## *TABLE TENN* AWARD FOR BILL

Charlton's Bill Freeman was recently awarded outstanding recognition with the Joan Guggenheim "Volunteer of the Year" Award at the Table Tennis Victoria AGM held at the Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre on 10<sup>th</sup> May.

Bill, who has been a long-time and passionate supporter and player of the game, was invited to the event knowing he was to receive an award but had no idea what it would be.

Named in honour of the dedicated administrator Joan Guggenheim, Bill's acknowledgement applauded his own dedication to a game which has been an integral part of his life for many decades. His citation reads as follows:

"Bill's life-long commitment to the sport – spanning nearly six decades – is nothing short of extraordinary. Since 1966, he has attended every Victorian Country Championships, serving not only as a competitor but as a tireless administrator and committee member for over 40 years.

As a former chairman of the Country Championships, Bill introduced lasting initiatives including leading player medallions, winners' shields, and the now iconic Bill Freeman Shield (for Country Championships B3 Grade). He also organized countless interstate tours, nurtured the development of country players, and promoted lifelong participation in table tennis – right up to the age of 90.

Bill's humble, consistent and passionate service truly embodies the spirit of this award. We are proud to honour him as the 2024 Guggenheim Volunteer of the Year."



# Dancing for Sick Kids: Our Biggest Year Yet!

If you read my article earlier this year asking for support, I want to start by saying the biggest **thank you** from the bottom of my heart. Thanks to your generosity, encouragement, and kind words, Dance for Sick Kids 2025 was not only a huge success — it was my most successful fundraising week yet!

This was my fifth year dancing, and I'm so proud to share that with the help from the Charlton community, I raised \$3,263 by dancing for over 19 hours across the week. That's a total of 20 nights of accommodation for a sick child and their family. I've now raised \$11,142 across those five years — something I never could have imagined when I first started.

I wasn't doing it alone either. I danced as part of a team of 13 from Dynamic District Dance Studio, where I work as a dance instructor. Together, our amazing team raised an incredible **\$17,880** and danced for a combined **145 hours**! We had so much fun and this year marked our team's **biggest result yet**, bringing our five-year fundraising total to a massive **\$50,806**. Our team raised a phenomenal 111 nights of accommodation this year.

In case you missed it the first time: Dance for Sick Kids is a week-long fundraising event held during National Families Week in support of RMHC. It helps provide accommodation and support to families whose children need medical treatment far from home - including many from rural areas like ours. Earlier this year, I had the privilege of visiting Ronald McDonald House in Hawthorn and saw firsthand how much your donations truly help. I'd like to specifically thank the Bowling Club, Charlton Charlton Badminton Club, Charlton Creative Quilters, Charlton RSL, and the East Charlton Hotel as well as many local families for their support and sponsorship. Thanks, too, to the Charlton Lions Club for their pledged donation later this month. Thank you all for your generosity and community mindedness!

I'm so thankful to every individual and business who sponsored our team this year. Your kindness made this all possible, and your support reminded me how powerful our local rural communities of Charlton, St Arnaud, and Donald (some of the towns our team members came from) can be when we come together.

#### Peace Time Parade

This month's feature arose out of two wonderful old photos donated by the family of Marj John and have recently been archived. After the end of the First World War, a Peace Parade was held in July 1919 to celebrate. The first image is a float featuring HMAS Australia with a group of young girls and boys riding the waves. Noticeable on these floats is the patriotic nature of them with the flags of Australia's First World War allies on display.

#### **Childhood Treasures & Collectibles**

We are looking forward to our special event—Childhood Treasures ĸ Collectibles, to be held on Thursday 10th July at the Charlton Uniting Church Hall. This will be a celebration of childhood toys of the past as well as collectible toys and miniature models. A simple option to help is to become a 'Friend of the Museum' for just \$20. Every dollar goes towards maintaining and improving our town's collection of important historic items for future generations. Speaking of fund raising, our great supporters who travel to Donald each month for Bingo have helped us with our fund raising efforts and also have an enjoyable night out. With mixed fortunes amongst the players, we are very lucky to receive monies whenever we arrange a group to visit. The donations from the Container Deposit Scheme are also adding up. Thank you to everyone who drops their cans and bottles off and donates the proceeds.

Another way you could support the museum is to have your family's story recorded for future generations. We have a service where you can record your history down for us to scan into our digital reference library, and store a **copy** of the papers, family images or genealogy charts in an A4 size envelope. This is a wonderful opportunity for stories not to be lost, but preserved for researchers at a later stage. Cost is just \$10, which goes towards helping to maintain our collection.

