force in 2007 he was reengaged on contract to deploy to Kandahar Airfield (Afghanistan) in 2008/09 in support of Operation Slipper. Michael and his wife, Tara met whilst she was a serving Air Force member: she commissioned as an officer and served until 2010.

Joining the Air Force as part of a scholarship program while studying law at university, Michael said the decision was an easy one as, "being paid to study, travel and meet new people" held great appeal. Outlining why the choice was the Air Force and not other sections of the services, the reasoning was that while the Army sleeps under the stars, the navy navigates by the stars, the Air Force chose their accommodation by the number of stars, "and that was all the convincing I needed", he said!

As a legal adviser to commanders, many opportunities arose including deployment to the Middle East in 2006 for the rehabilitation and stablisation of Iraq, and Afghanistan in 2008 – 2009 as part of the international campaign in the so-called war on terror. Expanding on his experiences in

Afghanistan, the accommodation attraction so desired earlier was in sharp contrast to the cosy ideal -the reality was rudimentary living conditions, targeted rocket attacks and 24/7 noise from the close-at-hand airstrip.

Sharing two incidents, both of which left an indelible mark, but which exemplified the highest ideals of the ANZAC spirit, Michael related these stories from his Afghanistan deployment.

Reading from the Victoria Cross citation for SASR Corporal Mark Donaldson, whose courage, gallantry and disregard for his own welfare in an ambush situation saved lives in the face of sustained enemy fire, Michael said, "If there's a better story that epitomizes the ANZAC spirit, I've yet to hear it." By repeatedly acting as a decoy, returning fire, and administering medical care to the wounded, Mark's exceptional gallantry saved lives and ensured the safety of other members of the Afghan, US and Australian force.

The second story involved 21-year-old Corporal Mathew Hopkins, who was on an eight-month deployment to Afghanistan. Returning home for a two week break, he married and became a father to his first child. On his return to Afghanistan he was shot dead four weeks later when he and his team were engaged by a group of Taliban. The statement posted by his wife, Victoria read in part: "Mat had the most important job - he was father to our son Alex, my husband and my best friend. He only got to spend four days with our son before he had to go back overseas. I'm so glad he got to meet his son and experience fatherhood."

decision to share these two stories is not to diminish the many other stories that could be told. I share these two stories because they remind me of the reason we stop and pay our respects on this day."

Musical contributions are always an important part of the Charlton service and the inclusion of the Charlton Choir (under the leadership of Gill Gretgrix) and the Charlton / Wycheproof Community Band (under the leadership of Brian Heenan) once

again brought a valuable dimension to the morning's ceremony. With the band supplemented by a number of young participants this year, and the addition of members who travel some distance to be involved, it is a commitment which is much appreciated.

Another new initiative at this year's service were static displays of ADF related objects and oral histories revealing the involvement of those who served and those



Accessibility Improvements

In our efforts to improve accessibility for our visitors and volunteers, we have had our door locks and handles replaced. We now have easy to open handles and locks and one key to fit all. The museum funded this ourselves. Thank you to Bendigo Locksmiths for undertaking the work.

Early Medical Services

With work continuing on our new medical display, our feature this month looks briefly at Charlton's early medical history. Prior to 1874 the town was serviced by visiting doctors and nurses, with local residents often relying on family and friends for first aid, home remedies or help with midwifery. The town obtained its first resident doctor (and district hospital in St Arnaud) in 1874 when Dr Hudson arrived. Dr Dean followed setting up his practice in 1877 near Kirks Coach Factory on the corner of Kaye Street. Also around this time Dr Joseph Ogburn arrived offering his services that included pharmacy, surgical and medical dentistry, and he was also a veterinary surgeon. Early in the 1900s Charlton had its first private hospital offering the services of a midwife, Mrs Hayes. Other private hospitals would follow including Nurse Scott's Private Hospital in Mildura Way.

Our museum has a popular service where you can record you or your family's history for us to scan into our digital reference library, and store a copy of the papers, family images or genealogy charts in an A4 size envelope. This is a wonderful opportunity for stories not to be lost, but preserved for researchers at a later stage. Cost is a very low \$10, which goes towards helping to maintain our collection.

Do you have a few free hours available each month? The Charlton Golden Grains Museum is always looking for new volunteers to help maintain, archive and assist with our collection and attend during opening hours to the public. If you have an interest in history and would like to help preserve Charlton's story contact one of the names listed below; you will be made most

welcome by our friendly team. You could give as much time as you wish and don't need any experience; training will be provided. You could also become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20 that assists in us continuing our work preserving local history.





Closing Day Bowls and Presentations was cancelled on Anzac Day with the forecast of rain, and it did rain at the time we would have started at 12.30pm.



Love one another "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples". **John 13:34-35**

I missed "Clean up Australia Day" last month, so to do my bit, I was out collecting rubbish last weekend and as I wandered along with my two plastic bags, I thought about how similar I probably looked to a lady that my grandmother told me about. My grandmother lived with her mother and sisters in North Queensland. The lady my grandmother told me about was known around the district as Annie Bags. Her real name was Annie Ferdinand and she lived from 1852 to 1910. My grandmother told me, many of the locals looked out for Annie, giving her food and shelter and a kind word. But there were others, who judged Annie by her appearance only, and considered her to be a nuisance and an eyesore. My grandmother told me that this attitude was not following what Our Father in Heaven, God, tells us to do. "To love one another as I have loved you. (The First Commandment). As my grandmother said, "it is not a suggestion, but a commandment, so is to be followed". Instead the unkind people applied a "label" to Annie, and justified their judgement and lack of compassion amongst themselves. They could not look past the label to value and know Annie as God did. As I continued collecting rubbish, I felt close to Annie and loved even more our God who welcomes us all. I also thanked God for my Grandmother and her wise counsel.

Are you from Charlton?

As a bearer of the surname Cossar, I've lost count of the number of times I've been introduced to someone and then been asked "Are you from Charlton?" or "Do you have family in Charlton?". Recently I was introduced to someone in Bendigo with the phrase "Geoff was born in Charlton" which was met with "Cossar. Of course".

As well, I sometimes come across members of the everwidening "Charlton diaspora" – people born in Charlton or who've worked in Charlton and moved on - who recognise my surname and link it with Charlton.

That link now extends back more than 150 years. In 18

74, John Cossar arrived from the Ballarat goldfields and, on 18 August that year, selected 320 acres of land at Yeungroon. With his wife, Mary, they settled on the land with their five small children and over succeeding years, another eight were born to the couple (sadly not all survived to adulthood).

Family records indicate John Cossar was grateful for the opportunities farming at Yeungroon provided for his family. He was an active member of his community and was a Councillor on the first Charlton Shire Council.

John and Mary would no doubt be proud to reflect that their descendants (which now include sixth generation Charlton Cossars) have made civic, cultural and sporting contributions to the Charlton district over the years.

And they'd no doubt be proud, as we all are, that our relatively rare surname is so widely and closely linked to Charlton.