## Charlton Cabbaritta CWA Golden Anniversary Celebration

A fifty-year milestone for Charlton CWA Branch Cabbaritta was celebrated on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> May as past and present members were joined by guests for the recognition of half a century of service to the local community.

In an afternoon which highlighted the "sisterhood" and communal outreach of the organization, speakers and service award recipients reinforced the message of enjoyment for which CWA membership is renowned.

Held at the Charlton Bowling Club rooms, the high-tea setting conferred an elegant welcome to more than seventy guests who attended.

Tables, decorated with delicate floral centre-pieces featuring filigree 50<sup>th</sup> numerals, were also decked out with fine bone china and hand-crafted chocolate boxes. The work of Branch members Donna McCallum and Shirleen Stafford, attendees had also received beautifully hand-crafted invitations.

CWA memorabilia, including an extensive display of handwork and archival scrapbooks, complemented the occasion revealing the scope of the organisation's activities and outreach across the years.

In her opening address, Cabbaritta President, Maria Perger acknowledged the contributions of the Charlton Day Branch and Younger Set who forged the traditions of the local CWA. Asking those gathered to stand and say the CWA Collect and sing the national anthem she then welcomed East Wimmera Group President Pam Brightwell, and incoming President, Barabara Douglass, along with Buloke Councillor, Bruce Stafford, who formally opened the celebrations. Representatives from East Wimmera Group Branches included Bealiba, Kara (St. Arnaud), Marnoo, Stuart Mill, Wedderburn and Wirrim (Birchip).

Opening his address Cr. Stafford praised the "strength, resilience and dedication of the women who have kept this Branch thriving for half a century." Citing his own personal connections to the organization, Bruce said his mother Rose's involvement during the 1940's had been as editor and publisher of The Countrywoman magazine. Now through his wife Shirleen's involvement, Bruce highlighted the social advocacy and the depth of care which has created the legacy of "connection, compassion and capability which lives on today." For the support and strengthening of the local community Bruce said, "To all the members of Cabbaritta Branch, past and present - I congratulate you on 50 years of remarkable service."

The cutting of the birthday cake, (made by Bernice Kenny) followed, and was undertaken by three of the foundation members – Margaret Hinks (Vice-President), Margaret Fradd (Secretary) and Patti Jones (Treasurer). Val Robinson, (Foundation President) was unable to attend, but sent an apology and special greetings for the celebration. The gathering then joined in the singing of "Happy Birthday".

Group President Pam Brightwell was then invited to come forward and present Long Service Awards to the following recipients, acknowledging their commitment and contributions to the Branch:

Recipients were encouraged to share their reflections on what CWA means to them, each drawing on memories, emphasizing their pride in the organization and the connections, friendships, networks and outreach which CWA has facilitated for their own personal and collective growth.

In concluding the formalities, President Maria congratulated award recipients, and thanked Branch members "who have gone above and beyond to make this afternoon a success." Recognition for the work of the creative team, the cooks and the behind-thescenes crew was acknowledged, before attendees were thanked and wished a safe journey home.

"We look forward to celebrating 100 years of the CWA organization in Charlton in just four year's time," Maria said as the afternoon wound to a close. Proceedings ended with the saying of the CWA Motto.

The crowd then made the most of catching up with friends and acquaintances during the afternoon tea as memories and reminiscences were shared over a cuppa.

#### Young Leaders Attend GRIP Conference

Work was begun on the cathedral in 1896 and it enabled the church to give out-of-work miners employment. The Cathedral is, architecturally, English Gothic. #### The Charlton Cemetery Trust

In the Victorian Government Gazette 10 January 1879 the appointments of Peter Johnson, Michael George Croker, Patrick Quirk, John Buist and Conrad Klug as Trustees of the Cemetery at West Charlton were published. Trustees continued to manage the Cemetery until 1947 when the Shire of Charlton became the Trustee of the Charlton Public Cemetery. In 1996 the control of the Charlton Cemetery reverted to Public Trustees.

The first burial in the current monumental section took place in 1879. A Niche Wall for ashes was added in 1972 and the First Lawn area was created in 1974. A Second Lawn section was added in 1985 and now there is a Third Lawn section. Since 1997 a Children's Section has been available.

The Rotary Club of Charlton erected a board in 2004 with a list of approximately 3,500 burials and their location. This is currently being updated. To enhance the Cemetery a Gazebo was erected in 2012 and in 2022 further beautification works were undertaken with a quiet, reflective area, with trees and seating being established, connecting the Second Lawn area to the Third Lawn. A new all abilities toilet was added in 2024.

Currently the Trustees are developing a Memorial Section. A maple tree has been planted and edging will be done to enable people to put a plaque in memory of loved ones who may be buried, or ashes are scattered, in other places.

The West Charlton Cemetery, at the back of the current cemetery, is currently being researched and re developed.

The Trust can make arrangements to have badly weathered brass plaques in the Lawn Section refurbished. Please contact Glenda Litton for further information.

The Trust has a "No Glass Policy". This policy has been implemented on advice from the Department of Health – Cemeteries & Crematoria Unit so we would be grateful if the public would abide by this policy. Also the Lawn Sections have a vase available for flowers for each plot. To enable the Trust to maintain the area we ask that no flowers are to be planted in the lawns.

We receive many enquiries from relatives who wish to put a plaque on unmarked graves. Please contact a Trust member so we can confirm the grave number. We receive many compliments on the appearance of our cemetery. Thank you to our gardener Wes Jenkins and his helpers.

# A Gold Medal For Bernie

Former Wooroonook local, Bernie McLoughlan followed up his athletics medal result at the 2024 World Masters Athletics Championship in Sweden by winning a gold medal at the recent Australian Championships in Adelaide.

Representing Victoria and also winning a silver medal in the M70 age group 200m, in a personal best time of 30.23 seconds and a Bronze medal in the M70 400m.

On day 3 of the competition, he came away with the gold in the M70 Pentathlon, finishing ahead of the 2024 Australian M70 champion. The Australian Pentathlon is made up of Long Jump, Javelin, 200m, Discus and 1500m.

Bernie also earlier this year won a silver medal for the M70 age group at the 2025 Decathlon event, consisting of 10 events including the Pole Vault, held in Brisbane.

After competing in upcoming State events, he will return to Brisbane for the Oceania Masters Athletics Championship in September, before setting sights on the 2026 World Masters Championships in South Korea.

"In a Persian Garden" is the song cycle by Liza Lehmann to be presented by the Dunolly Gilbert & Sullivan Society at The Rex Theatre.

One of Liza Lehmann's most acclaimed works, "*In a Persian Garden*" was written in 1896 and is a song cycle for soprano, contralto, tenor & bass.

Set to verses from the renowned "*Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam*" (verses by 12th-century Persian poet Omar Khayyám translated by Edward Fitzgerald in 1859), the philosopher-poet contemplates the beauties of nature, the essence of love, the mysteries of existence, the joys of wines, and the necessity of seizing the day.

#### WHO WAS LIZA LEHMANN?

Once a household name in the Englishspeaking world, Elizabetha ("Liza") Nina Mary Frederica Lehmann was born in Paddington, London, July 11th 1862. She was brought up in Italy until the age of five, and her first language was Italian. Her parents regularly wintered over in Rome, where they moved in an artistic milieu of the highest calibre.

The family returned to London in 1867. Lehmann trained as a singer and composer, but found her singing career stressful and retired, without regret, on her marriage. At this time, she turned to composition as a creative outlet. At her husband's suggestion, she set a selection of verses from Edward Fitzgerald's Rubáiyat of Omar Khayyám, then hugely in vogue in the Englishspeaking world. "In a Persian Garden", published in 1896, rapidly became extremely popular in Britain and North America.

This first triumph was the gateway to a long and successful career as a song composer of considerable fame. As well as writing about 300 individual songs, Lehmann continued to compose six more song-cycles in the quartet form, the most famous of these being The Daisy Chain (1900).

Lehmann was highly conscious of her rare status as a female composer, and in 1911 became the first president of the Society of Women Musicians, a highly influential group set up to foster mutual cooperation between women composers and performers, at a time when opportunities were limited.



**Holiness shines out** *""God did not call us to live in immorality, but in holiness". 1 Thessalonians 4:1-12 (verse 7)* 

Don't you enjoy the experience of the warmth of the sun on your face? Not in summer but after a frost, it is great to go outside and feel the sun's rays – that instant warmth. It is especially lovely, if you have just come outside in the morning, from the cooler temperatures of your home, into the warmth. Sunlight gives warmth, light and life. 

May meeting numbers were down, so a game of six handed cards took place.




